## Local NFO Group Supports National "Milk Holding"

A majority of Rockcastle County National Farm Organization members and almost as many non-NFO members are supporting the 25-state boycott of milk processing plants," according to Jack Fugate, past treasurer of the local organization.

The holdout, which began six days ago, is a non-violent protest by NFO members against the price they are receiving from processing plants for their milk. Farmers now receive about 8 cents a quart and are requesting a raise of 2 cents more on the quart.

According to Mr. Fugate, his cost for producing 100 pounds of milk, excluding labor, is \$2.54, and he receives \$5.67 per one hundred pounds from the processor.

"The initial investment required for this business is from \$5,000 to \$10,000 and operating expenses are very high, not to mention the labor which goes into operating a Grade A Dairy. We do not feel we are being unfair in asking for the 2 cent hike since the consumer pays about 26 cents a quart for the milk of which we, producers of the product, receive 8 cents," Mr. Fugate said.

George Skiles, president of the NFO in Kentucky, claims the movement is snowballing. He predicted housewives would soon begin noticing the shortage.

Most NFO members throughout the boycott area are dumping their milk rather than sell it for the 8 cents a quart and farmers in some areas are going so far as to go to the local grocers in their area and buy milk off the shelves and then dump it.

"We are in this thing to stay until we have a contract in our hands with the requested 2 cent raise," Mr. Fugate declared.

The pond was then drained by men with picks and shovels to a depth of about 2 feet, and men waded the pond in search for the child.

According to the men, when they first found the youngster, one of the beagle hounds, who had faithfully stayed with the little boy, was not at all "happy with their presence."

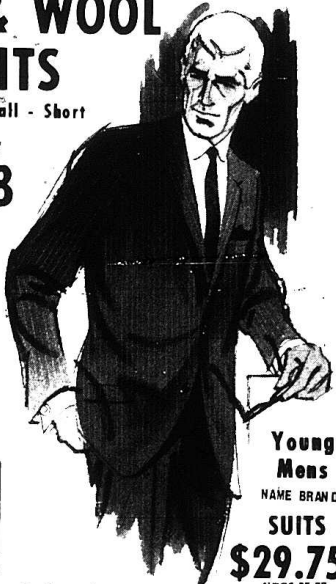

### MATTER OF SELF-PRESERVATION

We have set many records in the field of agricultural production and have built up a promising chemurgic industry. Yet there is so much more we need to do to make our land still more fruitful and to use our agricultural wastes to better advantage. We possess vast mineral resources. Yet there is a great deal more we could do by way of research, development, and extraction.

Still we have at least been aware of the potential of our land and mineral resources. By comparison, we have sadly neglected the mineral wealth that lies at the doorstep of our long coastal borders. The small beginnings made by us so far in this field must be greatly expanded — and soon — for the economic picture of the coming years will be greater than those we are now encountering and we shall need a strong and self-reliant nation.

### FUTURE OF OCEANOGRAPHY

AS we look back over the two decades that have passed since the end of World War II, we can see the many changes that have occurred in our everyday life. Our nation has become more highly industrialized. Our metals and chemicals industries have expanded far beyond our expectations. Vast markets have opened up as new uses have been found for traditional raw materials and as new materials have been introduced.

There is a very good chance that a breakthrough resulting from oceanographic studies and exploration will open up a new minerals industry of huge potential. Within the next ten or fifteen years, we may have a government-sponsored National Oceanographic Agency to rival the National Aeronautics & Space Agency. Before the year 2000, we could be extracting from our offshore areas commercially valuable deposits of minerals, including precious metals.

### DEEP-SEA FLOOR STUDIES

First, we must prepare to penetrate the secrets of the sea. Steps are already being taken on both the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts of continental U.S. and in Hawaii. In the New York area, local capital is financing the construction and the ultimate voyage

of a deep submergence vessel in which Swiss oceanographer, Dr. Jacques Piccard, will make a six-week, 1,500 mile observation journey beneath the Gulf Stream. Dr. Piccard plans to submerge to a depth of about 300 feet off the Miami coast, drifting with the current to Nova Scotia and descending to depths of as much as 200 feet.

