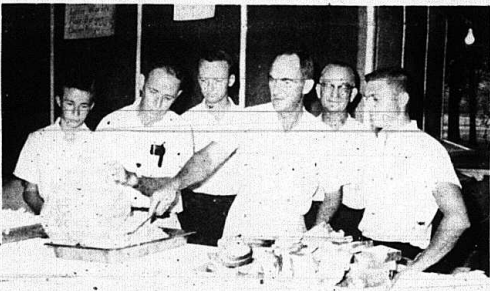

jurisdiction over immigration and naturalization matters in the entire state of Kentucky and 36 counties in Southwestern Ohio. It requires a staff of 21 persons.

Gaines was married November 7, 1941 and has two children.

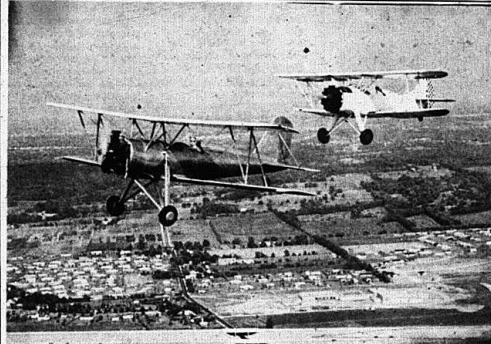
