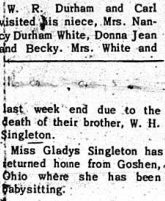

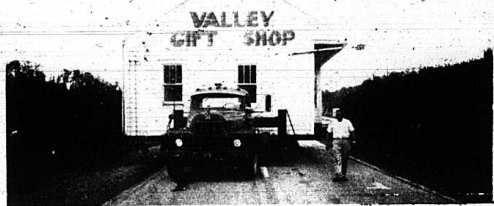

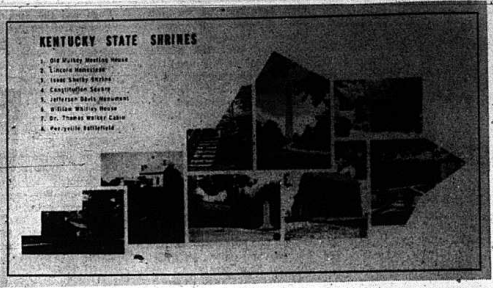

Self-rising flour provides a nutritional bonus, too, of three B-vitamins, thiamine, niacin, and riboflavin plus two minerals, iron and calcium. Use of a self-rising product makes this recipe easy to prepare because it contains the leavening and salt -- no measuring is necessary.

STRAWBERRY CAKE ROLL

1 cup sifted enriched self-rising flour
4 eggs, separated
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
Confectioners' sugar
Strawberry Filling

Measure flour. Beat egg whites until frothy. Add 1/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating until meringue forms soft peaks. Set aside. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Gradually beat in remaining sugar and almond extract. Fold egg yolk mixture into meringue. Sift flour mixture over egg mixture and fold in gently. Turn into waxed paper-lined 10 1/2 x 15 1/2-inch jelly roll pan. Bake in preheated 375° oven, 15-18 minutes, or until cake is done. Loosen sides and turn out onto clean towel previously dusted with confectioners sugar. Remove wax paper. Beginning at narrow end, roll up cake and towel together. Cool. Unroll and spread with Strawberry Filling. Roll and chill until served.

STRAWBERRY FILLING

1 cup whipping cream
2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
1 pint fresh strawberries, cleaned and sliced

Whip cream until stiff. Fold in remaining ingredients.

*If you don't stir it in the absence of other directions, spoon flour directly from container into a one-cup dry measure, level off, then remove two level tablespoons, according to USDA recommendations.

"No Funds Available" Says EDA

The Town Board Members of Brodhead have received a letter from the Economic Development Administration in Washington, D. C. informing the Board that since limited funds were available for the purpose set out in Brodhead's application (financing of a sewer system and construction costs which would enable water to be bought from Mt. Vernon) it would not be possible to provide the requested assistance.

Open Fires Restricted

From October 1 until December 15 and from March 15 until May 15 it is illegal to burn any open fires within 150 feet of any woodland. If burning is done more than 150 feet from the woodland but is capable of spreading to the woodland through grass or other flammable material it is still a violation of the Kentucky Forest Fire Laws. If burning must be done, it is permissible between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 12 midnight, providing all reasonable precautions are taken. Reasonable precautions shall consist of cutting and piling flammable material and clearing around the flammable material to prevent spread of fire to the woodland. The fire must be extinguished at 12 midnight. Setting of fires to capture any wildlife is prohibited by law. This statute includes smoking of squirrels or other animals out of hollow trees, hollow stumps, or holes in the ground. Violators when convicted

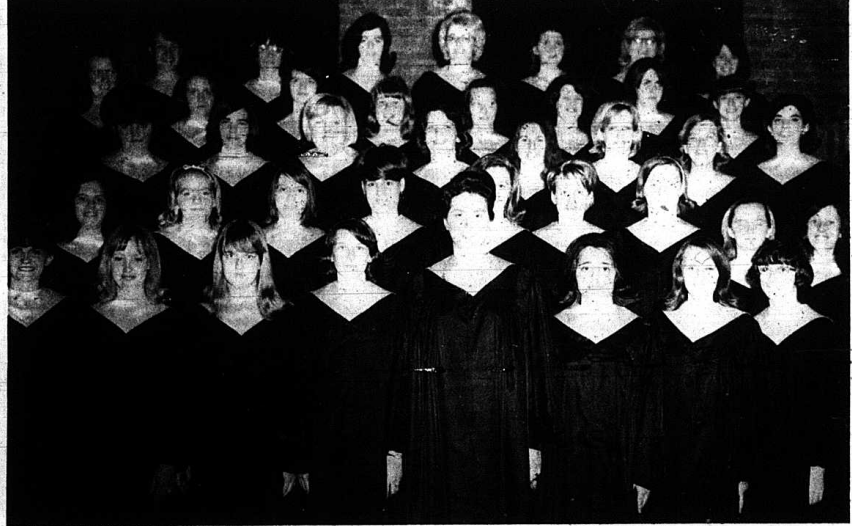
No Fish Giggling In Dix River

Several of the giggering and snagging laws, set forth by the Fish and Game Department, have been revised this season. Some of the revisions dealing with the prohibiting of giggering and snagging are listed below: "A person may gig or snag from the stream or lake banks, but cannot exercise these fishing methods from a boat or hand-made platform or perch or tree, except giggering is permitted from a jigging in any lake with a surface acreage of 500 acres or larger during the daylight hours of 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Giggering is prohibited within the area 700 yards below Kenney Lake Dam on the Tennessee River, within one mile below Wolf Creek Dam and in the area on the Cumberland River below Barkley Dam downstream to US 62 Bridge, in Dix River and its tributaries, within 200 yards below any other dam. Snagging is prohibited within one mile below Wolf Creek Dam and within 200 yards below all other dams except Kentucky Dam. The season is open night and day, except on lakes from a boat as described above, there will be no limit on the number of rough fish taken.

