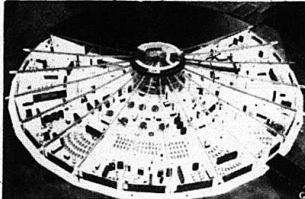

SCHOOLS THROUGH THE AGES



A CIRCULAR SCHOOL FOR ALL SEASONS—The new Douglas MacArthur Elementary school in Southfield, Michigan, is built around an electronic learning center. The circular design has drastically cut down corridors and other wasted space. A totally new electric heating system will allow the school to be heated at about half the cost possible with a conventional system. (Designed by St. Cyr Architect and Associates of Livonia, Michigan.)

Ever since the ancient daughters in the night way to Chinese instructed their unwarp silk cocoons, people

have been worrying about how and what to teach their children. When the fathers of classical Athens growled at their sons' report cards, they were looking at marks in javelin throwing, jousting and chariot racing—as well as in philosophy and music.

Today: all electric classrooms—blackboards that aren't black—electronic teaching aids—What's going on? Simply this—formal education in America has become one of the fastest growing and most rapidly changing fields of culture.

The United States now has more schools than any other country in the world. And with new teaching aids and methods, and more pleasant and flexible classrooms, educators have found that the learning process can be speeded up considerably. For example, the clanking radiators and uncomfortable classrooms that you may remember as a student are only a legend for present-day pupils who attend the more than 2,000 all-electric schools in the nation.

These students enjoy the comforts of flameless electric heating and air conditioning—complete with room-by-room temperature control. Moreover, conservative estimates made by The Electrification Council put the number of schools utilizing clean, efficient total electrical services by the end of next year at more than 3,000.

The latest development: All-electric mobile classrooms are relieving overcrowded school conditions in many parts of the U.S.

National 4-H Club Congress



This scene will be repeated in November in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago Stock Yards. Shown here are young citizens from every state who attended the 1965 National 4-H Club Congress. The 1966 program in the huge area will again pay tribute to the 2 1/4 million 4-H youth throughout the nation.

SIXTEEN HUNDRED of the nation's finest youth will open the 45th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago on Sunday, November 27. They will represent the 50 states and Puerto Rico. A group of Canadian 4-Hers will be special guests. About 700 adults associated with 4-H Club work also are expected to attend.

The Congress will open with an impressive program based on the 1966 theme: Pursuit of Excellence.

The keynote speaker will be a woman who has pioneered a long list of "firsts" for women and who will add yet another "first" to her impressive record. She will be the first woman ever to keynote the opening assembly of the National 4-H Club Congress, now in its 45th year.

She is Mary G. Roebling, chairman of the board of Trenton Trust Company, Trenton, N.J. She is first board chairman of a major commercial bank and the first woman governor of the American Stock Exchange.

Mrs. Roebling is one of the nation's outstanding women in finance, public service, social and educational activities. A widow, she has a married son and daughter and five grand-children, so she seems to be well qualified as a parent to speak to a teenage audience.

Before the 4-Hers leave home, they are oriented as to what they will encounter on the trip to Chicago, which for many will be the first time away

from home. They will travel by bus, train or plane. They will be briefed on staying in a large hotel, social events, educational programs, sightseeing and shopping on their own.

The delegates' main session will feature talks and panel discussions on the pursuit of excellence. Every boy and girl who attends the Congress is sponsored by a business concern or private enterprise. The sponsor also is host to the young people during the weeklong event.

It is traditional that the 4-H Congress be held during the same week as the International Live Stock Exposition, although none of the delegates show animals here. Some may have in previous years, but it is a Congress rule, the delegates cannot be exhibitors.

However, they do visit the Exposition on Wednesday afternoon and evening as guests of the International management.

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A WATER LINE APPROXIMATELY ONE MILE NORTH OF MT. VERNON ON U. S. HIGHWAY NO. 25.

WHEREAS, the City of Mt. Vernon is in the process of arranging to finance the construction of a waterworks project, consisting of extensions, additions and improvements to the municipal waterworks system of the City, and

WHEREAS, it is considered necessary and desirable for the City to approve the construction of a water line approximately one mile north of Mt. Vernon on U. S. Highway No. 25 for the purpose of making water service available to a proposed new Holiday Inn Motel.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

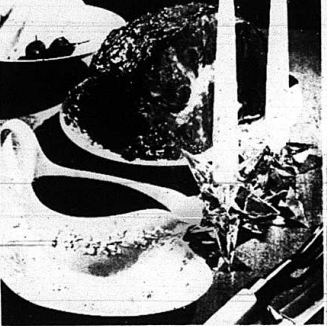

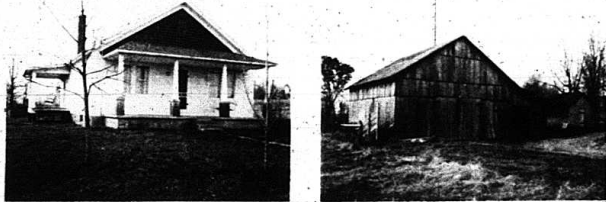
