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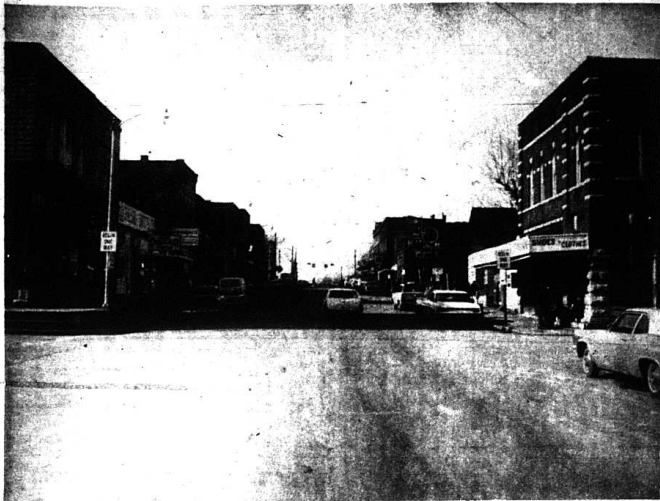

Charles is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Reppert of Mt. Vernon.

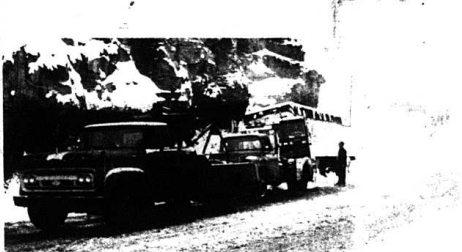

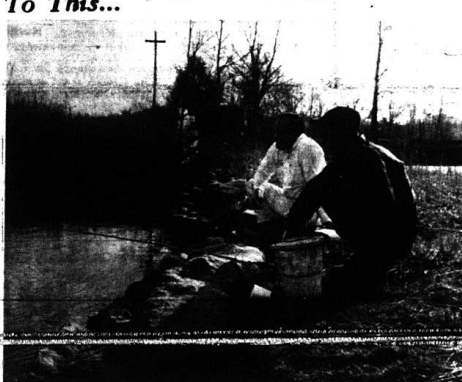

## Two Way Traffic On Main

Danny Jasper, State Highway Traffic Engineer from the Somerset office informed the Signal Tuesday that Main Street would be changed back to the original two-way system effective the first of next week.

In a letter to Mayor Clyde Linville from K. E. Johns, Operations Management Engineer of the Department of Highways, Frankfort, Mr. Johns said "I have been advised by representatives of our Division of Traffic that the Mt. Vernon City Council, at their regular meeting on December 1, 1966, passed a resolution requesting that the Department of Highways make the changes necessary to reinstate two-way traffic flow on Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

"You will recall, I am sure, the many discussions that were held between city officials and Highway Department representatives regarding the establishment of one-way flow on Main Street early in 1966. I feel sure that our representatives expressed upon you and other local officials the fact that these changes were felt to be necessary to provide relief for the extreme congestion that is experienced in the Mt. Vernon area by motorists on US 25. Studies that have been made by our engineers during the time that the one-way system is in operation prove conclusively that this system, plus other modifications that have been made, have provided a degree of congestion relief. These studies also indicate that reverting to two-way operation on Main Street

will eliminate the benefits that US 25 traffic has enjoyed for the past several months and will probably result in a degree of congestion greater than any ever experienced previously in the Mt. Vernon area. This is, of course, due to the fact that travel on US 25 is increasing at an abnormal rate.

Mr. Johns further stated, "Our engineers stand in meetings with city officials

that the one-way operation would be instituted on a trial basis. I feel sure that the proposal was accepted by you and other city officials in good faith. For this reason, I have no recourse but to instruct District Engineer J.P. Noonan to reinstate two-way flow on Main Street as requested by the City Council. These instructions are, however, issued with extreme

## Indian Lakes Park To Be Developed; Camping Area Planned

A camping area with many other features including a 22-acre lake and dam is now being developed on the former Andrew Schiff farm by David C. Graves, Lexington attorney.

