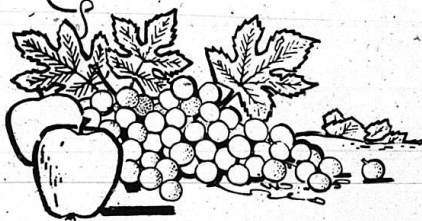

## Council Votes To Take Grant

An offer of \$1,184,000 to finance the Renfro Lake project was accepted by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a meeting Thursday night. The council accepted a \$710,000 grant and a \$474,000 loan from the Economic Development Administration that will lead to a 470 acre lake on Renfro Creek at Renfro Valley; a new water plant, storage tanks, and waterline extensions to three areas of the county that do not have a central water supply. The lake will also be used for boating, swimming, and fishing in accordance with agreements with the Economic Development Administration which is interested in the tourist development of the area, as well as the industrial development. At the same meeting, the council accepted plans and specifications of Crawford and Crawford, engineers, as approved by the EDA. In a third piece of necessary business, the Council agreed to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity from the Kentucky Public Service Commission asking that the new water system be allowed and setting rates for water users, both a formality. Rates to water customers inside the city limits will remain at \$3.30 per 2,000 gallons. The sewer bill will remain at half the water bill, or a base rate of \$1.65 for a total water-sewer base rate of \$4.95. The city will ask the commission to set a \$4.95 rate for water customers outside the city limits, corresponding with the water-sewer rate now in effect inside the city limits. But customers outside the city limits will be able to use more water for their money. The rate will be \$4.95 for 5,000 gallons, as compared to 2,000 gallons for customers inside the city limits. To date no announcement has come from the State Highway Department as to when a contract will be awarded for the section through Renfro Valley which includes the highway fill dam. Most observers still say it will probably be in December.

## Three Arrested For Assault

Three Somerset youths were arrested Saturday night after a Mt. Vernon boy filed a complaint with the Kentucky State Police charging the trio "roughed him up" and threw him out of a car on KY 461 near Mt. Vernon. The incident started after a chase through the eastern part of Somerset were Mitchell Ray Abbott, 20, Phillip Wayne Nevels, 19, and a 16 year old juvenile. Nevels was charged with driving while intoxicated and no operator's license. Abbott was charged with public drunkenness and drinking beer on a highway. A charge of drinking beer on the highway was placed against the juvenile. Donnie Warf, 16, of Mt. Vernon told police the trio gave him a ride as he walked along US 150. Later, after the car had turned into KY 461 he said he was assaulted and thrown from the car. State Trooper George Hall reported. Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Frank Deborde and State Trooper Danny Coleman followed Nevels car to Somerset Trooper Hall, on duty there, picked up the car in East Somerset. City police assisted in the arrest.

# Saylor Pulls Board Upset; Mrs. Mullins Is Re-elected

Bradley Saylor, former secretary of the Farm Bureau, won a stunning upset victory in Tuesday's Rockcastle County Board of Education election when he defeated incumbent member, Preston Nunneley by 20 votes in District 3. In the other board race, incumbent member, Mrs. Vashli Mullins, of Livingston, managed to squeak by over Murphy Martin Jr., by a scant 22 votes in District 1. For Mr. Saylor, his victory was startling in that supporters of the present school administration, put their prestige on the line and made a supreme effort to re-elect Mr. Nunneley. That everyone was out working in the school election, there was no doubt. Both sides had their strong supporters. At times there were so many poll workers that voters had to park their cars far away from the polls and push their way through the crowd. For most part, the school board races overshadowed all other voting in Rockcastle, since most voters had already decided in their own mind to re-elect Sen. John Sherman Cooper and Rep. Tim Lee Carter would be re-elected, and the new Constitution was headed for a smashing defeat. Issues in the school election were simple. Supporters of Mr. Nunneley pointed out the past record of the administration and made no proposals for the future. Both Mr. Nunneley and Mrs. Mullins had nothing to say. Mr. Saylor and Mr. Martin and their supporters had more to say, but generally and most frequently, they told voters that the board was closed to the public, and that the public didn't know what was going on. Both sides soft-pedaled the issue of a new central high school. Nation-wide and statewide, the Republicans scored important and substantial victories. Senator Cooper appeared headed for a victory in excess of 200,000 votes. Rep. Tim Lee Carter also scored a landslide victory over his opponent. The new Constitution did not carry in a single county in Rockcastle County, but a different method would have to be found to remedy the present one. In Rockcastle County, Cooper received 2,841 votes, John Y. Brown got 907. Representative Carter got 2,367, and his opponent Hart received 694. In the Constitution voting in the county, "no" votes totalled 3,072. "Yes" votes totalled 463. In the school board race, Mr. Saylor received 490. His opponent Mr. Nunneley got 470. In District 1, Mrs. Mullins received 397 and her opponent, Mr. Martin got 375. In both cases, the winners scored a victory because of one precinct. Mr. Saylor carried Bullock precinct heavily to tip the scales. Mrs. Mullins carried West Livingston, hardly to give her the margin of victory. **Poverty Funds**

Federal war on poverty funds granted in Rockcastle County in the last 18 months amount to \$139,530, according to Gov. Edward T. Breathitt.

Breathitt said the Kentucky Office of Economic Opportunity, a branch of his office, listed these projects and funds provided directly to the county by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964: Head Start classes in Rockcastle County received \$112,000 for the two summers with 478 children attending during the two terms.

Adult basic education for 166 persons was made possible through grants totaling \$13,140.

Individual loan to six persons amounted to \$14,300, provided through the rural loan program administered by the

Farmers Home Administration.

In addition, Rockcastle County shares in the \$127,300 grant to the Appalachian Volunteers, Inc. for a tutoring program and remodeling schools.

Albert Whitehouse, director of the Kentucky O.E.O., said that in the last 18 months Kentucky has received \$83,490,883 in Federal anti-poverty funds to provide educational, cultural, and vocational opportunities, plus a rural loan program and funds to organize areas and hire personnel to mobilize public and private agencies and citizens in combating poverty.

Whitehouse said statewide funds allocated during this period amount to \$8,187,538 for Head Start Programs; \$15,547,553 for Community Action programs; \$9,215,213
