School Time Means Time For PTA

When the children start off to school, it's prime time to join the PTA.

And in this school year, PTA's throughout the country are moving forward on programs that seek to involve all parents—and other adults interested in children's welfare—in ever better education, health and opportunity for children.

"Never in its history has the PTA been more necessary to the well-being of children and our nation," says Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead, of Eugene, Ore., National PTA president. "Never have we had so rich an opportunity to move the nation to great decisions, for ideas that have come into their own."

Its goal of making preschool education available to all children, for example, is winning broad acceptance. Increasingly, too, educators realize the importance of involving parents in their children's education, something long advocated by the PTA.

This year, the PTA plans to experiment with new methods of reaching the non-participating parents—the working mother, the parent without partner, the residents of urban slums or depressed rural areas. New programs, too, will deal with children's health, safety and education.



It's off to school for Jeanette and Michael Ryan—they're first and second graders at Nettelhorst School in Chicago—and back to the PTA for Mrs. Robert W. Ryan, like millions of other Americans, a participant in PTA programs for children. Their message: It's Prime Time To Join!

One such project, undertaken in cooperation with the U. S. Public Health Service, will attempt to discourage 7th and 8th graders from starting to smoke cigarettes.

On other subjects, as well, the PTA has a full schedule of "critical issues" ripe for action.

Membership in the PTA, of course, is open to any parent or teacher or school administrator

For every parent, Mrs. Moorhead emphasized, "the PTA has an ideal assignment—to work with men and women who share your concern for children and youth, to plan and carry out projects, to enjoy a better understanding of yourself and your family, to take pride in working in an organization of national renown and international reputation."

Membership enrollment continues throughout the school year. But for parents who want to accomplish the most possible for their children, starting-to-join time is "prime time" to school the PTA.

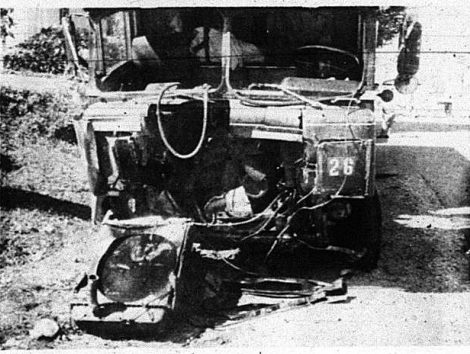

Road Men Talk With Magistrates

Officials of the Kentucky Highway Department met Oct. 4, with County Judge Wayne Van Hook and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court to seek recommendations for next year's rural road programs.

The recommendations will be used in deciding how best to use money allocated to be spent by the state in this county during the year which begins July 1, 1967. Nearly one-third of the revenue that comes into the state Road Fund each year goes to support the two rural programs.

The funds are divided among the state's 120 counties by a formula which takes into account rural area, rural population and rural road mileage.

In a statement from Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, read at the meeting, it was pointed out that the Department seeks full cooperation of the fiscal court in discharging the state's responsibility under the law for the development and administration of both programs.

The County Road Aid Program is based on a \$10 million annual appropriation. The Rural Secondary program is expected to get \$23 million next year, the entire yield from two cents of the state's seven-cent gasoline tax.

Ward's statement said that the Department aims to have programs for each of the counties worked out by Jan. 1, to allow ample time for review and approval before the beginning of the work season next spring.

WHAS Farm Director Arnold travels over 20,000 miles in Kentucky and Southern Indiana each year, gathering farm and market news for his WHAS Radio and Television audiences.

Barney is an executive committee member for the Kentucky Livestock Improvement Association, former state chairman of the Kentucky Agricultural Council, a member of the National Association of Television and Radio Farm Directors, and a member of the Indiana Farm Bureau.

HOSKA

A Delicately Sweet Bread (Makes 1 very large loaf)

1/2 cup milk	1/2 cup unsifted flour (about)
1/2 cup sugar	1/4 cup chopped blanched almonds
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/4 cup chopped citron
1/2 cup rich margarine	1/2 cup seedless raisins
1/2 cup warm water (105°-115°F.)	1 egg
2 packages of cake yeast	1/2 cup whole blanched almonds
1 active dry or compressed yeast	

Scaled milk, stir in sugar, salt, and margarine; cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 2 eggs, and 3 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in enough additional flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board, knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours.

Punch dough down. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead in chopped blanched almonds, citron, and raisins until well distributed. Roll dough into a 16-inch long rope. Place in a well greased 10 x 14 x 4-inch large loaf pan. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours.

Beat 1 egg and 1 tablespoon cold water together until well blended. Gently brush loaf with egg mixture. Decorate with whole blanched almonds.

Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 45 to 50 minutes, or until done.

