Help Available On Medicare

Individuals age 65 and over who need help in filing their claims for Medicare coverage can secure this assistance free of charge from especially trained personnel by contacting the Lexington Social Security District Office located at 950 Winchester Road, 40505.

The Medicare program consists of two parts: (1) Hospital Benefits and (2) Medical Benefits.

The Medicare program will help pay for hospital care when the doctor sends a patient in any hospital taking part in the health insurance program. The patient will not have to file a claim for his hospital expenses. The hospital files the claim and Medicare pays direct to the hospital. The hospital may, however, bill the patient for the \$40 deductible and for other services not covered under the program.

Under the Medical Benefits, the patient pays a premium of \$3 monthly and the Government pays an equal amount. Medical insurance will help pay the doctors' bills for services received after the patient has incurred medical expenses amounting to \$50. Personnel at the Lexington, Social Security District Office will assist—free of charge—anyone who needs help in filing his claim. The District Office is open on Friday nights until 9 p.m. to accommodate those who are working.

Tobacco Stripping

Use care in stripping tobacco crops this year, says Ira Munnice, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service agronomy tobacco specialist.

"The crop was harvested later than normal this year, some places as much as four weeks later," he says. "Many crops still are curing out. We have seen a good many 'flat stems' in barns this season. This tobacco should not be stripped out until the stems are dry and the crop is ready for such stripping."

Deliveries to market will start in mid-November, he noted, which means Kentucky farmers have plenty of time to strip their crops and sell them this season. "The market will be open on January (1967) and it is expected to be good that month."

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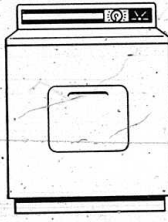

Thanksgiving Tourney Set

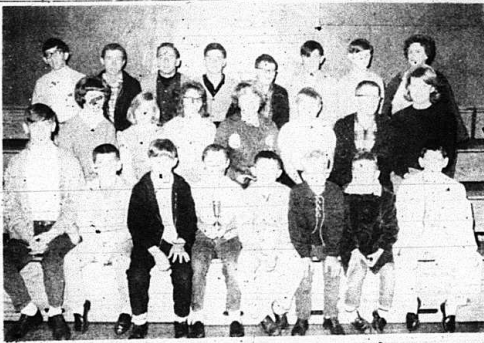

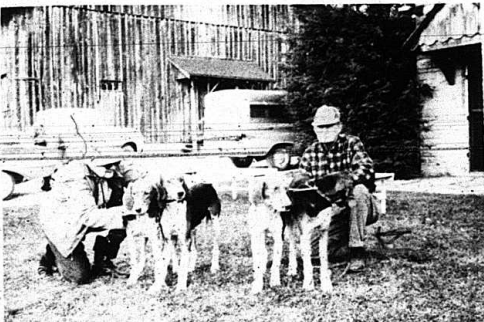

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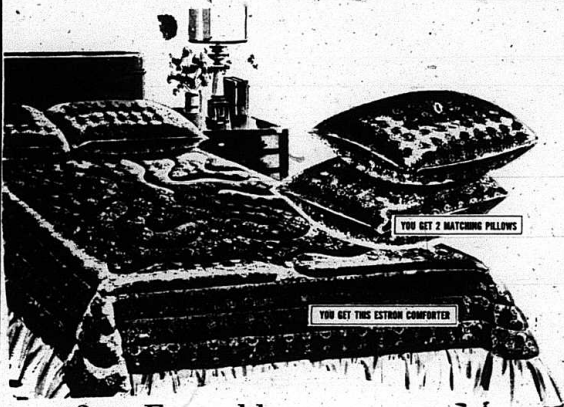

Ordinance

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A WATER MAIN AND SEWER MAIN, APPROXIMATELY ONE MILE NORTH OF MT. VERNON ON U.S. HIGHWAY NO. 25.

WHEREAS, the City of Mt. Vernon is in the process of arranging to finance the construction of a waterworks project, consisting of extension of water mains and improvements to the municipal waterworks system of the City, and WHEREAS, it is considered necessary and desirable for the City to approve the construction of a water line approximately one mile north of Mt. Vernon on U.S. Highway No. 25 for the purpose of making water service available to a proposed new Holiday Inn Motel.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. That it hereby authorizes and approves the construction of a water line approximately one mile north of Mt. Vernon on U.S. Highway No. 25 for the purpose of making water service available to a proposed new Holiday Inn Motel to be constructed approximately one mile north of Mt. Vernon.

2. That this City Council hereby authorizes and approves such construction to be made as a part of its current project for the construction of extensions, additions and improvements to the municipal waterworks system, financed by the City of Mt. Vernon.

3. That the Mayor and other authorized officials of the City be, and they are, hereby authorized and empowered to take all necessary action to implement the provisions of this Ordinance.

4. That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

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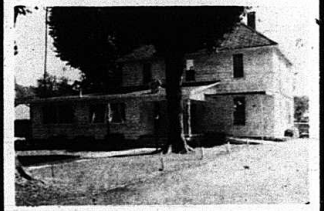
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
