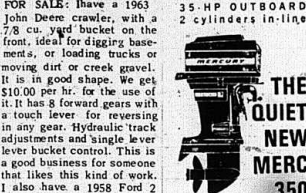

County Budget Is Set

A 10 percent increase in the Rockcastle County budget for the coming year was voted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday.

The county set its budget for the year at \$122,782, then voted the 10 percent increase that will up the budget about \$4,500 to a total of about \$127,282.

Last year's budget was \$126,382.

A recent law passed by the State Legislature allows a county, city or municipality to up its budget 10 percent if a public hearing is called. If it fails to make the 10 percent increase in two years, the amount is lost until the Legislature again votes an increase.

The motion to take the 10 percent increase in the fiscal year 1967 was approved by Magistrate Henry Cromer, Magistrate Wally Phillips, seconded by Magistrate Henry Cromer, Magistrate Hubert Thacker and Danny Sargent voted yes. Magistrate G. H. Griffin voted no.

The 10 percent increase in income from last year's levy on real and personal property, and franchise property. Since last year's income was \$45,000, the 10 percent would be about \$4,500.

The court said the money would be used to make needed repairs to the hospital system and roof at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

The court did not set the tax rate at the meeting, but best estimates is that it will be about 57 cents on the \$100 of property valuation, including school taxes.

Last year, it was \$2.40. The decrease is attributed to the recent change in property valuation which was the result of a Court of Appeals ruling which said property

File Suit To Oust Judge

A suit seeking the ouster of Livingston Police Judge William Gilford from office has been filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court by Kentucky Attorney General Robert Matthews.

The suit states Police Judge Gilford is not a resident of the City of Livingston, and according to State Statutes, not eligible to serve as police judge. Judge Gilford was elected to office last November, following a bitter campaign which was sprinkled with charges and countercharges including references to many dogs running loose on the streets of Livingston. Judge Gilford's opponent in the election was H. Clark, Attorney General Matthews through state appointed attorney Pleaz Mobley, declares that:

"Based on information furnished in affidavits by J. C. Quinn, McKinley Arnold, and Irvin Fields, citizens and residents of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, plaintiffs state that the defendant William Gilford is now acting as police judge and county clerk of Livingston, Kentucky, and is performing some of the duties of that office."

"Plaintiffs say that the defendant is not a resident of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, but resides some distance beyond said city limits, off U. S. 25 Highway, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, and that pursuant to Section 234, Kentucky Constitution, is ineligible and not qualified to hold said office of police judge in the City of Livingston, Kentucky, and that the said defendant is now an usurper of the office of police judge of the City of Livingston, Kentucky."

"Wherefore, the plaintiffs demand that the defendant be declared a usurper of the Office of Police Judge of Livingston, Kentucky, and that this office be declared vacant; for the cost of action, and any other proper relief."

To date, Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar has not scheduled a hearing on the suit.

School Budget \$1,086,000

A \$1,086,000 budget to run the school system for the coming year was submitted to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court for approval by the Rockcastle County Board of Education at the court's meeting Tuesday.

Last year's school budget totaled \$976,000.

The Board set a school tax rate of 34 cents per \$100 for general purposes on real estate; 47.2 cents on public service companies; 38 cents on bank shares, and a \$2 poll tax.

The Board of Education did not take a 10 percent budget increase allowed by the last session of the Legislature.

A breakdown of the new school budget is as follows:

Administration, \$39,000; instructional, \$764,300; attendance service, \$11,000; pupil transportation, \$84,000; operation of plant, \$47,000; maintenance of plant, \$20,000; fixed charges, such as social security, \$30,000; capital outlay, \$6,000; debt service, \$100,000; outgoing transfers and refunds, \$24,600, for a total of \$1,086,000.

Estimated Receipts
Cash on hand, \$22,000; property tax, \$101,838.67; franchise corporations, \$36,186.56; bank shares, \$1,725.20; poll tax, \$3,000; less cost of tax collection

\$6,590.02; exonerations, \$486.30; delinquencies, \$400, discounts, \$5,042.51, for a total deduction of \$12,518.83, plus estimated receipts from previous year delinquencies, \$500, bringing the total to \$152,731.60. State and federal receipts, which includes the Minimum Foundation Program amount to \$933,268.40, for overall total receipts of \$1,086,000.

