**"JOHNSON GRASS"**  
(Continued From Page One)  
as well as in fields and pastures until the grass can be destroyed.  
To avoid spreading the rootstock pieces from infested spots in cultivated fields raise the breaking plow or cultivating tools while passing through such spots because new plants can start from the nodes or joints of any rootstocks, that are moved and deposited in clean soil.  
Disk harrows can be used without much danger of spreading the rootstocks. The teeth harrows and drags are likely to move the pieces and encourage a rapid spread. Crop seeds sown should be free from Johnson grass. Straw

and hay from infested fields should not be brought to the farm or moved to clean fields. Combines and other farm machinery in which seeds might lodge should be cleaned before being moved from infested fields to clean fields.  
To control Johnson grass in large areas of solidly infested fields, cultural methods are more practical than the use of chemicals. One good method is to remove the Johnson grass for hay in July when the first flowerheads appear, then plow the stubble and clean-cultivate every 2 weeks until late September when a small grain crop such as barley can be planted for combine harvesting the next summer.

As soon as the small grain has been harvested, plow the land and clean-cultivate the land as was done the previous summer, then seed small grain again as winter pasture or for harvest. During two years of clean summer fallow practically all of the rootstocks and much of the live Johnson grass seed in the soil can be destroyed provided wet summer do not occur. It is difficult to kill Johnson grass by cultivation in wet seasons. Clean-cultivation during summer as described, for one year interrupted by two sometimes will control Johnson grass so that cultivated crops may be grown on the land for one or more years before the treatment needs to be repeated.

On heavily infested overflow bottoms where fresh Johnson grass seed is frequently brought in by floodwater, eradication often is a more practical approach.

Dig out Johnson grass with a grubbing hoe or similar tool if only a few plants are starting, being certain to get all the rootstocks. For larger areas, cut and remove the plants, and treat the soil and stubble with soil-sterilizing chemicals. Chemical treatments are expensive, but they are practical and effective for controlling small infestations.

Two chemicals which have been extensively used and proved satisfactory are sodium chlorate and TCA (sodium trichloroacetate).

If sodium chlorate is used apply the dry material uniformly over the infested area at the rate of 1 pound to the hundred square feet. It can be spread broadcast by hand, or the material may be applied from a net or fruit jar with small nail holes punched in the metal top or by use of other spreading devices. Caution: The use of sodium chlorate causes a fire hazard. The material should be stored in the original metal container, and the precautions mentioned on the manufacturer's label served and followed. It is safer when used in the dry form than as a water spray or drench. Its use at the rate mentioned will prevent growth of all vegetation in the soil for one to two years.

## Johnson Grass Fight Starts

Rockcastle County will soon begin a program aimed at the control and eradication of fast-spreading Johnson grass in Rockcastle County.

For the past two years, the spread of the weed-grass has reached the danger point in Kentucky, and Rockcastle. At a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday, the court appointed Magistrate Hubert Thacker to represent the court on a committee now being formed and called the County Weed Control Committee.

Other committeemen are being chosen from the county. They will be announced when the committee appointments are complete. After the county committee is formed, the group can receive help from the state and federal government in control of the grass through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

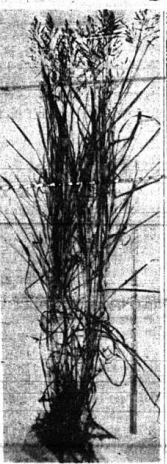
The program to rid the county of the grass, or minimize its infestation, will be voluntary on the part of the farmers. But farmers are urged to use the facilities that will be provided to help stamp out Johnson grass.

Nodding Bristle, another pesky weed that is becoming widespread in Kentucky, is also included in the program of eradication. But to date, nodding bristle has not become a scourge in Johnson grass.

When Johnson grass becomes heavy in fields it cuts production of crops, with the resulting loss in revenue to the farmer.

Currently, Franklin County is in a research program to eliminate and minimize the growth of the grass, and the program is working well.

Just what is Johnson grass? Johnson grass, a perennial

noxious weed in Kentucky, is becoming widely spread

sands of acres of fertile bottom land are practically abandoned to this weed, and each year it is further encroaching on the upland soils. Heavily infested fields are practically worthless for the growing of row crops. Even where it is possible to eradicate the weed, the cost is from \$50 to \$75 an acre.

Johnson grass is a sorghum which closely resembles su-

dan grass. The average height of mature plants is about

size of a lead pencil, and the leaves are 1/2 to 3/4 inch wide with a light green-colored mid-rib. The plant usually grows in bunches with several stems arising from each root crown. The seed heads formed at the top of the stems are branched and become reddish when nearing maturity. The seeds are oblong, about half the size of sorghum cane seed, and are red or dark brown. Established plants have large fleshy rootstocks, often as much as 1/2 inch in diameter, which live over winter. These rootstocks enable one to distinguish Johnson grass easily from Sudan grass.