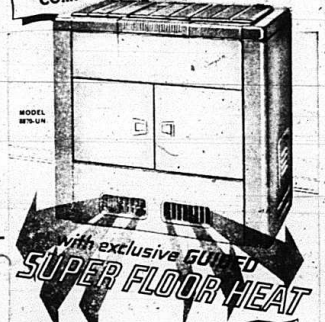

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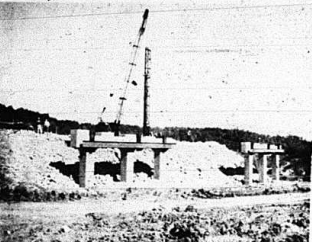
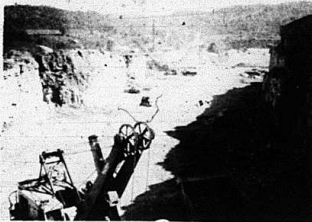

Health Notes

By: Dr. Virginia Wallace, Health Officer of Rockcastle County

Three new programs have been added to the services available at the County Health Department for the people of Rockcastle County. The Cancer detection program is for the purpose of finding cancer of the breast in women early - when it is in a treatable stage. The simplicity of the Papanicolaou smear test is of great value in finding hidden early cancer and prolonging life. It has been estimated that there would be NO deaths from cervical cancer if women would have an annual test yearly. 700 women in Kentucky died unnecessarily from this disease last year. This tragedy can be prevented in the future if women would be tested either by their family physician or at the Health Department. These tests can be obtained any Monday or Wednesday afternoon at the Health Department in the Rockcastle County Courthouse.

The second program is the Family Planning service. The purpose of this program is to promote and safeguard family health, happiness, and security through the application of birth control in order to enable parents to space the birth of their children. Also, to prevent future pregnancies if a couple feel they have a large enough family or for any reason when future pregnancies are not desired. At this clinic, the detailed information is given about the different methods available and the patient chooses the one best suited for her. This service is available to all women who want it.

The Diabetic detection program is available for all women and men seeking for it. This service should be especially used by all over 45 years of age, those related to a diabetic, those overweight and parents of large babies (9 lbs. or over at birth).

It is estimated that 83 percent of those over 45 years of age who have diabetes are unaware of it. The purpose of this program is to help find these "hidden

diabetics" early and help them get the medical treatment they need. Diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death and the third leading cause of blindness in Kentucky.

This test is a simple test taken from one drop of blood obtained from the patient's finger and is more accurate than the urine test for sugar.

On Monday, October 31, 1966, at 1:00 p.m. EST the Public Service Commission of Kentucky will hold a public hearing in the Old Capitol Annex at Frankfort on the application of the Kentucky Telephone Company to adjust and standardize its rates, and, as a part of an upgrading and service improving program, to eliminate certain multiparty service as the modernizing program is completed at each exchange.

A Summary of the Proposed Kentucky Constitution Revision as it affects Kentucky's Executive Department

ELECTED OFFICIALS The proposed Constitution Revision provides that the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and Auditor of Public Accounts shall be elected by the people. Other present state offices would be determined by the legislature.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION The Constitution Revision provides for an elected State Board of Education which will choose the Superintendent of Public Instruction. This would be a non-partisan election by districts. Now the Superintendent must seek office every four years in a partisan election.

TERMS OF OFFICE All elected officials would continue to serve four-year terms. The Constitution Revision would allow elected state government officers — the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and Auditor of Public Accounts — to be elected to two terms in succession. (The present Governor and other elected officers could not succeed themselves.)

WHEN GOVERNOR IS ABSENT FROM STATE The Constitution Revision would allow the Governor to retain his powers whenever he left the state. Under the present Constitution, the Lieutenant Governor assumes these powers any time the Chief Executive crosses the state line. And when this occurs, the Lieutenant Governor is paid the equivalent of the Governor's salary. This section is left out of the Proposed Revision, and it further stipulates that the Lieutenant Governor would be paid an annual salary for all of his duties.

WHEN THE GOVERNOR IS DISABLED The Constitution Revision provides a method for determining when a Governor's disability would occur, and what procedure would be followed.

THE GOVERNOR'S VETO POWER The time for a Governor's veto would be extended from ten to twenty days under the proposed Constitution. In all instances the legislature would have an opportunity to review and take action on a vetoed bill.

NEW ORDER OF SUCCESSION The Constitution Revision proposes that the line of succession for the chief executive shall be the Lieutenant Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, then the Speaker of the House. The 1891 Constitution calls for succession by the Lieutenant Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Secretary of State and the Attorney General, in that order.

ELECTIONS EVERY TWO YEARS As it now stands, the Constitution requires an election in Kentucky every year. In effect, we have double elections because of the importance of primaries in Kentucky. The Constitution Revision would provide for elections every two years, held on even-numbered years, at the same time U. S. Representatives are elected. The terms of office of all elected officials would be adjusted to fit the biennial elections.
