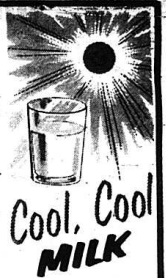

\$4,500 Received For Planning Of Low-Rent Housing Here

Jess Bullock, Executive Director for the Mt. Vernon Municipal Housing Commission, has received an announcement from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in Washington, D. C., that a \$4,500 preliminary loan for new low-rent public housing for Mt. Vernon has been approved.

The announcement read in part: "The funds will enable Mt. Vernon Municipal Housing Commission to begin preliminary planning for 30 low-rent houses. Ten of the homes are for the elderly."

"Following completion of preliminary planning, the

local authority will prepare and submit to HUD a program and description of the proposed housing site, sketch plans, and an estimate of the total cost of the proposed housing development. The lowest public housing program was authorized by the Housing Act of 1937, as amended."

The approval was announced by Secretary Robert Weaver of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

BOND SALES
During April, the sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Rockcastle County were \$11,914 and sales for the year reach \$27,205, of the annual goal of \$90,500.

In Kentucky, the sales for the month were \$4,981,912 and cumulative sales climbed to \$20,993,497 of the annual goal of \$64,700,000.

Nationally, the sales of both Series were \$394 million. The cash value of both series outstanding reached \$50,613 million for a gain of \$40 million since the first of the year.

Livingston Man Accidentally Shot

Wayne Durham, 35, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Durham of near Livingston, was accidentally shot in the right side and arm by his father Monday night. Durham, who is employed by Greer Bros. and Young Construction Co., in London, returned unexpectedly Monday night to his father's home, which is located about 5 miles from Livingston on old U.S. 25. Durham tried to gain entrance to the house by one door and when this failed attempted to get in another entrance. His father, not expecting his son, thought an intruder was trying to break into his home and shot him with a shot gun. Durham was taken to Marymount Hospital in London and was later moved to a Lexington Hospital. No report was available on his condition.

Registration Set For June 12 At EKU

Registration for Eastern Kentucky University's eight-week summer term has begun this Monday, June 12. Students may enroll in graduate or undergraduate programs at Eastern's 32 special workshops and institutes. The order of registration is alphabetical for all students, with 15-minute intervals separating each of the 26 categories. The A's begin at 8:00 a.m. (EST). "We had nearly 3,000 students last year," said Dr. Charles Ambrose, Dean of admissions, "and we expect over 3,000 this summer."

June Dairy Month is a nationwide celebration participated in by leaders in agriculture, business, education, government, and scores of enterprises tied to the multi-billion-dollar dairy industry.

Head Start Aid Approved; Program Still Doubtful

The Office of Economic Opportunity has approved a summer program for the Rockcastle County Board of Education, Congressman Tim Lee Carter announced recently.

The federal share of the project will be \$53,111, while the non-federal share will be \$14,413. The project will benefit 196 children. The Rockcastle Head Start program was approved along with 7 other counties in a package approval to the Council of the Southern Mountains in Berea. The seven other counties are: Harlan, Knox, Bell, Clay, Whitley, Laurel and Jackson.

OEO approval of these funds to Council of the Southern Mountains means that the Council will have to initiate separate contracts with each of the 8 counties to order for the counties to have this summer project.

In order for the Council to make these separate contracts, they (the Council) must be assured by the school boards that an effort will be made to comply with certain conditions set forth by the government.

The main bone of contention here is the government's requirement that an advisory committee be set up to help the Superintendent in the hiring of the non-professionals for the project.

Kentucky's State Department of Education says this is in direct violation to the Kentucky State which gives Superintendents the

final say-so in the hiring of all school personnel. Several school systems throughout the state have already accepted the grant with this condition and the condition that the committee also recommend to the Superintendent the Director of the program.

Fayette County's School Board has refused so far to accept this grant under these conditions, while the Lexington City School Board agreed at a closed meeting of the board Monday night to conduct a Head Start program this summer. Lexington's action came after CALF (Community Action Lexington-Fayette County) gave written assurance that the school board would have "final discretion" in personnel matters.

