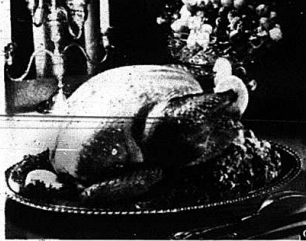

1 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
1/2 teaspoon basil

In medium skillet, brown sausage well; remove and drain on absorbent paper. Drain fat from skillet, reserving one table- spoon; add onion and saute until tender. In large bowl, combine bottled real Italian dressing, bread crumbs, eggs, parsley, Parmesan cheese and basil. Add crumb mixture and sausage to onion in skillet and cook about 1 minute, or until mixture begins to set, but is still moist. Makes 2 quarts stuffing for an 8 to 12 pound turkey.

# Corn Boerer Found In Kentucky Area

The trial of Elmer (Dutch) Brock of Crab Orchard for the willful murder of Phillip Hopkins was continued until Dec. 20 in Rockcastle Circuit Court Friday.

The southwestern corn boer, a destructive pest of corn not hitherto reported in Kentucky,

usually break off so that harvest by mechanical pickers is "next to impossible."

Insecticides have not been effective against this pest, Dr. Miller says.

Along the northern limits of the borer's distribution, early planting and early harvesting generally are the most efficient and economical ways to prevent plant damage and yield losses.

Deep fall diskling of crop residue helps reduce the overwinter population; this exposes below-ground plant parts to winter weather and biological control factors.

Plant resistance seems the ultimate ideal way to control the pest, other state researchers say. This breeding program has been underway now several years, with some success in new lines.

## New Vocational School Approved By State Board

The State Board of Education has approved spending \$450,000 for a new vocational school to serve Rockcastle and Southern Madison counties.

The construction of the school is expected to start some time next year, or when state and federal money on a 50-50 basis becomes available. The state pays 40 per cent, the federal government 40 per cent, and the Rockcastle School System 20 per cent.

The building is expected to cost \$375,000 and the equipment \$75,000.

A total of 35 acres will be needed for the site. The site will be chosen by a committee of county people. The State Department of Build-

ings and Grounds must also approve the site selection.

No local tax money will be used to finance the school. Money for the local share will come from the school system's capital outlay fund.

The new school will be staffed by the State Department of Education. The department also pays for the operation of the school.

To date, a total of 312 students from Rockcastle County and 182 from Southern Madison County have signed to attend the school. There will also be a program for drop-outs as well as an adult program.

A survey to determine the number of children who

wanted to attend the school, and a survey of the educational needs of the area was made by the local Office of Economic Opportunity.

The new school is one of three new vocational schools by the State Board of Education to be built when the \$1,025,000 becomes available. The others are at Carrollton and Harrodsburg.

The Board also announced it would spend \$1,650,000 to expand its vocational schools at Somerset, Harlan and Paintsville.

## I-75 A 'Must' Tinder Says

State Highway Commissioner Mitchell Tinder has listed Interstate-75 construction in Rockcastle County as "top priority."

The announcement apparently put a halt to speculation in the county that a setback of federal funds for highway construction by Pres. Lyndon Johnson would affect I-75 projects, including the Renfro Valley Dam.

The commissioner said funds are already available for work in Rockcastle County.

Mayor Clyde Linville added a little this week when he said he was informed that bids on the Renfro Section of the superhighway would be awarded about one month later.

Commissioner Tinder listed "must" projects in Rockcastle as follows:

- A total of 8.8 miles of paving from Berea to Conway;
- 3 miles of paving from the south end of the proposed Renfro Valley Interchange to the Burr Interchange; and
- grade and drain of 3.4 miles from Green Hill School Road through the Renfro Valley Interchange.

Commissioner Tinder said surfacing of two of the projects is necessary to replace badly congested segments of US 25 between Berea and Mt. Vernon.

The section to be graded, between the two sections to be paved, "has been delayed because construction had to be coordinated with plans for the Renfro Valley dam and reservoir," Mr. Tinder said.

