Jury Indicts Laura Pigg

A Rockcastle Circuit Court jury indicted Laura Pigg on a charge of wilful murder against Mrs. Laura Pigg in the death on July 19 of her husband, John Pigg, 39, of Pine Hill. But the grand jury did not end its investigation of the complicated case. It left it to the November Grand Jury to investigate further.

In an order, the Grand Jury said it further appears that there are at this time two suspects and that the matter has been investigated by this grand jury and witnesses have been called. It is therefore ordered that the investigation remain open and the case against Mattie Griffin be, and the same is hereby referred

to the November term of the Grand Jury.

Both Mrs. Pigg and Miss Mattie Griffin figured closely in the shooting of John Pigg. The shooting occurred on property believed owned by Pigg just off Mullins Station Road.

At the time, Miss Griffin told Sheriff Tip Reppert she and Pigg were at the house when Mrs. Pigg arrived. She said when Pigg started to a truck to take her (Miss Griffin) home, Mrs. Pigg pulled the gun on her, shooting her in the leg.

Mrs. Pigg denied the shooting. Miss Griffin later took a lie detector test at Frankfort, but no official report of the findings has been made. Mrs. Pigg asked that she be given a similar test, but to date the test has not been given. Mr. and Mrs. Pigg have two

children. Mrs. Pigg has five from a previous marriage. Pigg also is the father of Miss Griffin's illegitimate son, according to a jury ruling in Judge R. C. Tartar on May 19, 1965. Judge R. C. Tartar has not set bond for Mrs. Pigg, but was expected to by late Wednesday.

Unless something unexpected happens-- and it doesn't appear likely-- Mt. Vernon can expect to keep its heavy traffic at least until September of next year.

This was indicated this week in looking through a series of memorandums sent to State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward from his various department heads within the past few days.

Commissioner Ward mailed the memorandums sent to him, and his replies, to the Signal and interested persons in the area this week.

Among the things discussed were general Interstate-75 construction between Green Hill Road through the Renfro Valley dam and lake project, and possible use of sections of the superhighway as they are completed.

Concerning the Renfro Dam and lake, it was apparent in the Commissioner's letter and in the memorandums that he did not then know any more than he had at the time of the federal government's intentions on a grant and loan. But he appeared willing to one-up any delay (to the fifth time) a contract letting on the section of the superhighway between Green Hill School Road through the Renfro Valley dam and lake project, and possible use of sections of the superhighway as they are completed.

In a letter directly to the Signal, with a carbon copy to Gov. Edward Breathitt, the Commissioner said: "I am increasingly concerned about the delay in the construction of Interstate-75 because we have not been able to work out an agreement by which the proposed Green Creek Reservoir could be built... I think it would be a terrible mistake to build I-75 without utilization of the highway fill to create the dam for the Renfro Creek project. All my life I have been keenly interested in the proper utilization of natural resources. This is a perfect example illustrating how various government programs can be coordinated to achieve great good in development and utilization of natural resources."

That the date for the contract letting on the Renfro Reservoir has been extended seemed to be borne out in a memorandum to Commissioner Ward from J. T. Anderson, projects engineer, and since the date was not passed. In his memorandum, Mr. Anderson said: "Since grade and drain work on this section will now be done in the 1967 reconstruction season, we feel that the sponsors can still be given more time and the anticipated date of Aug. 16, 1966, can be extended to Sept. 13, 1966 if necessary. This would make a letting date of Oct. 21, 1966. In order to meet this latter date, we would have to have a decision from the sponsors not later than Sept. 8, 1966."

How are other sections of I-75 progressing? This was answered in a memorandum to Commissioner Ward from G. F. Vansant, assistant projects management engineer. Briefly it was:

The planning grant, Project 66-799, culminates three months of intensive planning which involved literally hundreds of people in this region. Copies of this proposal are being sent to the Department of Education, Frankfurt, and to the U.S. Office of Education, Washington, D.C., for evaluation.

The program is expected to be in operation by Jan. 1.

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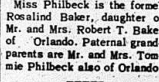

(Continued From Page 1) the sections, excluding the Renfro Valley section, are listed below:

The present schedule provides for opening I-75 from Richmond all the way through the Burr Interchange in November, 1968. It had been originally scheduled for November, 1967; Apparently, the delay in the Renfro Section is the reason for the addition of a year on the entire stretch.

Richmond through the Berea Interchange. Open to traffic November, 1966; project is ahead of schedule.

Berea Interchange to a point southwest of Boone grade and drain work completed July November 18, 1966; paving anytime after that date; ahead of schedule.

Boone to Green Hill School Road; grade and drain work completed June 1, 1967; surfacing anytime after date; ahead of schedule.

Section from Renfro Valley Interchange south through the Burr Interchange now under construction; grade and drain completed June 1, 1967; surfacing anytime after that date; on schedule.

A check with contractors showed that most believed it would take until September 1967 before traffic could be turned on to the Mt. Vernon by-pass, giving Mt. Vernon another summer of heavy traffic.

On this matter Mr. Ward also had something to say, and it was in a memorandum dated Aug. 22 to Engineer Anderson:

"I am extremely anxious that we cooperate with Mount Vernon in the construction of the Renfro Creek Reservoir. To this end, I am renewing personal efforts to persuade federal officials to approve this project so that we may proceed with the construction of Interstate-75. The interests of the travelling public are such that I recognize that we cannot continue for an indefinite period the delay of letting the construction contract."

And further: "I am impressed with the necessity of reviewing the entire subject to determine if there is some way that we can proceed with paving of some of these sections, and the development of plans so that some sections can be

usable. For example, isn't it possible to make a connection between US 25 and the completed section of Interstate-75 south of Berea? Isn't it also possible to provide for build-out of the Interstate between Interstate 75 and US 25, both north and south of Mt. Vernon so that the section would be usable in advance of the

construction of that section which is involved in the Renfro Creek Dam? Whether this means that Commissioner Ward is receptive to the extension of the present contract on the section between Renfro and Burr to allow for the additional construction of the Renfro Interchange, was not stated.

Each center had aides and custodians. These were: Mrs. Mary Powell, Mrs. Juanita Davis, Miss Valera Bullock, Mrs. Grace D. Mullins, Mrs. Zillah French, Mrs. Ruth Schenker, Mrs. Laura Cromer, and Gary Mink. In the Hi-Prep Program classroom work was mixed with instruction in cultural subjects, such as art, music, and drama, to broaden the student's outlook and increase his achievement potential. The whole program was spiced with a series of trips that could not be considered during the regular school term. The students were taken on tours of the hospital, county library, courthouse, Harris Field, the museum at Renfro Valley; to see the Daniel Boone Story at Berea's Indian Fort Theater; to the zoo; to the museum at Levi Jackson Park, to the Health Fair at Mt. Vernon, and to the dedication of the changing of the name of the Cumberland National Forest to the Daniel Boone Forest where they saw television star Fess Parker in person. The highlight of the trips was one to Frankfort where they saw the floral clock; and toured the Capitol Building -- town, toward Breathitt spoke to the students. They toured the governor's mansion and saw Mrs. Breathitt; toured the Old State Capitol, and visited the grave of Daniel Boone.
