**CAMP UNICO SUCCESSFUL**

Seventeen Rockcastle County youngsters in the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades are sharing a unique experience this summer with similar children from seven other counties at Union College's Camp Unico.

The camp is made up of five camping sessions of 10 days each.

By providing children from low income and deprived families with the chance to live, study, and play with other youngsters of their own ages, Camp Unico attempts to broaden their outlook on life. Classes in Kentucky history, mathematics, geography, government and special classes in remedial reading offer many of the camps at least an even chance in high school, where they had practically none before.

Competitive sports teach them the value of working together, and helps them learn to compete with others. Individual sports offer a sense of accomplishment, some of the camps for the first time. Instruction is offered in swimming and in other sports, as well as First Aid. Field trips to Cumberland Gap National Park, to Cudjo's Cave, and to other points of historical interest, make history more than a textbook class for these youngsters. Other classes they have, some of which are not to be found in the average high school, are square dancing, understanding poetry, and wildflowers.

Herman Bush, Director of Athletics for Union College, is director of the camp, and Mrs. Joanne Allen is its full-time social worker. Mrs. Allen will continue to do follow-up social work with the campers by visiting them at school and at home throughout the year.

Camp Unico is designed to help the campers build good social habits, and to give campers a knowledge of the opportunities awaiting them in high school, in college, in vocational training, or in jobs. It is hoped that the youngsters will be stimulated by their summer experience to stay in high school until they graduate, and that some will go on to college or specialized training. Personal health and sanitary practices are also emphasized. Campers

are taught about various aspects of other cultures, and about the positive aspects of their own.

Camp Unico is operated by Union College under grants from the U. S. Office of Economic Opportunity to provide youngsters from low-income homes with the stimulation to further their education. The camp is the result of close cooperation between the community action agency, the public assistance agency and the school system of each of the eight counties with the camp's staff.

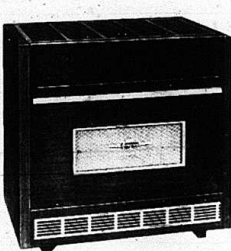

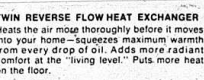

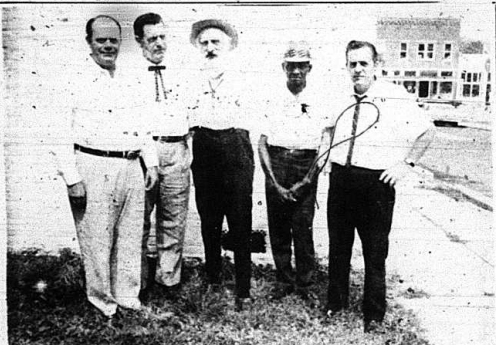
**Injured By Tractor**

Two loose ribbon rails being transported by a Louisville & Nashville freight train did an estimated \$25,000 in damage early Friday between Brush Creek and East Bernstadt.

Ribbon rails are quarter-mile long rails that are tied on 30 cars, usually in the center of a freight train. Standard rails are 39 feet long.

The two rails were among 22 designed for Coblen. They were located in the middle position of the 100 car freight.

For some undetermined reason, two of the rails came loose and gradually slipped forward, finally protruding from 20 to 30 feet outward between two of the train-cars.

The protruding rails struck everything in reach along the right-of-way between Brush Creek and East Bernstadt.

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## ASC Election Scheduled

The approaching election of ASC community committees for farm program administration in Rockcastle County was announced today by Shelle Mullins, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

The community committees assist the ASC county committee in administering the price support, programs, acreage diversion, agricultural conservation and other farm action programs in the county.

"They are particularly responsible for the administration of the various programs. Voting will be by mail, the chairman explained, and ballots are being sent to each eligible voter. Ineligible voters fall to receive a ballot through the mail, he may pick one up at the ASC office in the Courthouse at Mt. Vernon.

Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one of the programs administered by the ASC-committees. Eligibility to vote or to hold office as a committeeman is not restricted by reason of race, color, creed, or national origin.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be mailed or returned to the Rockcastle County ASC Office in Mt. Vernon, anytime before Sept. 20. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee at the ASC Office on Thursday, Sept. 22 at 9 p.m. The public is invited to witness the vote counting.

At the south city limits of Livingston, the rail cut a telephone pole in two and threw the top half on to US 25, narrowly missing a car and tying up traffic until it could be removed.

The driver, an unidentified out-of-stater, wiped the sweat from his brow; "I saw the train was going by, but didn't pay too much attention. At East Bernstadt, the trains stopped with two cars derailed, but still upright and hooked to the train. The wheels of one car were shoved backward against the back wheels, and the car rested on the bent protruding rails.

The rails apparently broke several times when they hit rocks or concrete abutments. But each time they slipped forward.

No one was injured on the train or along the route.

Said one bystander: "I'm glad I wasn't sitting at a rail crossing in a car. It would have cut it in two."

## Forest Fire Simulator In Use

A mobile forest fire simulator was used for the first time in Kentucky Aug. 15 through 19.

The newest techniques in training personnel to direct forest fire suppression were utilized to train 45 men from the Daniel Boone National Forest, Kentucky Division of Forestry and Tennessee Department of Forestry at the U. S. Forest Service Ranger Station in London.

The fire simulator consisted of an expanded trailer van with several visual aids to actually simulate a forest fire upon panoramic scenes of the Daniel Boone National Forest.

Trainees directed fire equipment and men to fight the simulated fires.

Tuition for part-time students will be \$9 per semester hour for in-state undergraduate students and \$12 per semester hour for out-of-state students. Fees per semester hour for out-of-state students will be \$22.50 for undergraduate students and \$30 for graduate students.

All courses may be audited without credit, if the student desires to do so. A wide variety of courses are planned in the areas of industrial education, health, history, mathematics, music, physical education, political science, speech, accounting, business education, economics, education, library science, and psychology. Included in the course listing are classes for the do-it-yourselfer in woodwork, power mechanics, and communication electronics.

For the adult more interested in enrichment through arts and sciences and related courses there are such offerings as: art appreciation, earth science, mental health, Kentucky history, understanding arithmetic, American political thought, accounting, shorthand, typing, rapid reading and study skills, remedial reading, audio-visual methods, children's literature and related materials and theories of personality.

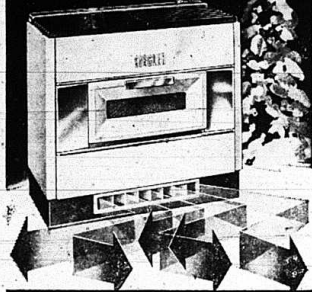

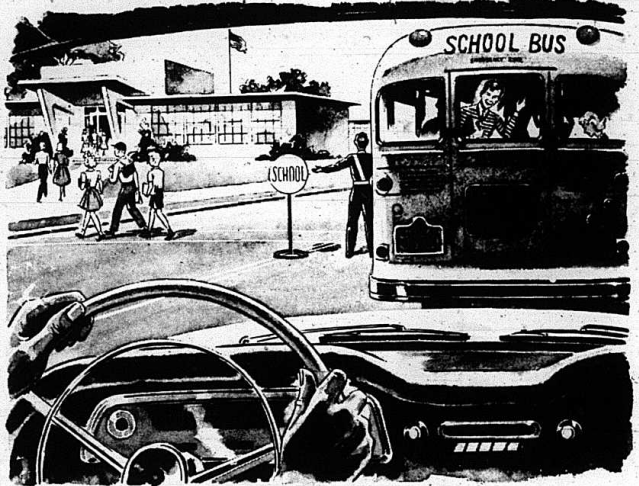
