Legal Notice
 A Regulation of the Rock-
 castle County Board of
 Health under the State
 Plumbing Code for Rock-
 castle County regulating the
 installation of plumbing,
 drainage and sewage
 disposal systems; Design-
 ing approved types of ma-
 terials, fixtures and methods
 of installation; requiring
 plumbing construction per-
 mits to be procured prior to
 installation and providing
 for plumbing installation
 permit fees, plumbing in-
 spection services, and a
 penalty for violation of re-
 gulation as provided by law.

Section 3. Penalty. As
 provided by KRS 318.990
 persons who violate any
 provision of this regula-
 tion shall be fined not
 less than ten dollars (\$10.
 00) nor more than one hun-
 dred dollars (\$100.00) nor
 imprisoned for not more than
 ninety (90) days or both for
 each offense. Each day the
 violation continues consti-
 tutes a separate offense.

**Section 4. Partial Invali-
 dity, Affect OI:** If any word,
 clause or section of this
 regulation shall be declared
 invalid, the invalidity there-
 of shall not affect the valid-
 ity of any of the remaining
 provisions.

Section 5. Repeals. All
 regulations or parts of re-
 gulations of the Rockcastle
 County Board of Health in
 conflict herewith are to the
 extent of such conflict
 hereby repealed.

Section 6. Effective Date.
 This regulation shall be-
 come effective immediately.

John Pigg Shot To Death; Charge Wife With Murder

John Pigg, about 40, was shot to death Tuesday afternoon on a lane leading to a farm just off Mullins Station Road near Red Hill. Shot in the left leg was Miss Mattie Griffin, 32, of Red Hill area, who was with Pigg. She is undergoing treatment for the wound at Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

Charged with willful murder is Mrs. Laura Pigg, wife of the dead man. She denied the shooting when she was taken into custody at the home of a neighbor.

According to Sheriff Tip Reppert, Pigg was shot twice when he started toward a truck to take Miss Griffin home. One bullet entered near his nose. The second bullet hit him in the side of the head. He died instantly.

The shooting occurred about 1 p.m., about 250 feet from a house believed to belong to Pigg. Pigg and his wife and seven children ordinarily live near Pine Hill. He and Mrs. Pigg have two children. She has five from a previous marriage.

Miss Griffin was well known by Pigg. She filed a complaint in Rockcastle County Court in May 1965 charging Pigg was the father of her illegitimate son. A jury later agreed and Pigg was ordered to pay \$15 a month support.

Reppert she and PIGG were at the house when Mrs. PIGG arrived. She said when PIGG started to a truck to take her (Miss Griffin) home, Mrs. PIGG shot him with a

pistol and then turned the gun on her. As of late Wednesday, the .22 caliber pistol, believed used in the slaying, had not been found.

FBI Checks Attempted Derailment

An attempt to wreck a Louisville & Nashville freight train near Mt. Vernon is under investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, according to Harry Boling, special services representative of the

L. & N freight train No. 65 struck 15 sections of cross-ties about 10 a.m., July 13 about a mile south of the Mt. Vernon crossing. The engineer saw the ties on the track and was able to slow down in time. Although the train hit the ties, it did not derail because its speed had been slowed.

Mr. Boling said 15 sections of cross-ties means that each cross-tie had been saved in these places and hauled to the tracks, a relatively big job. After stopping, the train crew cleared the remainder of the cross-ties from the tracks and went on.

Although the line is not used in regular passenger service by the railroad, it is sometimes used for the transportation of soldiers, sailors, and marines on special trains and on special occasions.

The location of the attempted derailment was generally in the same area where last year a railroad motor car trailer burned. The trailer contained a tool box and 28 switch heaters—a loss of about \$2,000.

The L. & N official said he had notified the FBI about the cross-ties since the attempt was a violation of federal train wrecking statutes. Persons apprehended would go into federal court at London.

He said the railroad would give a reward for information leading to the identity of the persons responsible. In another accident last week, that had no connection

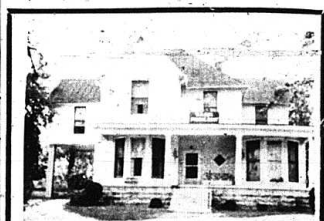

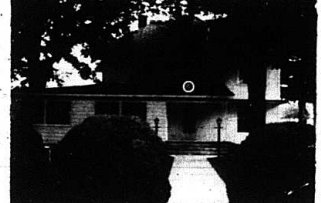

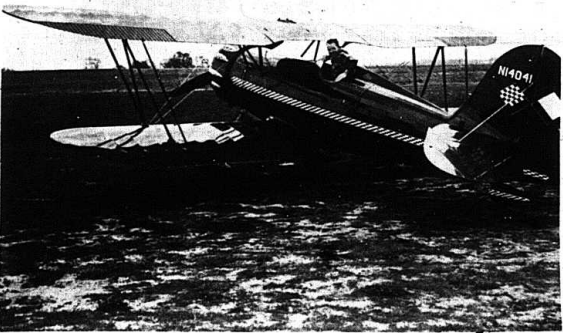

FARM SAFETY WEEK SET FOR JULY 24-30

Some Day or Night This Emblem May Save Your Life

- Know It Use It



If you are a farmer and sometimes drive slow-moving farm machinery on the highways, you should know and use the Slow-Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblem. It could save your life.

If you are a city or urban dweller and travel the rural highways, you too should know and recognize the SMV emblem. It could prevent you from being involved in a rear-end collision with slow moving equipment.

The emblem is a fluorescent yellow-orange colored triangle with a dark red reflective border about 1 1/2 inches high and 16 inches wide that is placed on the rear of a slow-moving vehicle so it can be easily seen by other drivers, day or night, from a distance of 500 feet or more. It is not intended to replace other caution or warning devices such as flags, reflectors or lights.

The emblem was developed by Ohio State University research specialists in an attempt to reduce the number of rear-end collisions involving slow-moving vehicles designed to travel at speeds of less than 25 miles per hour. It was first introduced two years ago as a safety device and since then its use is mandatory by law in Ohio and will be required in Nebraska next year. Other States are considering similar legislation.

Traffic safety experts theorize that the average motorist does not realize how slow the vehicle until it is too late to avoid a collision. Under normal conditions, recognition of the emblem would provide ample time for the motorist to safely reduce his speed.

During National Farm Safety Week—July 24-30—special emphasis is being placed on the SMV emblem to promote its use and to acquaint the motorist with its meaning. Leon Urban, director of farm safety activities for the National Safety Council, says, "even though there are more than

agriculture, to unite for safety, and apply full energy and determination to the vital task of reducing accidents at work, in homes, at recreation and on the roadways. Progress toward this goal should be the objective of National Farm Safety Week 1966," the President said.

"Today's increasing demand for farm products places worldwide attention and importance on America's farm population," said Howard Pyle, president of the National Safety Council. "National Farm Safety Week will focus attention on all farm hazards and place special emphasis on the prevention of highway accidents involving slow-moving farm vehicles. The campaign is sponsored annually by the National Safety Council and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Rural communities throughout the United States are expected to participate in making the 1966 campaign the most effective to date.

The 1964 breakdown shows a total of 8,300 deaths and 760,000 disabling injuries. Of the deaths, 3,700 involved motor-vehicles, 1,900 were in the home, 2,500 were work accidents and 800 resulted from off-the-farm non-motor vehicle accidents, according to the National Safety Council. The breakdown does not equal the total because some deaths are included in other categories and also included in motor-vehicle accidents.

The farm tractor is involved in the majority of fatal farm machinery accidents. Operators of this versatile farm machine should know the safe operating procedures.
