

AUTHORITY. This regulation is adopted and issued pursuant to the authority of Section 318.015 (2) of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

County: Section 1. State Plumbing.

Section 3. Penalty. As Section 3. Penalty. As-provided by KRS 318.990 any person who violates any provision of this reg-ulation shall be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10. 00) nor more than one hun-dred dollars (\$100.00) nor Imprisoned for not more than injecty (\$00.00) and injecty (\$00.00). ninety (90) days or both for each offense. Each day the violation continues consti-tutes a separate offense.

Section 4. Partial Invalidity, Affect Of: If any word, clause or section of this regulation shall be declared invalid, the invalidity there-of shall not affect the validity of any of the remaining provisions.

Section 5. Repeals. All section 5. Repeats. All regulations of the Rockcastle County Board of Health in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

Section 6. Effective Date. This regulation shall be-come effective immediately.

Much tobacco has been set for several weeks, Dr. Miller said, but there is a large amount of young tobacco which might get such damage. Dry weather has held back growth in many

Dr. Miller also cautions growers 'about spraying any type of tobacco during the hot times of the day. ''Spray in the early morning hours or late afternoon, when temperatures are lower. Spraying in the heat of the day may cause damage to may cause damage to ves from insecticides."
