## Million Dollar Renfro Lake Project Approved

### Election Next Tuesday

Rockcastle County voters will go to the polls Nov. 8 to elect a senator, representative, two members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, and to vote on a new Constitution.

Polls will open at 6 a. m., and close at 6 p. m.

Probably "closest to home" will be the local school board election for voters in Education District 1 and 3.

In District 1, incumbent board member, Mrs. Vashti Mullins, the widow of Otto Mullins, is opposed by Murphy Martin Jr., plant superintendent of Armour at Mt. Vernon.

In District 3, incumbent board member, Preston Nunneley, who has been on the board for eight years, and is an employee of the Lexington Bluegrass, is opposed by Bradley Saylor, secretary of the Rockcastle Falm Bureau until he retired a few weeks ago.

In the senatorial race, incumbent Sen. John Sherman Cooper, Republican, is opposed by State Rep. John Young Brown, Democrat.

In the Fifth District race for Representative, incumbent Reps. Tim Lee Carter is opposed by Eugene C. Harter Jr.

Voters will vote "yes" or "no" on whether they want a new Constitution for the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

### Circuit Court Opens Nov. 21

A total of 60 rockcastle County citizens have been called for Rockcastle Circuit Court duty when court opens at 10 a. m., Nov. 21, with Judge R. C. Tartar on the bench.

Probably some of the most complicated cases in the history of the court will be heard this session.

Mrs. Laura Pigg, charged with the "willful murder" of her husband, John Pigg, has her case set for Nov. 25. Mr. Pigg was shot to death last summer in a lane on his farm.

### J. P. Hopkins Shot To Death

Crab Orchard Police Chief Elmer Brock was released on \$5,000 bond in Rockcastle County Court Tuesday after he was charged with the "willful murder" of a former Rockcastle County man.

Shot to death was James Phillip Hopkins, 21, of Piqua, Ohio, and Bryansville near Crab Orchard.

Chief Brock waived a preliminary hearing and the case was bound over to the Nov. 21 Rockcastle Grand Jury.

Brock told police he began pursuing Hopkins' car in Crab Orchard to issue a traffic citation. He said he followed Hopkins through Brodhead.

### VIRGIL MULLINS GETS DIPLOMA

Virgil Mullins, former member of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, told the Signal Tuesday he has received his high school diploma through the adult education program.

Mr. Mullins' high school education was the focal point of a suit last year brought by Atty. Gen. Robert Matthews. The attorney general used to replace Mr. Mullins on the board because he did not have a high school education according to State Statutes.

Mr. Mullins resigned several months later rather than lose his right to be a school board candidate at a future date. If a person is removed by law from the board he cannot run for office again.

Mr. Mullins did not say if he would be a board candidate in 1968, now that he has his diploma.

### Dam & Lake What We Get

The facts on the Renfro Valley Dam and Lake will be important to the future growth of the area.

The dam itself will cost the State of Kentucky about \$384,500.

The design of the dam will be paid for by the city and will cost about \$5,000.

The dam will be an earth and rockfill dam with the existing average ground elevation of 924.0'. The dam will be approximately 1,200 feet long, and the midpoint road elevation will be 993.0'.

The dam will be on property now owned by Jones Hiatt.

The state will construct the spillway and will reroute all existing roads that will be covered by the lake, as well as construct necessary roads to property owners who will be cut off by the lake.

The dam will now have flood gates for cleaning and draining the lake should it become necessary. Recently, Gov. Edward Breathitt allocated the city \$30,000 for the gates, and for use on other necessary items. The money came from the Division of Natural Resources.

The lake will cover approximately 470 acres at pool stage—an elevation of 970.0'. The lake will have two main fingers and will be approximately 18,000 feet long. The average width of the lake will be about 1,200 feet. It will have eight miles of shoreline. It will be the largest impoundment on I-75 between Detroit, Mich. and Mt. Vernon.

The lake will be used for water for the city of Mt. Vernon and the surrounding area.

It will also be used for boating, fishing, swimming, and for use on other necessary items. The money came from the Division of Natural Resources.

### Paying It Back

Everything borrowed must be paid back, and the City of Mt. Vernon must pay back \$474,000 that it must borrow as its share of the \$1,184,000 Renfro dam and lake project.

As it did when it borrowed \$410,000 to construct its sewer system, the city will finance its water project with revenue bonds. These bonds are paid back through charges for water.

