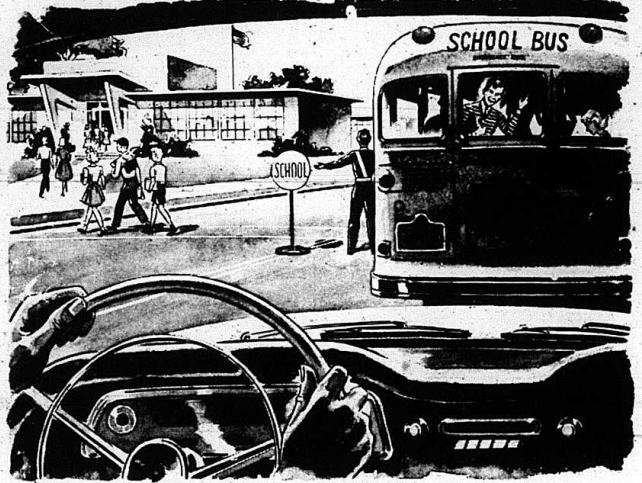

Report County Agriculture

A total of 1,164 farms was counted in Rockcastle County during the 1964 Census of Agriculture, the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the census reports. In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1959), the total counted in the county was 1,412 farms.

The 1964 total is published in a preliminary report on the county just issued. The report also shows that average size in the county was 105.3 acres and that the average value of the county's farms (land and buildings) in 1964 was \$13,623.

Other important county statistics in the report are: Value of all farm products sold by farms in the county in 1964, \$3,086,056, in 1959, \$2,763,103. Value of all crops sold by county farms in 1964, \$1,832,393; in 1959, \$1,534,451. Value of all livestock and livestock products sold by county farms in 1964, \$1,253,063; in 1959, \$1,228,652.

Information obtained for the first time in an agriculture census included the amount of income received by the county's farmers from recreational services as well as data on the use of pest control chemicals in the county in 1964. A Census of Agriculture is taken every 5 years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. The data are needed to make decisions affecting many segments of the U.S. economy. The 1964 farm census was the 18th in a series that began in 1840.

The preliminary report for the county contains more than 500 facts about agriculture in the county. Among additional facts it contains are the number of farms by size, type, and economic class; the number of farm operators by method of tenure, age, color, off-farm work, and number of school years completed; land in farms by use and by land-use practices; data on equipment and facilities; farm expenditures; number of hired workers; and number of farms reporting poultry and livestock production and those reporting crop production by acres and quantities as well as sales.

Single copies are available for 10 cents from the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233, or from any field office of the Department of Commerce. These are located in major cities.

The Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington is "trying to reach some kind of decision" on the proposed Appalachian highway connecting road between Somerset and Interstate-75.

This was in a report to the Signal this week by John Whisman, former assistant to Gov. Edward Breathitt, and now state representative to the Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington.

Mr. Whisman said the final decision on the routing has not been decided by the Commission, but that a decision could be expected in the immediate future. He said the Commission is now going over the route from various surveys and recommendations, and that he could not at this time speculate on what the Commission will finally do. "My guess," Mr. Whisman said, "is that it is still very much a guess in that the connecting section will be along KY 80 to London. There is nothing I can readily see that will change the request by the Kentucky State Highway Department that it go along KY 80."

Although Mr. Whisman did not elaborate on his statement that the Commission is "trying to reach some kind of decision," it hinted that perhaps someone on the Commission, or close to the Commission, is not wholly in favor of the KY 80 routing. The road is part of an Appalachian highway beginning at Chattanooga, Tenn., and extending around Lake Cumberland to Somerset and on to

Since the corridor was announced the State Highway Department, specifically, Commissioner Henry Ward, has indicated the KY 80 route was preferred. The Department hired Spindletou, Inc., of Lexington to survey the route.

The findings of the survey were never made public, but John Sweeney, director of the Appalachian Regional Commission, said that the survey indicated the KY 80 route. He also said the State Highway Department had indicated that "KY 461 will be substantially upgraded," but Commissioner Ward told the Signal that he had made no promise to the Commission.

Mr. Whisman in his conversation said he felt that time and traffic would finally demand that KY 461 be upgraded. He reported that the Commission would later take up "these various roads that connect to main Appalachian corridors" which should include KY 461, "but that the Appalachian program does not now have funds to bring up new projects.

(Continued From Page 1) Mr. Whisman said he felt that the Renfro Valley Dam and Lake is the top project for Mt. Vernon. He said he did not know its status but would check on it.

"The last time I inquired about the Renfro project, I felt that it had moved along very well and that there was apparently no problems. I must admit that it has been delayed much longer than I expected," he said.

"But I feel that with two 1-75 interchanges, a lake, Renfro Valley Enterprises, and other natural scenery and beauty in the Mt. Vernon area, the area can boom economically in the future. As I have said before, Mt. Vernon is at the great gateway to the south, and can become one of the most important tourist areas in Kentucky," he declared.

Dove Hunting Now

Seventy half days of dove hunting in Kentucky will open on Sept. 1 at noon, amid reports from biologists, farmers and hunters that this year's supply of this fast flying bird is greater than in the past several years.

Federal regulations apply, as usual, to the dove hunters.

and Commissioner Minor Clark, of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, warns hunters to be sure that the fields are legal—over which they shoot. The limit per day this year is 12 with 24 in possession after two or more days of hunting.

Western Kentucky reports the greatest increase in doves, but the supply in central Kentucky is above average and in eastern sections of the state, where few doves are hunted, the population is as great as for last year, according to a poll of conservation officers across the state.
