KENTUCKY'S TOURIST INDUSTRY EXPANDS—Tourism is "big business" in Kentucky with out-of-state tourists spending more than one-quarter of a billion dollars last year, according to a report by University of Tennessee economist Dr. Lewis C. Copeland. The latest Copeland report on Kentucky tourism shows that all travel spending brought the tourist-dollar total to more than \$373 million. The 1965 figures represent a nine per cent increase over 1964 tourist spending in Kentucky and \$150 million more a year than tourist spending just one decade ago.

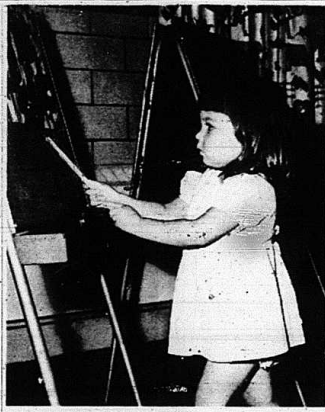

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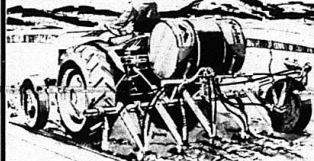

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New I-75 Bid Set On Oct. 21

Bids for grade and drain work on another section of Interstate-75 in Rockcastle County have been called for by the State Highway Department, according to an announcement by Gov. Edward Breathitt and Highway Commissioner Henry Ward.

The project will begin near the north boundary of the Cumberland National Forest and extend north to the south end of the Burr Intertange, a distance of 2.104 miles.

Bids will be opened by the State Highway Department on Oct. 21, the announcement stated.

The new section is one of the shortest to be let on the Interstate to date, and probably reflects the cost of construction in the rugged terrain.

Work on sections of the Interstate already underway is progressing rapidly.

Still to be let is the section of I-75 between the south end of the Renfro Valley Intertange and Green Hill School Road, which would include the proposed Renfro Valley Dam.

A check this week with federal officials in Washington reveals there is no planned delay on the Renfro Valley Lake project. Approval is expected, but no date as to when to expect it.

Officials said, as they have for weeks: "Any day. Don't worry."

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To Give Area Tests For State Troopers

Kentucky State Police Director, James E. Bassett, today announced that young men wishing to become State Troopers will no longer have to make the trip to Frankfort to take the necessary tests.

Testing of potential troopers is now being done on the local level at the local State Police Barracks.

Bassett said, "We were authorized to employ one hundred and twenty troopers by the 1966 General Assembly. We feel that many young men have not shown interest in becoming State Policemen because of the barriers erected by us. The distance and time involved in traveling to Frankfort, we feel, is discouraging to many; therefore, we are seeking a recruiting team to each post hoping to contact young men who want the action and the challenge of a career in modern day law enforcement with auto theft."

He further stated that no requirements were being lowered, but that the contact between the young applicant and the State Police would become much easier with the hoped for result being more applicants.

These examinations are to qualify personnel for a cadet class soon to begin at the State Police Training Academy in Frankfort, Kentucky.

The State Police list these qualifications for trooper candidates: United States citizenship; residency in the State of Kentucky; minimum age 21 to maximum age 31; minimum height of 5 feet 9 and a half inches, and minimum weight of 150 pounds; graduation from high school or possession of an equivalent education.

Applicants must also pass physical, physical agility and character examinations and have a valid Kentucky Operator's License.

Successful applicants will be employed immediately and after graduation from Cadet School, will be placed at the various posts across the State.

Livingston Police Judge William Gilford is still police judge.

A suit seeking to oust him from his police judge office was dismissed by Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar at a special hearing in Rockcastle Circuit Court Saturday.

Judge Tartar dismissed the complaint against Judge Gilford on grounds of insufficient evidence to sustain the suit.

A complaint against Judge Gilford was brought in Rockcastle Circuit Court last July by Kentucky Atty. Gen. Robert Matthews based on affidavits from three local citizens charging that Judge Gilford lived outside the city limits of Livingston and therefore was not eligible to serve as police judge according to State Statutes.

During the hearing, it was brought out that Judge Gilford did own property outside of the city limits, but that he did reside within the city limits.

Judge Tartar then accepted the testimony and dismissed the case.

Atty. Pleas Mobley represented the attorney general in the case. Atty. Fritz Krueger of Somerset represented Judge Gilford.

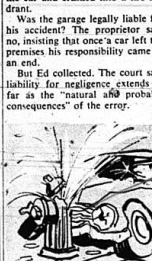
THE FAMILY LAWYER

Repairman's Blunder

When Ed's car was repaired at the corner garage, the mechanic made one small mistake: he left out part of the steering apparatus. Driving home, Ed lost control of the car and crashed into a fire hydrant.

Was the garage legally liable for his accident? The proprietor said no, insisting that once a car left the premises, his responsibility came to an end.

But Ed collected. The court said liability for negligence extends as far as the "natural and probable consequences" of the error.



Is he sure, the connection between the repair work and the accident was crystal clear in Ed's case. That is not always so. And, if you cannot establish such a connection, you cannot hold the garage liable.

This.

A nut fell into the gears of a recently repaired car, causing considerable damage. But evidence was strong that the repairman had not touched that particular nut at all.

The court finding no probable connection between the repair work and the damage, held the garage not liable.

Furthermore, the law demands reasonable care not only from the garage but also from you as the car owner. For example, if you know that a repair job is inadequate, you may be held to have "assumed the risk" of driving the car in that condition.

On the other hand, you will not be blamed if your conduct—while not perfect—was at least up to the standard of the average driver.

Take the case of a motorist whose brakes, improperly repaired, failed at the crest of a hill. When he sued later for damages, the garage owner argued:

"Even if our repair job was bad, he, the motorist, drove by his own negligence. Instead of rolling widely downhill, he should have halted it by jamming against the 'submergent' at the side of the road."

But the court placed responsibility on the garage alone. Refusing to find the motorist negligent, the court said:

"An ordinarily prudent man is not prone to remain calm, cool, and collected in an emergency, and one so imperiled is not required to make the decision which seems soundest in light of subsequent consequences."

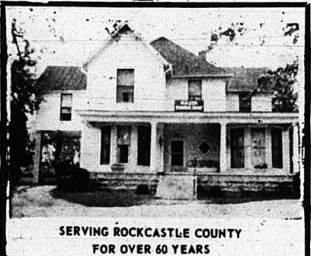

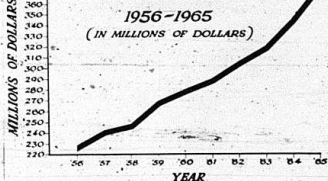

Pigs Get Select Treatment in 4-H Projects

How many pigs in the parlor? It all depends on animal scientists. Eight square feet per pig has been tried, but the answer was not conclusive. Size of the animal, season of the year and temperature are some of the variables that affect hog housing, they report.

This and other answers based on scientific experiments are sought by 4-H Club members engaged in a swine project. The day is long gone when pigs wallow in mud and get fat on scraps and leftover milk. Today, balanced ration feeding is understood and practiced.

The scientific approach is applied to modern 4-H animal projects. Besides nutrition, studies are made in genetics, biology, bacteriology and economics, to name a few. Benefiting from information supplied by the Extension Service and guided by club leaders, the young swine grower gain valuable knowledge.
