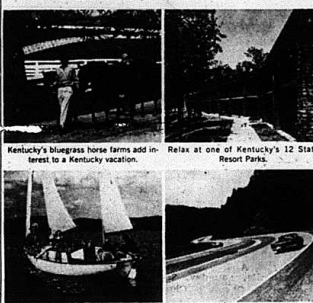

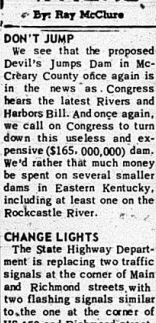
A MISTAKE

Don't Need That Dam

W. A. Duncan, president of Kentucky Utilities Co., opposed yesterday congressional authorization of Devil's Jumps Dam on the Big South Fork of Cumberland River. Duncan told a Senate public works subcommittee considering the \$165 million hydroelectric project for inclusion in an omnibus rivers and harbors bill that the money would be better spent for a series of flood control dams on other Eastern Kentucky rivers. Devil's Jumps, he said, would provide no flood protection but would displace power now produced at coal-burning steam electric plants and rob the area's coal mining industry of a major market. Duncan said the utility companies of the area are supplying and will continue to supply all power needed at reasonable rates. Devil's Jumps Dam has been turned down several times by the Senate. The latest effort to win approval of the dam came from Sen. John Sherman Cooper, long an advocate of the project.

New Road Goes Down Ky 80



The Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington has approved KY 80 between Somerset and London and the connection of a new Appalachian Highway to Interstate 75. The announcement of KY 80 as the route rather than KY 461 between Somerset and Mt. Vernon, was in keeping with a request by the State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward said. "We recognize that an improved connection between Mt. Vernon and Somerset would be valuable, and I hope that this improvement can be included in the state's program." Exactly what Commissioner Ward meant by "improved" and "in the state's program" was not learned. He said several weeks ago that he had no immediate and definite plans to upgrade KY 461, but that "time and traffic will finally demand that an improvement be made." Ronald Johnson, aid to Commissioner Ward, said this week he did not know of any change in the commissioner's thinking on the matter of KY 461, but that he felt sure KY 461 "will be improved with state funds in the secondary road program if, and as soon as practical."

Approve \$30,000 Grant

Some of the remaining money will also be used to help pay the cost of the original design of the dam, as well as other items that might become necessary, or items that would not qualify under the federal grant and loan when and if it is made. Although rumors have persisted that the project was due for approval from day to day, nothing has materialized. Latest rumor has the project up for approval Wednesday, with an announcement Thursday, or next Tuesday.

area which includes Somerset, London, Cobin, Williamsburg, Barbourville, Pineville and Middleboro are important centers.
Most persons in Mt. Vernon were inclined to believe future tourists traveling through Mt. Vernon would depend on signs that would be placed on the Renfro Valley and Burr interchanges.
Said one businessman: "If the signs read Chattanooga, Somerset, Lake Cumberland, Mt. Vernon, Renfro Valley, next exit to southbound traffic, it won't really matter whether the route is by way of London. If the state won't put the signs local businessmen can sponsor a large sign or signs designating the KY 461 route and towns as long as the sign is the prescribed distance from the interstate. We have lots of mountains, around here to put signs on." Commissioner Ward told the Signal several weeks ago he did not yet know what towns would be designated on signs at the two interchanges.

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
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