In California, a somewhat similar project is underway, sponsored jointly by a Bureau of Marine Technology, the State and the Coast and Geodetic Survey. There the emphasis will be more on exploring and mapping the continental shelf with a view to minerals exploitation, while Dr. Piccard's journey will perhaps concentrate more on observing marine life.

### ECONOMIC PROSPECTS

Of course, we know so little about the sea and her secrets that there are bound to be disappointments and setbacks in the effort to discover the extent of the ocean's wealth and how best to extract it. Right now any minerals taken from the sea would be costly to haul up and to transport to remote and ultimate markets. But one day we shall learn to make them truly competitive with land minerals. In the process we shall learn a great deal about the marine life and its vital potential as food for man.

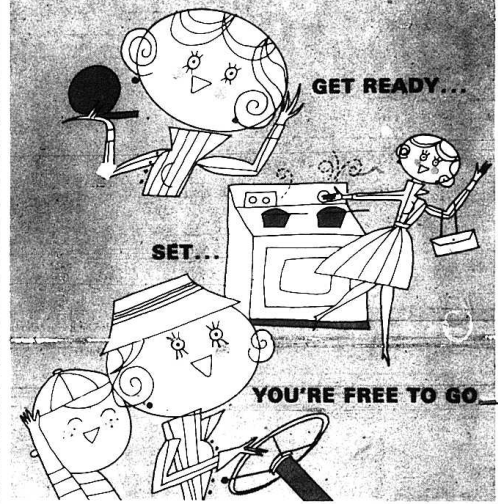

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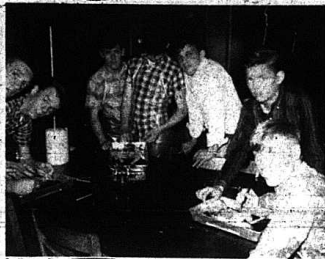
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# County Agent's Notes

**CLOVER MITES IN HOMES NO CAUSE FOR ALARM**  
Seeing spots before your eyes? Don't panic—they may actually be clover mites, says Dr. R. A. Scheibner, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service entomologist.

"Thousands of tiny specks on window panes, woodwork, wall or bed linen are probably clover mites. When crushed they leave a red stain. But except as a nuisance, they do no harm in the home. They will not bite, transmit disease or destroy materials," Dr. Scheibner says.

control; if you have a tank-type vacuum cleaner, just vacuum up the pests. Aerosol sprays containing only pyrethrum will give a quick kill but there is no residual. Insecticides for indoor control are 0.5 percent strength Lindane, 2 percent strength chlorobenzene, 1 or 2 percent strength Malathion. Follow label directions for safety and application rates.

The best feed on clover and other plants. In winter, they migrate into houses. When weather warms, they seek the outside again.

Next fall, apply the insecticides mentioned above (at prescribed rates) around doors and windows and other entry places. You also can spray for mites on walls, foundations and 10 to 20 feet of adjacent lawn with Aramite or Dime of Chlorobenzilate at recommended rates to halt the invasions.

Follow safety precautions with any insecticide, Dr. Scheibner emphasizes.

A leaflet on burley and dark-tipped tobacco varieties, with emphasis on characteristics, has been released by the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service.

The leaflet 268-C, and is entitled "Use A Resistant Tobacco Variety." Authors are Ira E. Massey, George A. Everette and Dr. J. H. Smiley, all members of the agronomy department's tobacco section.

The leaflet is available in area agents' county Extension offices. It describes standard burley, hybrids and dark tobacco varieties, available and recommended. The leaflets tables also show each variety's resistance to black root, mosaic, fusarium wilt, wildfire, and black shank, and to aphids. Disease resistance ratings range from
