Governor Plans Road Ceremony At Conway

"Probably one of my last ceremonial duties as governor will be to repeat this highway dedication ceremony down at Conway next year," Gov. Edward Breathitt told some 500 persons on hand at the Berea Interchange of Interstate-75 Nov. 23 to see him, and other state officials, open a 1 1/2 mile segment between Richmond and Berea.

The governor forecast completion of all Interstate-75 construction in the state by Thanksgiving Day 1969 and added that "the action we took here today will hopefully save the lives of some motorists."

The chief executive said the segment of the superhighway between the Berea Interchange and Conway would be open for traffic next summer, and "I'll be down at Conway to open this section. It will probably be one of my last ceremonial duties as governor."

He said another section around Mt. Vernon would probably be open next fall, and a 20-mile section between the North Cabin Interchange and the gockcastle River is scheduled for letting in the fall of 1967.

The governor noted that because of a late project at Renfro Valley, a section of I-75 between Green Hill School Road and the Renfro Valley Interchange would be delayed. He said the new highway would be connected to US 25 at Conway and again just south of the Renfro Valley Interchange.

He said he would like to see the Renfro Valley section since it will contain the Renfro Valley Dam and a 475-acre federally-sponsored structure when you go down there to see John Lair and the Renfro Valley Barn Dance, you can take a boat and fishing pole along with you and do a little fishing," the governor said.

Whitley County was in front at all the stops 16-15, 30-27, 48-37 and the final 72-48.

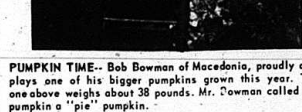

Residents who are contacted are urged to complete the questionnaire as soon as possible.

"One of the best methods of finding out about the community is through the people who live there. Here is an opportunity for you to say what you think about the community. You do not have to sign your name. We ask for your cooperation in this survey," Mr. Bullock said.

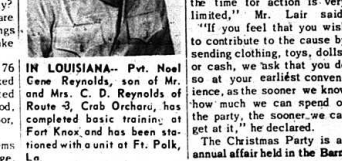

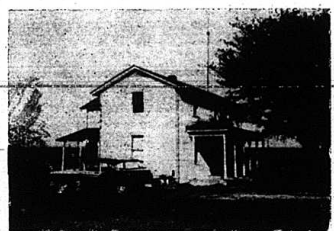