Often Johnson grass shows up first on a farm as a single plant in small patches. Such small infestations can be destroyed readily by digging or spot-treating with chemicals, thus preventing the spread of the grass into nearby cultivated fields. The weed spreads by underground rootstocks as well as by seeds.

The seed on established plants usually matures in July, but on plants starting from seed or from regrowth of clipped plants, the seed matures later in the summer. Plants should never be allowed to mature seed because birds, livestock wind, and drainage waters can spread it to infest adjacent fields. Usually three close cuttings a year, each time as the plants put out flower heads, will prevent seed production. Cuttings as described should be done on row and ditch banks, fence rows and waste lands.

## Court Signs Road Change

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court and the State Highway Department agreed on a revised Rural Road Program at a meeting of the court Tuesday.

The new agreement, asked by the state, takes 25 sections of roads from the county rural program of maintenance and puts them under exclusive state maintenance. The agreement does not affect road work already set up in a contract signed last summer by the county and the state, the court was told.

Under terms of the Rural Road Program, the state helps the county with maintenance of certain roads that the state is willing to accept for maintenance, rebuilding, and blacktopping. The roads are suggested by the fiscal court.

Later, when the roads have been upgraded, the state takes them over for full maintenance, as is the case under the supplemental agreement signed Tuesday. The state gave the county \$74,000 this year for its Rural Road Program.

But not all was harmonious with the court Tuesday. Magistrate Wally Phillips voted "no" on the revision. All other magistrates voted "yes." Magistrate Henry Cromer was ill and unable to attend the meeting.

Mr. Phillips told the Signal: "I think it is better to keep these roads under the rural program. We can better maintain the roads by county road trucks. It seems to me it will be hard for the State Highway Department to maintain them. I doubt that they will go out and put the necessary rock, or do whatever needs to be done, when the work is assigned. I just don't think they will."

Sand Springs Road, beginning at junction of US 150, south to KY 1152, 7.7 miles.

Brothead-Conway Road, beginning at a junction of CR 1002, northeast to US 25, 4.4 miles.

Wildie-Clear Creek Road, beginning at the junction of

KY 20, northwest to KY 1650, 1.2 miles.

Dry Fork Road, from junction of CR 1017, southeast to CR 1070A, three miles.

Three Links Road, beginning at junction of CR 1062A, north to Jackson County Line, 5.2 miles.

McKee Road, beginning at junction of KY 490, northeast to Jackson County line, three miles.

Loman Hill, from junction of CR 1017, northwest to CR 1022, 1.6 miles.

Saltpepper Cave Road, from junction of KY 1004, north east to CR 1021, 1.8 miles.

# Between Us

Thoughts Of A Country Editor

(Below is a reprint of an item which appeared recently in the Lexington Herald. We felt it would be of great interest to our readers...Editor)

Rockcastle County, underlain bountifully with limestone but still not a part of the Blue Grass region, likely not in the mountains long has cherished the notion that it would like to become a tourist area because of its proximity to centers of population not too far away.

When Interstate 75 was projected Rockcastle felt that its dream might come true because a permitted the building of a lake by utilizing a road fill.

Business leaders of Mt. Vernon, county seat of Rockcastle, got busy and won approval of a provision of the highway construction program project that would form a 450-acre recreational lake and provide the city with an excellent water supply. Everything was booming and Mt. Vernon located just half a mile from the new lake, dreamed of thousands of tourists using the lake for fishing and staying in cabins and motels along the shore.

But then the bubble burst suddenly and the residents realized that there was the little matter of buying the lake for the right of way for the impoundment. The only way that the project could be carried out was by the consent of at least 200 residents to put up \$20,000 to buy this needed land.

Christmas time isn't the easiest time to raise money, especially when almost every family in the little town had to come up with \$100 to guarantee water coming when the lake was built. But they did. They signed up the 200 families and added about 25 more for good measure.

and they celebrated the good news by blowing the fire whistle so all might know of the victory.

John Lair's Restory, Vayez Barn Dance has been advertising Rockcastle County for many, many years and thousands of tourists visit that attraction during the year. Now, with a big recreation lake nearby these visitors from the North will have something to make them spend a longer time in this area.

Lexingtonians will be glad when this impoundment is finished and the waters are stocked with bass, croutin and bluegill. Completion of I-75 to Mt. Vernon is not too far off and it may be possible to reach that area by late this year. The highway already is in use to Berea and by the time the dam is built and the lake is stocked the highway should be finished.

Rockcastle County has been one of the counties connecting the Blue Grass with the mountains. It has not been too prosperous and census records indicate that it lost about 4,800 residents from its 17,000 or more population from 1940 to 1960. Perhaps in a few more years in the period from the 1960 census to now. But we believe that the next census will show that Rockcastle County is "coming back." Nothing helps an area as much as a big lake and this impoundment undoubtedly will mean much to the economy of the town. It even may result in new industry seeking out Mt. Vernon because of its location and the water supply. The people of this county are to be congratulated on their courage and upon their desire to see this dream come true.