The farm is located in Rockcastle and Lincoln Counties on Slatey Branch Road and contains approximately 350 acres.

Some of the other features planned for the development are: stables and riding facilities, trailer sites, a trading post, mountain crafts, a children's park and zoo and, in the near future, dining and eating facilities.

A preserve for natural wild life, including deer, is also planned. "It is hoped local people will aid in the preservation of this wild life and join with the Park in attempting to stop all poaching and hunting," Mr. Graves said.

A museum that will feature local Indian artifacts and items from "yeasteryear" will also be built. Mr. Graves mentioned that anyone who wishes to donate items would be welcomed and that a suitable plaque with the donor's name would be attached to the item.

According to Mr. Graves, several state department people have estimated that approximately fifty new jobs will be created, and the outlet for this venture, and should local interest, attention, and consideration demand it, an entire crafts manufacturing shop will be built later creating the need for additional labor.

In a letter to Mr. Graves from Robert D. Bell, Commissioner of Parks for the State of Kentucky, Mr. Bell said, "I was most interested in your indication that you and others were planning to develop a commercial tent and trailer camping area. In my opinion, private investors in Kentucky have overlooked an excellent opportunity in this field.

Mr. Bell further stated, "The growth of interest in tent and trailer camping has been most dramatic and has practically overwhelmed all public authorities who are attempting to respond to this demand. In the case of the Kentucky State Park System, we have an overflow situation practically in all tent and trailer camping areas in the period from Memorial Day through Labor Day. We also enjoy a heavy visitation on week ends in the months of April, May, September, and October. In practically all our areas during the season, we maintain overflow areas in order to provide sites for tent and trailer camping."

**Kentucky Dairy Princess Pageant**  
Miss Doris June Coffey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Coffey, Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, will represent District No. 8, February 12-13 at the Kentucky Dairy Princess Pageant at the Kentucky Hotel, Louisville, Kentucky.

Doris was chosen county princess at Dairy Day activities in June, and was selected District Dairy Princess at the Dairy Conference held in Mt. Vernon on October 4.

Doris, who is 17, is a graduate of Mt. Vernon High School and is now a freshman at Berea College. She has been very active in 4-H Club work, Future Homemakers of America and church work. She was a member of the Beta Club at Mt. Vernon High School and the Glee Club. Coronation of the State Dairy Princess will be the highlight of the annual meeting of the American Dairy Association of Kentucky, which will also be held in the Kentucky Hotel, Monday, February 13.

**Cucumber Growers Will Get Top Prizes In 1967**  
Farmers in Rockcastle County can add to their income in 1967 by growing cucumbers to be processed into pickles. Cucum-

ber growers who do a good job in 1967 may gross as much as \$1500 an acre.

The price increase averages 20 per cent higher than was paid in 1966. By grades (sizes are the same as in 1966) it will be as follows: 1's - \$8.00 cwt.; 2's - \$5.00 cwt.; 3's - \$3.00 cwt.; 4's - \$2.00 cwt.; Overseas - 75 cwt. (not in contract).

Some of the advantages of growing cucumbers are as follows:

1. Provides cash at a time when very little other income is coming from the farm.
2. The average cost of producing an acre of cucumbers is about \$55 to \$60 out-of-pocket expense and about 300 man hours of labor.
3. This crop need not replace any other cash crop on the farm but can be used to supplement farm income.
4. Since it only takes 12 weeks to land for about 12 weeks the land may be used for some other crop after the cucumbers are harvested.
5. In many cases, cucumbers may be grown using only family labor.

More than \$57,000 was added to the Rockcastle County economy in 1966 from the sale of cucumbers, payments to local truckers for hauling and wages paid locally.

**Vitamin A Supplement is Needed in Most Beef Wintering Rations**

Beef producers have found that it pays to supplement rations with Vitamin A during the winter months. Methods have been worked out that make it easy and cheap to supply the extra Vitamin A.

