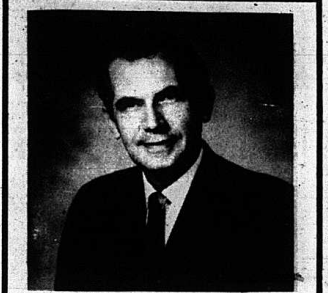

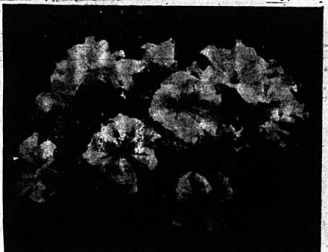

Soil Conservation News

**SOILS, LIKE PEOPLE
HAVE MANY TRAIT**

It's best to know what kind of soil we are working with. Some soils, for example can be used safely and productively for cultivated crops. Some can't.

"Some soils will support a housing development or a factory. Others won't. On some house lots, the soil will filter sewage from a septic tank. On others the soil won't."
To find out about proper uses of soil for both rural and urban residents, ASC soil conservationists survey 50 million acres of the U.S. as a whole there are 70,000 different kinds, he says. "Each soil has its own distinctive traits or characteristics," Taff said. "To make wise and intelligent use of the land, health departments, tax assess-

sors and highway departments. There are over 80 kinds of soil in Rockcastle County. Some are well drained, some are not, some are fertile, some are infertile, some very acidic, some hold water well, some are droughty. You can add fertilizer to build up the nutrient balance in some soils, while there are others that it is more profitable to add just what the crop needs each year. Any farmer by requesting it at the Soil Conservation Service Office, can have a soil and water capability map made for his farm, along with a land use map showing the best use for each acre of land.

Rainbow hues will dominate a high level of phosphorus for a Mt. Vernon, Saturday, May 13th as members of the Future Homemakers of America, take up their positions at important intersections in town to seek contributions for the "Rainbow Tag Day" to benefit United Cerebral Palsy of Kentucky.
Said President, John Perkins, "I'd like to see one day special campaign" is being staged throughout the nation with the higher levels of phosphorus of teenagers participating.
Plans call for rainbow gashed youngsters, with Future Homemakers to take up positions throughout town. Contributors will be given a colorful tag carrying the picture of the UCP National Poster Boy.
The event is being conducted in more than 40 counties of Kentucky this year. Locally, the Future Homemakers of America is sponsoring the project. The UCP special campaign, Mr. Perkins said, provides the support for the education and rehabilitation services which are opening up a new life for those afflicted. He noted that a portion of the money contributed is invested in research seeking the elimination of cerebral palsy.
In order to assure the success of the event, Andrea Anglin, local Tag Day Chairman for the Future Homemakers, urged all residents to be as generous as possible when approached next Saturday.

An increase of the phosphorus level in rations of barrows and gilts increased rate of gain and feed efficiency. This is the report this week of Dr. Charles Chaney, University of Kentucky animal science department, who conducted an experiment last season on the subject.
"We fed rations that had varied levels of phosphorus to barrows and gilts, from 40 pounds of live weight until they reached market weight. We used a low level of phosphorus for one group, a level of phosphorus recommended by the National Research

Babson's Authentic Report

WHAT LIES AHEAD FOR LIVING COSTS
You'll be paying 2.5% more for consumer goods and services by the end of this trifling year than you were at the beginning. That's what the government economists predict, and it looks as though they may be right on the button. Or very, very close to it. Here, are some of the reasons the forecast seems to be logical, even if a trifle discouraging to the householder.

RECENT LIVING-COST SLOWDOWNS TEMPORARY

Since last fall consumer

prices have been comparatively stable, enough so to make the polyanthas hope that the buying power of their pocketbooks might grow stronger. But most of the slowdown has been due to lower prices in certain foods — such as eggs, fruits, vegetables, and pork. This has tended to offset to a fair degree the basic increase in most other prime goods and services. But the cost of beef, milk, cheese, etc., is on the way up, and it won't be long before other foods follow.

Then the climb in overall living costs will be resumed. It won't be a mad inflationary runaway, but the advances will be persistent and will involve steadily more every item in the consumer price index. The value of your dollar is going to be nicked away during the rest of 1967, and probably well beyond that. Some "mods" among the Administration will console you with the claim that this gradual price inflation will help to keep business strong. But you will feel it in the pocketbook; that they can't deny.

ITEMS HEADING UPWARD

Along with foods, there will be upward pressure on the price of apparel, shoes, gasoline, many household goods, and entertainment. It will become steadily more expensive to eat out, even at restaurants that have thus far sustained the "bargain" image. It is going to cost more for housing, whether you rent or buy. The promise of some softening in mortgage interest rates will not be able to balance out the continuing hike in building costs, insurance rates, and property taxes. While medical expenses are not a regular family outlay, they are bound to show up when least expected and may be considered as a part of every budget. Over the past twelve months medical

costs have skyrocketed over 8%, and this may well be only a beginning. Doctors will keep raising their pay sights, while nurses are organizing to ensure steady gains as well as shorter hours. Naturally, all this is going to be passed along to the patients needing hospital treatment.

APPLIANCES, AUTOS

DOWN THEN UP
Cutbacks in residential building have slowed sales of color TV and other household appliances, with resultant weakening of prices. It should be noted, however, that housing starts are once again on the rise, and gentler mortgage interest rates are making for more optimism. As this trend intensifies, prices of appliances will be nudged upward again in an effort to lessen the profits squeeze that has tormented many companies. Lagging turnover in autos has also placed downward pressure on prices for both used and new models. Dealers are frantic to reduce their inventories, even if it means sharp losses for the time being. Until fall this price sag will prevail, but then will come the 1968 models that will be approximately \$100 more expensive than those of 1967. Hence, autos will add their strength to the general climb in costs of all retail goods and services.

RAISES WILL PUSH PRICES UP

So far, many concerns have been covering their increases in labor costs from their earlier healthy profits. But outlays for labor are still soaring to ward new highs, and many major industries will have to give wage boosts this year and next. The result will be more and more "passing of the buck" to the consumer in the form of higher prices. So there is as yet no end in sight for the rise in living costs.

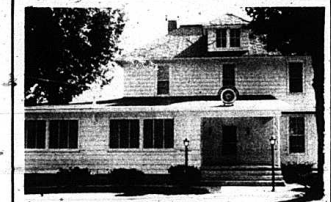