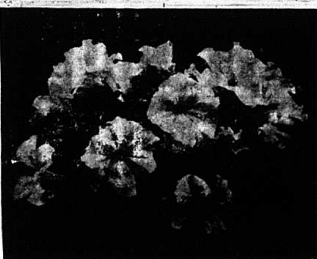

Organize and Help Me Win!!!

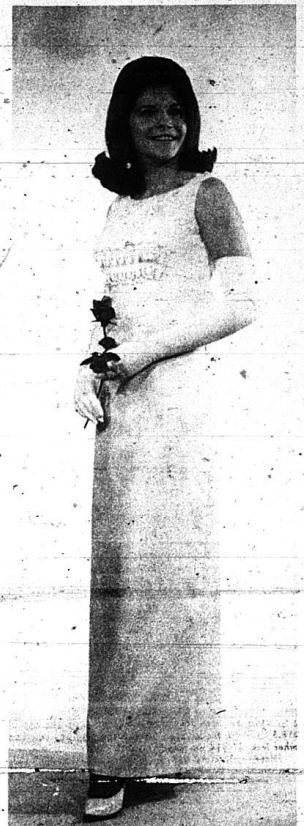

Babson's Authentic Report

INFLATION A year ago everybody was talking about inflation. Food prices - especially meats - were soaring. Business was booming. But the stock market was going down. Those who had bought stocks as a hedge against inflation were puzzled, and disturbed. This year stocks have climbed smartly in the face of falling production and rather flat prices. What has happened to inflation?

FACTS ON INFLATION When we listen to stock brokers, we feel that all one has to do in order to make money is to buy common stocks and let inflation take its course. But when the government economists discuss the situation, we get the impression that to have no inflation is bad, a little is good, and a lot would wipe us all out. Then we talk with some pretty smart bankers, and they just about convince us that the best recipe for a real stretch of prosperity is to have all prices tilt gently downward.

Thoroughly confused, we ask ourselves: Just what is inflation? After talking with more economists and bankers, we settle for the fact that the most people think inflation is - simply an advance in prices and a hike in the cost of living. But when we get deeper into the subject we realize that the price climb just has to have a cause. And, indeed, it has some most important and powerful causes.

MONEY THE CLUE Today it has become fashionable to talk of rising prices as being caused by "cost-push" inflation. Simply, this means that prices can be boosted by the unions demanding and getting increases in wages that are greater than the advances in productivity. It also means that higher taxes can cause inflation. How? By corporations adding the amount of the hike in taxes to the prices of their goods and services. It would seem, then, that the culprit behind inflation has been found; that all we would

NEVER FEAR IT WILL RETURN Those who have been wondering "where inflation went" may not have to wonder long. The outpouring of funds by the banking system and by government action will soon be matched by perhaps the biggest budget deficit since World War II. As much as \$15 billion, and maybe even \$20 billion, will be the annual rate of federal-spending deficit by a year from today. If this proves accurate - and we think it is not far from the mark - inflation will be on everyone's lips again by spring 1968.

County Agents Notes

EASTERN TENT CATER. PILLAR Tent caterpillars are now on a rampage. Look for the big webbed "tents" in the crookings of your trees. The caterpillars develop and live in these tents. They feed on host trees, frequently stripping it of foliage. Then they migrate by the thousands to other nearby trees. They like wild cherry and apple trees best, but will also "tent" up in flowering ornamentals, birch, oak, barberry and elm. Spray the tents. Use one of these materials: DDT, lead arsenate, Methoxychlor or Malathion. Read the label for mixing and safety directions. If tents are low enough, use a long pole to tear them away from the host tree. Be careful in spraying. Since the tents will be almost overhead, some of the spray could drift back on you.

ALFALFA WEEVIL Alfalfa Weevil is a major threat now. Check fields often to determine if they are present or for feeding damage. When five out of ten plants show feeding damage, arrange for spraying. Recommended materials are (one of the following): Alfatox, Guthion, Methoxychlor, Malathion or Methyl Parathion. (Parathion in any form is very toxic and its application should be by trained operators. Handle all insecticides according to label directions for proper amounts and safety factors.)

County extension offices can give information on recommended material and weed-kill - control measures. TOBACCO PLANT BEDS NEED WATERING IF DRY WEATHER COMES AFTER SEEDING Watch tobacco plant beds if dry weather comes after seeding. The beds will need regular watering, says Dr. J. H. Smiley, University of Kentucky Cooperative Ex-

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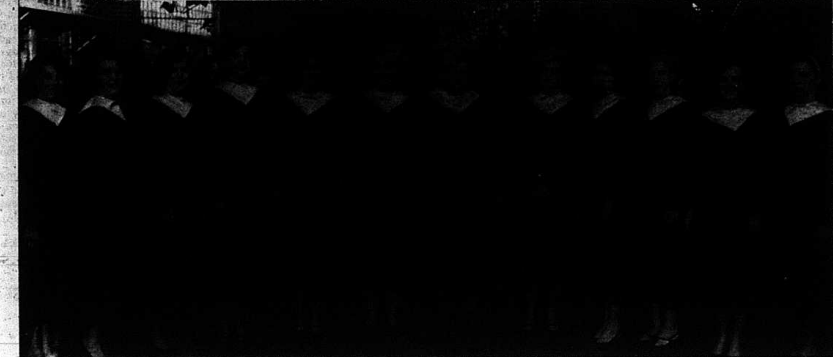