It is not practical to wait for signs of Vitamin A needs. Profits have already been reduced before symptoms show. Symptoms of Vitamin A deficiency may be watery eyes, scouring, weak calves, and "poor-doing" cattle. Breeding problems and other health problems are related to the Vitamin A available.

Sources of Vitamin A are green grass, green hay, Vitamin A stored in the liver of animals and Vitamin A supplements. Most cattle have now used most or all of the Vitamin A stored in the liver. The green pastures are gone. Little green hay can be found on most farms. This leaves Vitamin A supplements as the most practical source until pasture time next spring.

Vitamin A premix can best be fed to beef cattle in the loose salt. A protected salt box will be needed. Mix only what the cattle will clean up in 7 to 10 days.

Mixing recommendations for the beef cow herd: mix 2 1/2 lbs of Vitamin A premix with 10 lbs of loose salt. Most cows will eat about 1 oz. salt per day.

For stocker and feeders: mix 1 lb Vitamin A premix with 10 lbs. of salt.

The supplement can be bought at most local farm supply stores. There is no problem in beef cattle with other vitamins. Sunshine takes care of Vitamin D. Vitamins B and K are produced by the animal in the rumen. Most rations have enough Vitamin E.

**SPEED CHECKING DEVICE**  
FRANKFORT - Kentucky State Police can now clock speeders in any direction from a moving cruiser.

They are using a device known as VASCAR - Visual Average Speed Computer and Recorder.

The device being used in Central Kentucky rests on a stand to the right of the driving State Trooper. It has two switches - one operates a time determining mechanism, the other determines distance. After the factors of speed and distance are put into the VASCAR, speed is automatically computed on a simulated speedometer.

As the device is used in each county in Central Kentucky, county officials will be given a demonstration of its uses.

One trooper working in Shelby County estimated he has issued 45 speeding citations using VASCAR. There have been no contested cases, the trooper said.

Colonel James E. Bassett, director of Kentucky State Police, says, "To date, VASCAR has proved to be an accurate and effective means of determining the speed of moving vehicles."

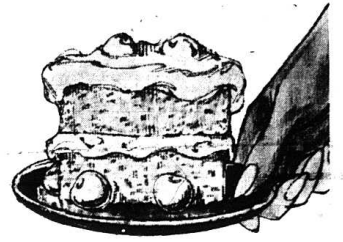

**BURLEY REPORT**

By Jack Lewyn (For Burley Association) Directors of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association voted at a meeting in Lexington to endorse acreage-purchase as the most effective method of controlling the production of burley tobacco.

The vote, taken at the monthly meeting of the association's directors Jan. 11, was unanimous. It followed a full discussion of burley's current situation, including 1966 crop production and the reasonable need for effective control if the two-part tobacco program of production control and price support is to withstand attacks and survive.

The acreage-purchase law of 1965 gives to the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture the discretion to call for a referendum on the question of acreage-purchase in 1967 should he find it advisable. By law, he must announce 1967 quotas under the present program by Feb. 1. He could at the same time, announce a referendum on acreage-purchase controls.

The Burley Association directors voted in another action to support fully — should another referendum be called — to obtain a favorable vote among growers.

It was the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association while in the 1960s, originated the idea, then adopted, that price support in exchange for production control would give the grower a desperately needed balance of power in the marketplace.

Association President John M. Berry noted at the directors' meeting that the program, which

the association began administering with the 1960 crop, worked well for 19 years — until the first big overproduction hit in 1954 — and later over-production came in 1960 and 1963. The mind and Mr. Arvel Burdette 1966 crop, he said, is an example of how increased production overcomes an acreage reduction made within the framework — and the idea — of the program.

Such a condition, repeated often enough, could cost the grower the entire tobacco program, because the Congress, now lacking a substantial agricultural vote, would simply get tired of providing the means of price support within the reasonable effort by the grower to return to control production. Berry stressed.

The Burley Association, commonly called the "pool," now handles the price support program for burley in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia and Missouri. It has taken more than a billion pounds of burley under price support since the program began.

**SAVE YOUR POPLAR TREES**

Let these young Poplars grow five years and they will bring you \$1900.00.