There will be a change in water rates now that the city has added \$474,000 to its indebtedness.

Mayor Clyde Linville said when asked that present water customers inside the city limits will not get an increased base water rate. The base rate will remain at \$3.30 for 2,000 gallons.

He said the City Council would have to change water rates. To date, the council has not acted.

On the record, several figures will be of interest. The estimated annual income of the city, based on a future \$200 water customers and 400 sewer customers, and without the new Renfro project, is \$79,952.28.

The estimated annual operation cost of the water and

A \$1,184,000 grant and loan approved by the Economic Development Administration assures Mt. Vernon of a dam and lake at Renfro Valley.

The long-awaited announcement that the federal government had made a grant of \$710,000 and a loan of \$474,000 was made last Friday in a telegram from Sen. John Sherman Cooper and Rep. Tim Lee Carter.

The Mt. Vernon City Council will meet at 7:30 p. m., Thursday to accept the offer of the grant and loan.

The telegram announcing the approval was actually routine. The first indication that the EDA had approved the project came from Don Brockman, aid to Senator Cooper, on Thursday when he telephoned the Signal to relay the news. The Signal asked that telegram of the approval be sent to key people in Mt. Vernon.

There was not a great deal of surprise when Mr. Brockman called the news. About two weeks ago, John Whisman, state's representative on the Appalachian Regional Commission, telephoned Mayor Clyde Linville that the project was approved but that the announcement would be delayed a few days.

The announcement brought a sigh of relief from local people interested in the dam, even though most felt that the license interest in the project, approved by the State Highway Department, and especially Commissioner Henry Ward, had virtually assured its approval. Commissioner Ward had delayed bids, on the Renfro section of Interstate-75 several times in order to wait for approval of the dam.

The history of the dam and lake is a history of hope tinged with frustration.

The first mention of the possibility of the dam came in mid-1964 during planning of Interstate-75 by the State Highway Department.

At that time, Commissioner Ward called a public hearing at Renfro Valley and told those who attended that he would be willing to request the Federal Bureau of Roads to build a highway fill dam across Renfro Creek instead of bridges. If the sponsoring agency would furnish the land that would be underwater, and the difference in cost between the bridges and a dam.

The commissioner pointed out at that time that the project would help the economy of the area as well as beautify I-75. He noted that recreation and additional water would be prime factors.

The City of Mt. Vernon then became the sponsoring agency for the project. On March 19, 1965, very little was heard from the project.

At that time, Mayor Linville began an intense campaign that was to guide the city along the path to the final approval, aided by Commissioner

A favorite of tourists whose New York friends "know" the city, the Feenon is a no-alcohol cafe where beatniks and neotniks sit side by side to enjoy lively Mediterranean music played on exotic instruments. One can stay until 2 a. m. for only \$1.50 hearing haunting rhythms from Greece, Israel and Arab countries.

However, appealing to the desire of some Greenwich Village residents to keep the neighborhood quiet by keeping the tourists out, a few local political leaders—who gained power, oddly enough, as "reformers"—are pressing to force the Feenon to move away.

The last hope of budget-minded tourists and music lovers at the Feenon, where black coffee is the strongest drink you can buy, is that New York's ingenious mayor, John Lindsay, who is sometimes mentioned as having national leadership potential, will find a way to keep the musical landmark open without causing him to suffer at the hands of the city's entrenched political enemies.

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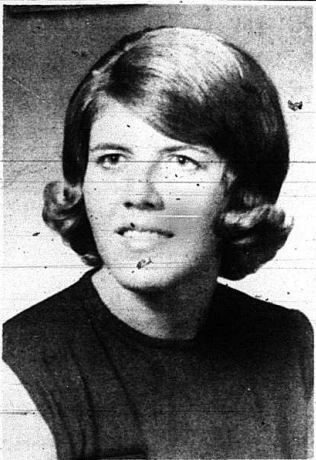

Your Board of Education and I believe in sound financial dealings. Your school account has been in the Bank of Mt. Vernon all these years. You may call the President of the Bank of Mt. Vernon (Mr. N. M. Smeck) in regard to these facts if you like. Our bookkeeper (Mr. Lloyd G. Shutts) will be glad to show you his books and audit reports at any time.

If you wish to continue to have your schools operated in this business-like manner; to stay within the budget; and not raise your taxes then keep Mr. Preston P. Nunnelle and Mrs. Vashti Mullins on your Board of Education.