According to Mrs. Neureul Miracle, Superintendent of Rockcastle County Schools, the school board requested her to write the OEO office in Washington asking that the county be allowed to operate the Head Start program under old guidelines. Mrs. Miracle said that she had not as yet received an answer to her letter. Mrs. Miracle also stated that the funds authorized by the government would not be sufficient to operate the program since the school system could "not afford the \$14,413 which is the non-federal share."

Last year, the OEO furnished Rockcastle's Head Start funds except for about \$6,000 which the county system put up.

50th Anniversary Observed

On June 5, 1967, the nation will observe the 50th anniversary of the first registration of the 1917 draft act. Local boards throughout the state are observing the golden anniversary of the 1917 Act. The Governor of Kentucky, Edward T. Breathitt, has proclaimed the week of June 25-31 as "Selective Service Week in Kentucky."

Four registrations, one day each, were held during the entire 18 months of World War I. Approximately 10,000,000 men between the ages of 21 and 31 were registered on June 5, 1917. Registration was 24,234,021.

During World War I, the honorable A.O. Stanley was Governor of the Commonwealth. Major Henry F. Rhodes, a native of Fleming County, was the State Director. Major Rhodes reported for active duty on December 4, 1917, and was relieved from this assignment on May 15, 1919. The other officer on duty with Kentucky State Headquarters was Lt. Lewis S. McMurtry, Medical Corps.

County Agents Notes

CHIGGERS

For several years now we have had repellents which will effectively protect you against chiggers and many other bothersome insects. If used according to directions they will give you a great deal of relief. Another thing that will help a great deal is to take a good soapy bath immediately on coming in from the woods or briar patches. For a few hours after they get on you, the chiggers just roam around over your skin. Apparently they are looking for a good spot for their permanent operations. If before they get located, you take a good soapy bath, you have a good chance of washing them off. Also the "800" may be a big help in washing off any poison ivy you may have picked up.

TIME TO PRUNE SPRING FLOWERING SHRUBS
Spring-flowering shrubs should be pruned soon after flowering. To do a good job of annual pruning, remove as much as a third of the canes. The older canes should be the ones removed and these are taken out to within a couple of inches of the ground. Many people cut off or "bod off" the entire top of the plant, which is not the

correct way to prune. The right way is to remove some of the older and larger canes to the ground. This preserves the shape of the plant.

ARE YOU FEELING MAY OR PASTURE YIELDS THIS FALL?
Get the soil tested now and, if limestone is needed, put it on as soon as possible. Agricultural limestone reacts slowly in the soil. It takes limestone several months to "soak in" and for that reason it should be spread several months before seeding a crop, especially legumes, on strongly acid soils. Limestone applied to the land in late or early summer will be exposed to the weather and will react to the soil to some extent before the crop is seeded this fall. Limestone will react more quickly and to a greater extent if it is plowed or disked in. For that reason limestone needs to be worked into the soil as soon as possible.

BAGWORMS
If during the winter you had spindle-shaped bags hanging on your juniper, cedar or arbor-vitae, the chances are good that they were bagworms. In late spring, eggs in these bags will hatch out and you'll find you may have thousands of little bagworms. Best thing to do is to

pick off the bags and burn them before the eggs hatch. If the eggs do hatch then, it's more of a job. The newly hatched worms cover themselves with a small silken bag which in turn is covered with bits of the plant foliage. They are so well camouflaged as to make them very difficult to see. Unless you look very closely you may not see them even though the plant is literally c/o'wing with them. While these bagworms are very small, they are easily killed by spraying with arsenate of lead. Use 3 tablespoonsful of arsenate of lead to each gallon of water.

After the bags get a little larger, say half inch or longer, it is best to kill them with Malathion. Use 1 tablespoonful of 57% Malathion to each gallon of water.

Bagworms are very destructive to juniper, cedar and arbor-vitae. They can eat all the leaves of a plant within a very few days and, with evergreens, that usually kills the plants.

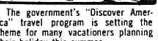
