He said it was improper to drum up business in a way that shut off the public sidewalk and blocked access to adjacent stores.

Local historians will probably call the Christmas of 1966 the Christmas Catastrophe.

It came nearly being just that when a massive traffic migration from the North, combined with a seven-inch snowfall to clog highways Friday night and send motorists into any shelter they could find.

The rush of traffic, homebound bound for the holidays, caused one death in Rockcastle.

Mrs. Sarah Bishop of Cincinnati, Ohio, was killed when the auto in which she was a passenger left US 25 south of Livingston and crashed over an embankment. Her husband, and another passenger, were not injured. She died shortly after being admitted to the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

It was the same story--snow along Interstate-75 and US 25 from south of Clay's Ferry, North of Clay's Ferry and west of Harrodsburg there was no snow.

Eastward in the Kentucky mountains, there was more snow than in Rockcastle. There was 12 inches in Pineville, Beaufort, and Middleboro.

It was actually the increase of traffic that caused the jam rather than the snowfall. Traffic was nearly as heavy as it was July 4 when it caused one of the worst jams in history along US 25. The snow began as a fine mist about 9 a.m., Friday. By 11 a.m., the ground was white and roads were wet.

By afternoon, the snow became heavier. So did the traffic, and by 6 p.m., it was bumper-to-bumper along US 25.

The local State Highway Department began to get ready during the afternoon. Out came the salt and cinders, along with the scrapers.

Then the unbelievable happened. Traffic became so heavy the state trucks were unable to get on to the road. Trucks and cars began stalling and sliding crossways on the hills. Other vehicles tried to go around the stalled cars. Soon the cars became two lanes of traffic going south. All northbound traffic was blocked.

All through the night there were two lanes of traffic along Richmond Street and through downtown Mt. Vernon. Three-lane hills became five lanes of traffic going south. It was the same story south of Mt. Vernon.

Soon it became an all-night drive from London and Berea. Between Richmond and Berea, nearly 1,500 motorists were stranded, while I-75 became six and seven lanes of traffic moving south.

Hotels and motels quickly filled as motorists sought shelter.

But the motels could not take care of the overflow, and advised radio stations to ask residents to open their homes

The Cause

Where did all the snow come from? After all, there was only going to be a "few flurries," said the Weather Bureau.

It was explained this way: A high pressure area was stationed over the northern half of the United States shoveling cold air down across Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, and other southern states. A low pressure area crossed from Texas through the southern United States.

The cold front brought cold air down from Canada. The low pressure area brought warm Gulf of Mexico winds northward.

The cold air and the warm air clashed over Kentucky and Tennessee, formed moisture, and fell as snow. Rockcastle County was just on the edge of the whole mixing zone and got the snow.

Tuesday the Weather Bureau predicted all of Kentucky would escape heavy snow connected with another storm center that formed Sunday and Monday in the southwest.

But Kentucky got rain, Tuesday an inch of it during Tuesday night. The prediction for Thursday is cloudy and cold with the possibility of a few snow flurries.

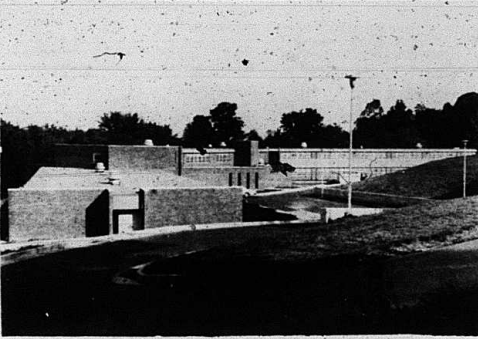
Mr. and Mrs. Jack Laswell won the residential category in the annual Meridian Women's Christmas Lighting Contest.

Laurel Heights Asset To This Area

Laurel Heights, a facility constructed to provide housing and care for senior citizens, was opened to residents on June 15, of this year. In the six months it has been in service the modern structure with its competent staff has become an important asset to London and the surrounding area.

At present 83 persons are living in the attractive red brick and concrete structure located one-half block west of North Mill Street of these 40 are individuals financing their own residency. Forty-three are listed as state cases, receiving subsistence in part from state or other agencies.

The institution has a present roll of 42 employees. The administrative staff of three is made up of Mesdames Louise Baker, overall administrator; Margaret Feichter, business office manager, and Ann Sowler, director of nursing service. Other departments are: Maintenance, 3; house-keeping, 3; kitchen and dining room, 7; nursing department, 26 employees.

Laurel Heights is a dual-function operation. Residents on the first floor, those able to take care of themselves, are provided with board and room in a hotel-like atmosphere. They are persons of retirement age who through loss of a spouse or some slight physical infirmity cannot, or do not, choose to maintain a home alone.

The second floor provides hospital-type care for a short or long period, to those persons of the senior age group who have been discharged after the acute stage of illness or surgery and are in the process of convalescence. Nursing care is also provided those who have had no pronounced illness but due to the infirmities of age or other manifestations of chronic poor health are unable to care for their own bodily needs.

The personal care floor contains 38 private rooms, con-

training five semi-private rooms and two apartments, for a total of 50 beds. The nursing floor has 20 semi-private rooms and eight private rooms, containing 48 beds in all.

The home supplies 24-hour nursing care under the continual supervision of a registered nurse. A physician is also on call at all times. Nonsectarian church services and planned social and recreational activities are other features of the pleasant and relaxed schedule of living open to Laurel Heights residents.

(Continued From Page 1) most appropriate period for the activity. The signup closing date, however, is the same for all counties and all states.

In general, the feed grain program calls for a certain amount of acreage to be diverted from production into an approved conserving use. By meeting the various provisions of the program, farmers become eligible for various benefits in the form of

payments, and also for loans under the commodity programs.

However, Mr. Hockensmith reminds farmers that participation in the various programs is not automatic - filling in an application which shows the operator's program intentions is the first necessary step in qualifying for program benefits.

All of the program signups will be conducted at ASCS county offices.

Ever since young America discovered the exports of London, the guitar has been accepted as the "instrument" among teenagers. Of 1.5 million guitars sold last year, more than half were sold to teenagers.

The new Guitarmate, by General Electric, is a combination electric guitar/stereo phonograph set which enables the player to solo, or accompany his favorite recording group, while the phonograph provides amplification.