## Letter To Editor

In answer to an article by Gatliff Craig in the December 22, 1966 publication of the Mount Vernon Signal, the Appalachian Volunteers and VISTAs in Rockcastle County feel it imperative to inform the citizens of this county of their purposes, and plans for accomplishing same.

The Economic Opportunity Act was passed by Congress, in August, 1964, to combat poverty in these United States. The Act is administered by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) in Washington D. C. Title II of the Act provides for funding of Community Action Programs (CAP) to non-profit organizations such as the Cumberland Valley Economic Opportunity Council, Inc. (CVEOC). Congress and OEO require that community action programs be developed, conducted and administered with "maximum feasible participation of the poor."

Among the means to ensure maximum participation of the poor are: a. Adequate representation on the policy-making body and appropriate advisory boards. b. Use of existing and creation of new community organizations for advice and, where appropriate, for actual conduct and administration of programs.

c. Provisions of meaningful opportunity for the poor, as individuals or as groups to protest or to propose additions to or changes in community action programs.

d. Employment of poor to the maximum extent feasible. These requirements of poor participation apply to all stages of community action programs, from their inception on. Achievement of meaningful participation shall be a continuing objective of every community action program, since it is through their own effective participation that the poor can most readily achieve the objective of a permanent increase in their capacity to deal with their problems without further assistance.

In keeping with the objectives of the Economic Opportunity Act, the Appalachian Volunteers and VISTAs have chosen to work in the most isolated communities in Appalachia, to help these communities organize and work toward solving their own problems. So that, ultimately, the people of these communities will enjoy the privileges and have the opportunities of the best of schools, roads, water, health facilities, and jobs that our democratic process can provide.

During the past couple of years, the AV's have worked

in the communities of Buffalo, Gum Springs, Blue Springs, Sand Springs, Climax, Well Hope, Whitaker, Johnetta and Cedar Ridge in Rockcastle County. Several college students have donated their week ends and summers to come into these communities and work with the young people, doing tutoring, running recreation programs, remodeling schools, taking water surveys, and other meaningful projects. Several libraries have been established in the one- and two-room schools by the AV Appalachian Book Program in connection with the National Parent-Teachers Association. Buffalo has established a trash dump; Sand Springs is working on a water system; Gum Springs is working on a health project; Climax has been working toward a trash dump and pottery project; Buffalo, Sand Springs, Climax and Gum Springs each have elected a representative to the county citizens advisory committee.

I, Zi Graves, Appalachian Volunteer Community Intern, would like to clarify my position as a worker in Rockcastle County. I am a 30-year resident of the county, wife and mother of three children, all educated in Kentucky. Two of these children had to go to Pulaski County high schools because of the lack of facilities in Rockcastle County at that time. All have gone on to college. My son is a Lieutenant in the Air Force.

I am a believer in better education, better communities and better living conditions for ALL people. And that is my aim as an AV Community Intern, to help make these things possible.

When people get together as a community and discuss their problems, whether it be a school dropout problem, bad roads or lack of communication, they usually come up with the possibility of an answer and begin working on it. This is community action working in a democratic way. And if I am allowed to work as my conscience dictates, Rockcastle County will be organized on the extent that all rural, or heretofore unrepresented people, will have their chance to participate in any civic activity, in the county, with equal rights of the other county organizations.

Lainy Grosscup, VISTA worker in Rockcastle County for 16 months, will be missed by all with whom she has worked. Her area was the Climax-Johnetta community, but she was also quite active in Sand Springs and Buffalo. The people of these communities loved and respected her. She was a great help in explaining the government programs of OEO and CAP, along with her activities of organizing and helping the rural people. She extended her normal stay of one year to 16 months so she could further help with projects that she had started.

Good Luck, Lainy, in any new endeavor. I'm sure you will be a success. We have a new VISTA volunteer in Rockcastle, John Hansen of Yakima, Washington. His exact location hasn't been determined yet, but at the present time he is in the Buffalo community. He is our fourth VISTA worker in Rockcastle County, and I'm sure he will continue the work started by Ivy Reece, Lainy Grosscup and Kathy Schlesinger.

We wish him success with the job of representing the government's program of the War on Poverty.

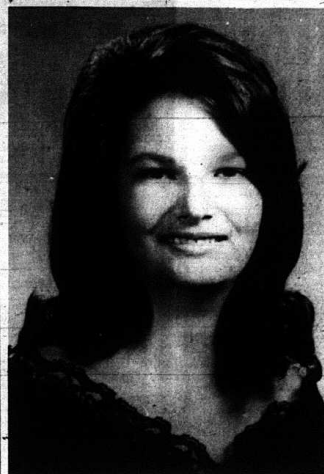
