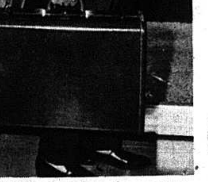

Raw Recruits Make Troopers Tall

They come from all walks of life from across the state but they have many things in common. They're all at least five feet, nine inches tall, weigh at least 150 pounds, and are between the ages of 21 and 30. They all have a high school education or its equivalent, and have passed written and physical examinations and an intensive investigation into their character.

Those are the requirements for admission to the trooper cadet class of the Kentucky State Police. Those who survive the rigid training—described by one cadet as "military basic training with homework"—will emerge 14 weeks later as full-fledged State troopers to take their posts along the Thin Grey Line. And they will have something else in common—the "Green Beret-type pride" that comes from belonging to something.



"GRAMMING" for an exam in first aid is Jerry Ray, Maxwell. Cadets have a supervised study period each weekday evening from seven to nine. They must also keep a running notebook of their activities. Failure to keep it up to date may prevent them from going home for the weekend.

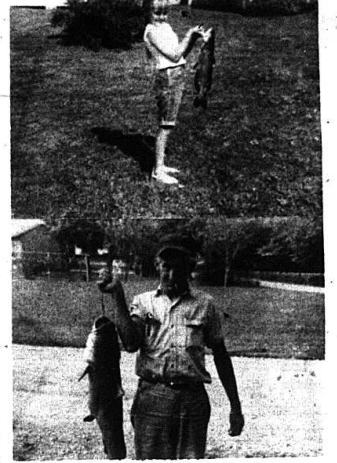

The traffic flow changes were made by the State Highway Department and approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council. The department believes the city changes would be made whether the city approved, or did not approve.

County Tax Assessment Set; Stands Now At \$33,615,645

Final tabulations show that Rockcastle County's total tax assessment this year stands at \$33,615,645, according to records of Mrs. Clarence Carter, Rockcastle County Tax Commissioner.

The total is \$9,014,523 over last year's final tabulation of \$24,601,122. The increase reflects the listing of all property at 100 percent of its fair cash value.

The tax assessment figures have been filed with the State Department of Revenue at Frankfort. An increase in the county is assessed this year at \$26,127,080, as compared to last year's \$5,223,325. Based on the increase in the total tax assessment, county officials estimate that the tax rate this year should be 55 cents per \$100. However, the tax rate has not yet been set by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court. It could be more or less, depending on the city and school rate.

In this year's tabulation, tangible personal property is listed at a total of \$3,957,285 as compared to last year's total of \$1,201,061. Tangible property includes such items as autos, furniture, and various kinds of equipment.

Manufacturing machinery in the county this year is listed at \$234,450, compared to last year's \$90,350. Stocks, bonds, and other intangibles remain virtually the same this year. They are listed at \$13,746,765 as compared to last year's \$1,261,058.

Bank shares were assessed last year at \$387,780. This year they are listed at \$454,000.

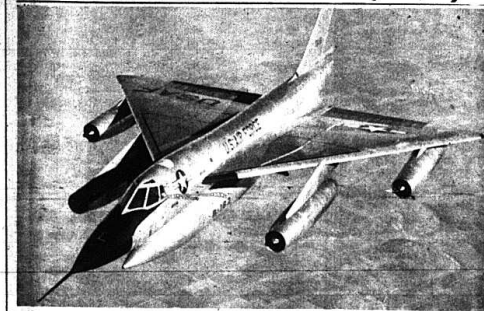

Bombers Over County

Supersonic training flights by Strategic Air Command B-58 Hustler bombers will begin July 1 from near Moulton, Ala., to near Emerson, Ky., and will cross the western section of Rockcastle County, west from a line at Mt. Vernon.

Heading northwesterly, the corridor begins near Moulton, Ala., and continues in a straight line northwest of Athens, Ala.; Fayetteville and Livingston, Tenn.; Southeast of Albany, over Somerset and Irvine, slightly north of Rockhead, and terminates west of Emerson.

An Air Force ad hoc scoring unit will use radio and radar signals to determine accuracy of simulated bomb drops, since SAC aircraft do not carry bombs during these training missions.

In order to reduce the sonic boom over major cities, target selections are made to bypass them or to allow deceleration to subsonic speeds before reaching these cities.

The bombers will fly a maximum of two runs daily at supersonic speeds up to Mach 1.65 (1,100 mph). Because of the B-58's high altitudes (above 35,000 feet), their sonic booms will be comparatively weak.