The school system's outstanding indebtedness totals \$247,000.

Johnsons Trial Postponed

Trial of four Johnson brothers of Climax on several charges in Rockcastle Circuit Court was postponed Friday until Aug. 16.

Melvin Johnson, David Johnson, Johnnie Johnson, Olen Johnson, and Roger Ratliff were indicted last week by Circuit Court grand jury for the willful murder of Fred Jones Jr., of Climax on July 4.

Several other charges were filed against the Johnson brothers, all in connection with the July 4 shooting.

David Johnson is also charged with armed robbery and shooting into a dwelling house.

Melvin Johnson is also charged with shooting into a dwelling house, flourishing a deadly weapon, armed robbery, and carrying a concealed deadly weapon.

Olen Johnson and Johnnie Johnson are also charged with shooting into a dwelling house.

At the Friday hearing, Circuit Judge C. Tartar appointed Atty. H. K. Spear of Somerset to represent the men in court.

The court set Aug. 16 for the trial in order to give the attorney time to prepare his case.

TWO CONVICTED IN CIRCUIT COURT

Mrs. Aloha Lee Sharp of Hamilton, Ohio, was fined \$150 by a Rockcastle Circuit Court jury last week on a charge of driving while under the influence of intoxicating beverages.

Mrs. Sharp had appealed a conviction in Rockcastle County Court where a jury found her guilty and fined her \$100 and costs.

Mrs. Sharp was ticketed by State Trooper Danny Coleman on March 16, 1966 four miles south of Livingston. She pleaded not guilty to the charge. Indications are the case will be taken to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

In other court action, Elijah James McFarland, of Negro Creek, was sentenced to one year in prison on a charge of armed robbery. He was convicted by a jury of entering Yadon's Store at Brodhead.

Dental Clinic Treated 138

In cooperation with the Head Start Program, the County Health Department arranged to have a dental trailer come to Rockcastle County for two weeks.

During the two weeks, Dr. James Woldawa treated 138 Head Start pupils. Treatment consisted of 136 prophylaxis and fluoride cleanings, 80 fillings and 16 extractions.

Children from upper income families were not treated because of Office of Economic Opportunity regulations. These children are urged to see their family doctor.

Wreck Kills Phillip Smith

A former Brodhead youth was killed Saturday night when the car in which he was riding overturned near Richmond.

Killed was Phillip Lee Smith, 25, of Albama, Calif., and son of the late Theo Smith of Brodhead.

Also killed was Walter Keith Leese, 22, of Crab Orchard, a third occupant of the car, William Edgar Mize, 22, of Crab Orchard

was injured. State Police reported the accident occurred on KY 1295 about eight miles south of Richmond near Kirksville when the auto failed to negotiate a curve. The Smith car skidded off the road, hit a rock embankment, glanced off and overturned; slid 200 feet on its top, and came to rest upside down in a ditch.

Both of the dead men were thrown under the auto.

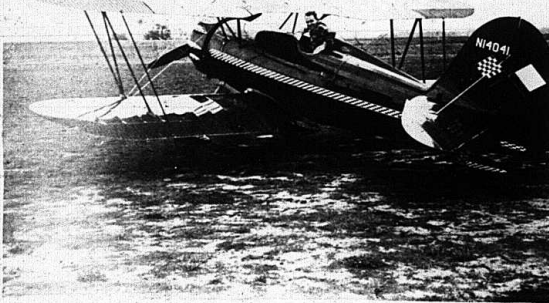

To Editor:

I want to inform the taxpayers who appealed their property assessments what they are up against.

I called lawyers, read the law, but went into the appeal hearing without any definite information. Better take a lawyer with you if you are able to hire one, a tape recorder, and as many witnesses as to the value of your property as you can. I had none of them.

The hearing is held in the county where the property is located. Two lawyers and a stenographer sent by the state will hear your evidence. I thought it would be in the circuit court room or open to the public. It isn't. It is held in the assessor's office in private.

A state tax man is sent to represent the assessor as his witness and is usually not familiar with the property value but follows the assessor's figure, and in my case anything else the assessor wanted to add.

There seems to be nothing the taxpayer can do to get a review of the unequal 100 percent assessments.

I hope people can see what a farce the hearing is, without their appeal, sell their property, or be prepared to go on to Circuit Court. A taxpayers league is being organized for this purpose.
