A Summary of the Proposed Kentucky Constitution Revision as it affects The Kentucky Legislature



THE ROLE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY The elected General Assembly is THE law-making body in Kentucky. The proposed Constitution Revision gives more continuity to the legislature and seeks to improve and strengthen its legislative functions.

ANNUAL 60-DAY SESSIONS The General Assembly would be in legislative session 60 days each year, rather than 60 days every other year as now provided by the Constitution. A two-thirds vote of the members could extend a session up to 30 more days.

SALARIES RATHER THAN PER DIEM PAY The revision provides for all legislators to be paid an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by law. This would replace the present "amount-per-day" method of payment for legislators.

TERMS FOR MEMBERS OF HOUSE AND SENATE The 1891 Constitution provides for two-year terms for House members and four-year staggered terms for Senators. The Constitution Revision would provide four-year staggered terms for

House members and six-year staggered terms for Senators.

ANNUAL DEBT LIMIT State debt would be limited to 2% of general fund tax revenue for the preceding fiscal year. This would replace the present debt limit of \$500,000.

PROVISION FOR INSPECTOR AND EXAMINER The General Assembly would be authorized to appoint an inspector and examiner to conduct audits and other studies of public funds, as directed by law.

ELECTIONS EVERY TWO YEARS As it now stands, the Constitution requires an election in Kentucky every year. In effect, we have double elections because of the importance of primaries in Kentucky. The Constitution Revision would provide for elections every two years, held on even-numbered years, at the same time U. S. Representatives are elected. The terms of office of all elected officials would be adjusted to fit the biennial elections.

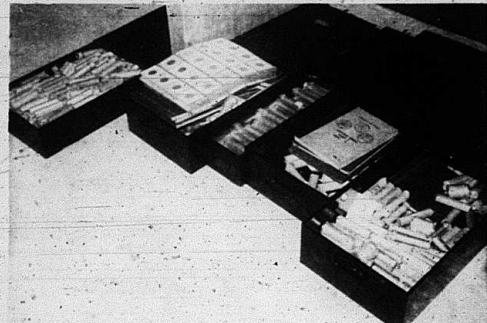

Ask PSC To Adjust Local Telephone Rates

Monthly rates for four categories of telephone service in Rockcastle County will be reduced effective Nov. 1 if the Kentucky Public Service Commission approves a rate adjustment for the Kentucky Telephone Co. at a public hearing at 1 p.m., Oct. 31 at Frankfort.

Monthly rates on one-party business; two-party business; four-party rural residence; and multi-party business will be reduced locally under the plan.

It is the first adjustment of rates by the company since 1959.

If approved, one-party business rates will be reduced from \$8.75 monthly to \$8.25. The two-party business rate will go from \$7.50 to \$7.25. Four-party rural residence service will be reduced from \$4.75 to \$4.50. Multi-party business rates will be reduced from \$6.50 to \$6.00. No other changes will be made in rates in Rockcastle.

Although Rockcastle would realize a reduced rate, other areas of Kentucky where the Kentucky Telephone Company has exchanges, were not so lucky. In many cases some areas were below the Rockcastle rates and are affected under the proposal by the company to establish uniform rates throughout its 37 exchanges in Kentucky.

Under the application, which was filed Oct. 10 with the Kentucky Public Service Commission, existing rates would be adjusted to three calling scope groups. Each group is determined by the number of telephone main stations each customer can call without involving a toll call (free calling).

The highest group of rates, presently filed by the Company, for each class of service, is proposed for Group 3, which has the highest calling scope group (2,250 or more telephones).

The second highest group of rates is proposed for calling scope Group 2 (1,001 - 2,250 telephones). The third highest group of rates is proposed for calling scope Group 1 (0 - 1,000 telephones).

In addition, each group has all the present rural four-party business and residence rates which will go into effect as the Company changes.

All the present rural eight-party lines to four-party over the next five years.

"This action will enable Kentucky Telephone Company to maintain its program of regular service improvements and to keep pace with the rapid technical advances being made in the communications industry," W. W. Thomason, president of the company said. In addition, the Company, over the next five-year period, will provide only one-party service to all customers in each exchange base rate area, and four-party service in the rural areas. This upgrading is being done at a cost of approximately \$6,000,000. Kentucky.

Local Store Target Of Court Action

Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar Wednesday issued a temporary injunction against Mt. Vernon merchant Carl Brown pending a permanent injunction that could close Brown's store for one year.

The injunction "enjoins and restrains him from sale, selling, bartering giving away spirituous liquors in violation of the local option law, or in any way violating the local option law," at his store on Richmond Street.

The court also served notice that "20 days after the summons is served the plaintiff, Commonwealth Attorney Homer Neikirk, will seek a permanent injunction and demand that the premises be padlocked."

Brown is now on bond awaiting a hearing in Rockcastle County Court on a charge of possession of alcoholic beverages for the purpose of sale. The date of that trial is Oct. 24.

In his complaint, Attorney Neikirk said that Brown "conducts and operates a grocery business and also an illegal intoxicating liquor business" at his store in a manner that has "endangered the indignation of the good citizens of Mt. Vernon and has become a public nuisance in the City of Mt. Vernon."

The complaint points out that "the premises are in close proximity to other businesses in the area, and the flagrant violation of the liquor laws on said premises has imperiled the reputation of other good and legitimate places of business, and slandered the moral reputation of the entire City of Mt. Vernon" and that "this public display of indifference to law and public opinion has shocked the moral conscience of Mt. Vernon."

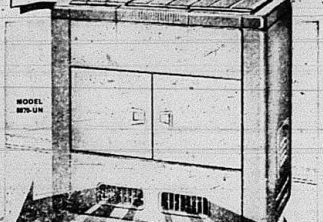

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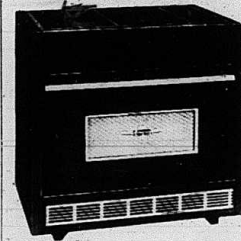

- 1 cup boiling water
- 1/2 cups enriched self-rising corn meal
- 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 2 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1/4 cup chopped dates
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 to 1 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons melted shortening
- Confectioners sugar

Soak apricots in water about 10 minutes and drain. Stir together corn meal and brown sugar in mixing bowl. Mix in 1/2 cup pecans, date and apricots. Blend egg with 1/2 cup milk and shortening or oil. Add liquid all at once to corn meal mixture and mix until well blended. If necessary, add more milk to make a medium-thick batter. Grease or paper-lined muffin cups 3/4 full. Sprinkle tops with remaining pecans. Bake in preheated 350° oven 20 to 25 minutes, or until golden brown. Remove muffins from pan and sprinkle lightly with confectioners' sugar. Serve warm or cool.