Although sometimes startling or distracting in their suddenness, the sonic booms will not injure people or damage a structurally sound building.

The new filings bring to 25 the number of suits filed in connection with the water project, still to be approved, but expected to be approved within the next few days.

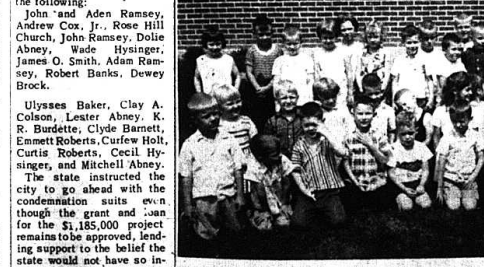

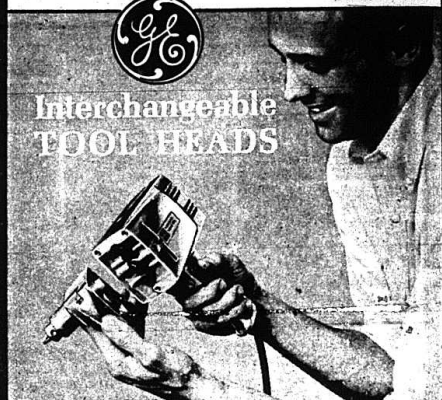

HOW TO BE A FLAVOR SAVER

Do you favor your cooking clean? You should—because you can build a reputation for blue ribbon cookery simply on the knowledge of how to preserve and enhance natural food flavors.

To keep eggs fresh for a fairly long time, rub oil, butter or pure glycerin over the whole surface of the shell.

A lump of charcoal in your refrigerator will absorb strong food odors and flavors, keeping foods free of all odors and flavors but their own.

Stuff chickens with cooled apples to keep the meat moist and to add piquancy to its flavor.

Stainless steel is probably the best material for cooking and food storage material, because it's lightweight, easy to clean, won't rust or corrode.

A new line of multiple-use stainless steel bowls, by the Vollrath Company of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, can be used as cook-and-serve containers for oven-to-table food preparation. And stainless, supplied by Republic Steel Corp., will not affect the taste of food as some containers do.

Called "Swap Tops," the bowls come with plastic tops for air and water-tight storage in freezer and refrigerator. Plastic tops from coffee, nut and candy tins provide spare covers.

Steam foods instead of boil-

ing them; you won't drain away valuable nutrients and flavor agents. Place the food in a container above the boiling water, so that only the steam is able to reach the food.

Low oven temperature is a must for tasty, tender roast beef.

Slice tomatoes vertically; they'll retain more juice.

Bacon drippings used for frying and sautéing impart a part a delicate flavor. But be sure to use a little less salt.

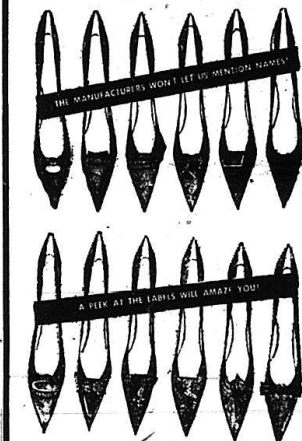

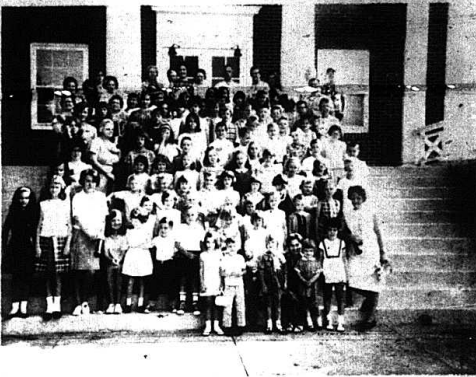

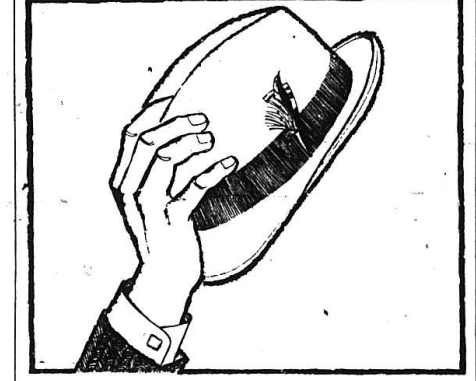
