## School Cooks At School

The way to a man's heart is through his stomach, so goes the old saying. Probably the same thing would apply just as well to school children. At least that is the idea with the cooks in the Rockcastle County school system who have been having a training program for luncheon personnel at Roundstone School.

To make the lunch hour a pleasant experience for the children. In order to accomplish these objectives consultants from the US Department of Agriculture at Atlanta, Ga., the State Department of Education, the Division of Commodity Distribution, and others, worked with the group for a week discussing what constitutes a well balanced lunch; the importance of menu planning; equipment; proper handling and care of food, and the selection and purchasing of food.

The group spent three days planning and preparing meals. A type A lunch was prepared with special emphasis on color, texture, temperature, flavor and economy. Favorite meats, vegetables, and pastries were prepared. Ways were also suggested which would best accomplish the goals which were set up. For example, it was felt that music played on a tape recorder would add much to the lunch hour.

The cooking school, a training program, is a new idea. It is a cooperative effort of all the county schools, and the cooks can see first hand how the other cooks cook, what they cook, and how they do it. The result, if followed, would produce better meals for the children in the schools this fall.

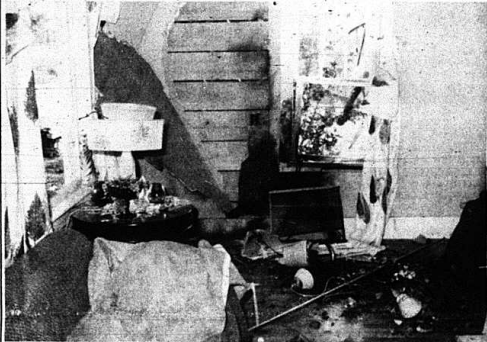

## Lightning Wrecks House

A bolt of lightning ripped into a house on Brush Rock Tuesday afternoon, and the house virtually exploded. C. P. Robinson, his wife, and two children, had gone to a relatives house nearby only minutes before the bolt struck their house. No fire followed, but appliances in the house were knocked out and wires were smoking after the impact of at least a million volts of electricity. Scores of neighbors gathered after the sharp crack and flash of light in the vicinity of the house. One unidentified woman living nearby said she and two others were knocked to the floor. Only one bolt of lightning was in the small dark cloud that crossed the ridge, but it found its mark on the Robinson home about 25 feet from the road. It struck about 4:20 p.m.

Just where the impact of the bolt hit the house is undetermined. It appeared to most observers that it struck the house rather than the television antenna or the electric wiring, leading into the house. Six windows exploded outward throwing glass into the yard as well as over the interior of the house. Siding on the house was ripped off and window frames sagged.

The interior of the house was a shambles of broken glass, pictures, lamps, and furniture. One chair looked as if it had been thrown across a room. The curtains were in shreds. Sheet rock on the ceilings sagged, and around electric plugs there were only holes, some more than an inch across. The charge literally ripped the plugs out of the walls and ceiling.

By appearance, the house looked as if there had been a gas explosion.

Neighbors walked quietly through the house with mouths open and shaking their heads. Said one woman: "What if those people had been there?" Assistant Fire Chief John Cox, who along with Jess Cummins went to the scene, said he had never seen a house so badly damaged by lightning and with no fire following. The house, but not the contents, were insured, Mr. Robinson reported. One other thing in the house at the time was a blue parakeet in his cage. He was chirping merrily after it was all over, apparently protected by his feathers, which do not conduct electricity.

## Registered to Vote?

Sept. 10 is the last day for unregistered citizens to register to vote in this year's Nov. 8 election. To be eligible to register and vote, one must be 18 years old or before election day, and must have lived in the state one year, his county six months, and his precinct 60 days. Voters statewide will be privileged to vote for or against a proposed new state constitution.

## Judge Gilford Answers Suit

Livingston Police Judge William Gilford asked Rockcastle Circuit Court this week to dismiss a suit to oust him from his office as Police Judge.

The request was made in an answer to a suit filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court by Kentucky Atty. Gen. Robert Matthews, asking that Judge Gilford be removed from office on the grounds he was not a resident of the City of Livingston.

In his answer, Judge Gilford, through his attorney, Fritz Krueger, said the suit against him "fails to set forth facts upon which relief may be granted."

The suit was filed by Atty. Gen. Matthews on the basis of affidavits signed by McKinley Arnold, Irvin Fields, and J. C. Quinn.

The affidavits were signed by the three on Aug. 23, 1965. It was not reported why the Attorney General was so long in bringing the case to court, although a year can elapse between the affidavits and the court action.

In his answer, Judge Gilford said that "he is a citizen and resident of and resided within the corporate limits, and further alleges that he is duly qualified and acting police judge, thereof, having been elected by electorate of said town."

He asked for a dismissal and "for his costs."

In one exception to the suit, Judge Gilford pointed out that Livingston Policeman McKinley Arnold lives at Mt. Vernon and not in Livingston, as pointed out in his affidavit.

Judge Tarter has not set a date for a hearing on the case, but told the Signal that he would hear the case anytime.

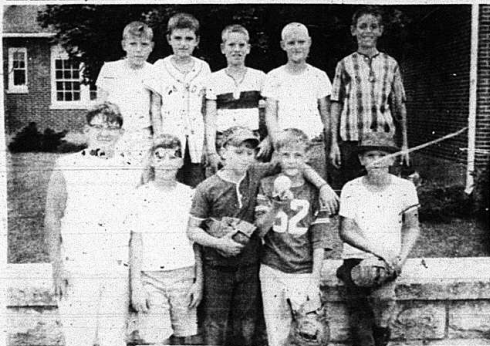
Judge Tarter did not set a date for a re-trial.

**Cookies**  
Peanut Butter - Oatmeal Squares: Ingredients are one pound of melted butter; 8 cups of sugar; 2 cups of cocoa; 2 cups of milk; 1 teaspoon salt; 4 tablespoons vanilla; 4 cups peanut butter; 12 cups quick cooking oats. Mix first four ingredients; bring mixture to a boil; boil one minute; remove from heat; add vanilla and peanut butter; beat until well mixed; add quick cooking oats; drop onto a cookie sheet or press into a pan, and cut into squares. Do not require baking.

**Yummy!** Indeed it all is, as attested by those who got to enjoy them. Even the cooks were impressed with the three recipes.

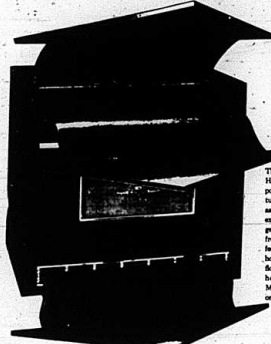

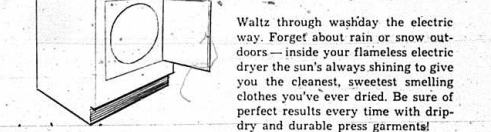

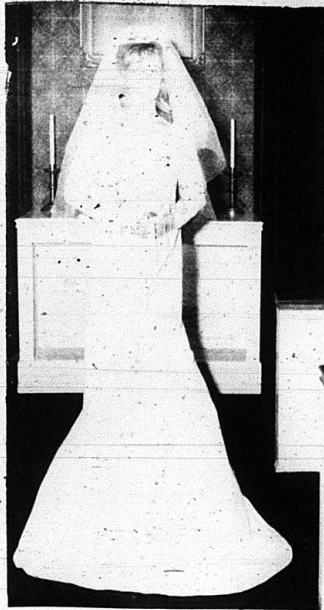