## City Hits Lake Money Snag

The city of Mt. Vernon must come up with 200 prospective new water customers with \$100 hook-on fees paid in advance before interim financing for the Renfro water project can be arranged.

This gloomy prospect was thrust upon by the city council at a called meeting Tuesday night.

The \$75 hook-on fee and \$25 water meter deposit must come from residents who expect to take water in areas not now served, but who would be served when the City water project is completed.

The council needs the interim financing so it can go ahead and purchase land that will be underwater when the lake is formed. The council must borrow money from a bank to tide it over until the first government check arrives.

Generally, the new water customers are along six roads; along US 150 between Mt. Vernon and Hamm's Drive-In Restaurant at Mareburg; along US 25 south to Burr near the residence of Pansy McKay; north along Brush Creek Road between Burr and Maple Grove School; along US 25 to Renfro Valley near Negro Town Road to near the residence of Bradford Howard; and along Rowe Road from a junction with US 25 about one mile south of Mt. Vernon.

The council, hoping to come up with nearly \$200,000 in cash, said it would have to lease hook-up to the prospective water customers.

The council explained that if areas now expecting to be served fail to come up with the necessary hook-on fees, the council has no alternative but to drop all or part of one area and pick up customers in another area outside the city limits.

To use an example, if 10 persons have signed to take water along one road, but only four can come up with the fees, then the council would have to drop the 10 and pick up an area where five or six persons have the available money, even though the city had not planned to serve the new areas.

## Rainfall Here Over 4 Inches

The rains came to Rockcastle County last week in just about every shape and form.

There were slow soakers, downpours, mists, deluges, showers, and sprinkles.

And when it was all over Saturday, Mt. Vernon had had 4.07 inches between Dec. 5 and 10, or .02 of an inch more than the entire month of November when 4.05 inches fell, according to Bill Cox, who keeps Weather Bureau records at Mt. Vernon.

Naturally, clouds were there and they were still there Tuesday, but the Weather Bureau was predicting fair and cool weather with a gradual warming trend through the week end.

Speaking of clouds, there were only a few short minutes one day between Dec. 3 and 13 when there was sunshine.

It was one of the longest rains in many a day at Mt. Vernon. The rain sent creeks out of bounds started springs flowing that had been dry for months, and generally "updated" the water supply that sorely needed updating.

Said one Renfro Valley resident: "If there'd been a dam across Renfro Valley, Lake Linville would have been full."

Water backed into the grandstand at Renfro Valley, and poured over into the pond in front of Renfro Creek, bottomland was either underwater or soggy.

And it stayed warm the entire time. Had the rain been snow, area residents would have still been digging out.

There were no reports of flooding that damaged property.

## Gets Grant

The City of Mt. Vernon will receive a \$4,118 grant under the Urban Planning Assistance Program to aid in its program of comprehensive planning for growth and development.

Approval of the grant was announced this week by Sect. Robert C. Weaver, of the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The share for the city of Mt. Vernon was included in a total of \$74,570 allocated to the Commonwealth of Kentucky to help in planning programs in some 25 localities.

Mt. Vernon has had its planning program underway for several months, aided by planning engineers from the state.

Actually, Mt. Vernon will not receive the money directly. It will go to the State Division of Community Planning and Development as Mt. Vernon's share in the program for the next 24 months.

Grants under the Urban Planning Assistance Program are authorized by Section 701 of the Housing Act of 1954, as amended.

The grants may be used in small cities and counties to help pay for planning work such as the preparation of base maps, analysis of land use, population and economic conditions, preparation of a comprehensive development plan, and measures to implement this planning, such as zoning and subdivision regulations.

John Cox, Mt. Vernon hardware dealer, has been appointed to head the annual Memorial-Destroyth Drive for Rockcastle County.

It is the second year he has headed the drive.

Mr. Cox will distribute canisters in and around Brodhead, Mt. Vernon, and Livingston during December.
