### SUMMER LAWN CARE

When we see a good looking lawn in mid-summer, we can be sure we are looking at a lawn that has been cared for by a person familiar with the basic principles of lawn care. The hot, dry weather of July and August is a trying time for a lawn of Kentucky bluegrass. Many people tend to forget about the lawn now, because mowing is less frequent, vacations are in mind, and many are discouraged by a poorer turf. However, just as in the spring, the lawn needs proper care to maintain a reasonably good turf.

### MOWING

Numerous experiments have shown that vigor of grass is related to the leaf area exposed to sunlight. To maintain a vigorous lawn, we should not mow lower than we should not mow lower than 2 inches high. Many people believe close mowing reduces the number of times grass needs to be cut. This is not true; the "needs-mowing" look of a lawn is due to a "ragged" appearance rather than the height. Mowing high is especially important during the summer months.

### WATERING

A bluegrass lawn does not necessarily have to be watered at this time of year. Grass will turn brown when a dry period exceeds 10 days or 2 weeks, but the possibility of a drought severe enough to kill an established bluegrass lawn is almost non-existent. Proper irrigation will keep a lawn looking green during periods of drought, but it will not basically improve a well managed Kentucky bluegrass lawn.

If irrigation is used to keep a turf green, the lawn should be thoroughly soaked at frequent intervals. During dry periods, 3/4 to 1 inch of water should be applied each week. Watering, with small amounts at irregular intervals does little or no good.

### FERTILIZING

Generally speaking, you should not fertilize the lawn now. Wait until the last two weeks of September before applying additional fertilizer. This fall application should be 10 to 15 pounds of 10-6-4, 10-5-5 or similar analysis fertilizer, or an analysis based on soil test results.

### WEED CONTROL

Cultural practices are recognized as the most satisfactory method of weed control. This is proper mowing

height, correct watering, and fertilizing. However, for lawns infested with broad-leaf weeds -- such as dandelion, plantain, and others -- control can be achieved by using 2, 4-D or other recommended herbicides.

### SUMMER ANNUAL GRASSES PROVIDE GOOD FORAGE FOR KENTUCKY FARMS

Kentucky farmers grow from 50,000 to 60,000 acres annually of summer annual grasses such as Piper sudan grass, sudan-sorghum hybrids, and sudan-sudan hybrid grasses.

These provide excellent grazing, particularly when there are food shortages says Warren Thompson, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service forage specialist.

He lists several points to remember in using these annual crops:

1) Seeding time is from mid-May to mid-July. It takes 4 to 5 weeks from seeding time to grazing, depending on moisture available and time of seeding.

2) Maintain a PH (acidity level) of 5.9 to 7.0. Phosphate and potash applications should be at the same rate for 100 bushels of corn an acre. Generally, 200 pounds of nitrogen an acre is needed, put on 100 pounds (300 pounds of ammonium nitrate equivalent) prior to seeding and work it in. Make two more applications of 50 pounds of

nitrogen each after first and second harvests.

3) Use excellent land, and prepare a good seedbed. A good crop of these grasses should give feed for two or three animals an acre for 100 days.

4) Seed one-third of the necessary acreage at a time, about 7 to 10 days apart. Broadcast 25 to 35 pounds an acre, or drill 20 to 25 pounds an acre. In 36 inch rows, use 10 to 15 pounds seed an acre.

5) These summer grasses are excellent emergency crops for grazing and green-chop. Production costs are somewhat higher than perennial grasses or legumes.

### 1957 RED CLOVER CROP HIT HARD, U.K. FORAGE SPECIALISTS REPORT

Kentucky's 1957 red clover crop has been hit hard this year, report Dr. N.L. Taylor and W.C. Thompson, University of Kentucky Ag. Experiment Station and Cooperative Extension Service forage specialists.

They attributed the "sick" look to several factors, but say the second growth (after first harvest) looks good and appears to be making a good recovery.

Several factors are responsible, they say.

1) Early growth was followed by hard frozes in March. "This early start caused unseasonable maturity, and many stands stopped growing at 6 to 10 inches height. This started a chain reaction that made insects and diseases more important in reducing stands," they said.

2) Diseases took their toll. Northern anthracnose hit this year's crop. Clover leaf weevil and alfalfa weevil also took their toll. Spittlebug damage was more serious this year than in the past. Black root rot disease, a fungus, also hit hard.

"Clover sickness from black root rot probably will be best controlled by rotation to new areas and by avoiding areas which have been in tobacco several years."

The first cut probably has been made, the specialists say. If not, the herbage and take it off for hay or silage. New growth, if the stand is still alive should come on rapidly, they say. Check area extension offices in the counties for more information on handling the clover crop.

### PASTURE MANAGEMENT TIPS FOR BEEF PRODUCERS

Stocking rate, size of field, and the length of time cattle are left on a pasture for grazing are factors that can have a great effect on the cattle and the productivity of the grazing area.

Many times cattle are returned into a pasture and more or less forgotten until some convenient time or conditions force change of pastures.

Consideration of the following points will benefit both the cattle and the pasture as cattlemen utilize the forage growth to the fullest extent.

Better use of pasture areas can be accomplished by paying attention to the following factors:

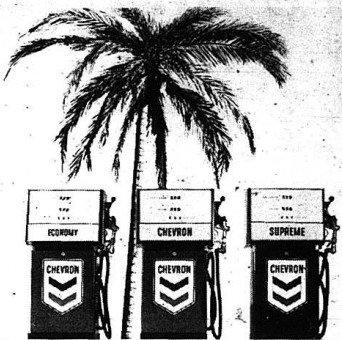

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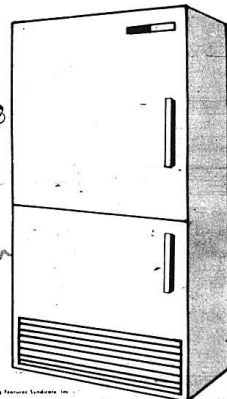

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rapid growing periods this may mean cutting 5-10 beef units per acre, and during drought periods it could mean one beef unit to 3-4 acres.

b) Size of field - by use of temporary fences, if needed, field size can be arranged so cattle will consume pasture at maximum efficiency with a minimum of tramp-down or waste and more efficient utilization of available forage.

c) Length of grazing time - this is an important factor for the following reasons:

- 1) staying on a pasture too long is detrimental to grasses and legumes in the pasture stand and favors weeds population and growth,
- 2) external and internal parasite populations increase

rapidly when cattle are left in a pasture area for long periods of time. Twenty-one days of continuous grazing on a pasture area is about maximum time depending on age and weather conditions. When cattle are young, parasites have more detrimental effect, mainly due to the smaller body size, thus pasture management is most critical.

d) Pasture management - In addition to stocking rate, size of grazing area, and length of grazing time there are other practices of management such as fertility program, seeding mixtures and pasture clipping. Fertilization and selection of seeding mixtures are generally given more consideration in establishing pasture for beef cattle. On the other hand, many people fail to realize the importance in controlling weed growth, causing pasture growth to be more uniform, palatability, and overall improved production as a result of clipping pastures at the time cattle are rotated to another pasture area.

To realize the greatest production from pasture areas consider these important points of management that have been discussed.

MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, HELD THE 1st DAY OF MAY 1957.

A regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Brodhead, Rockcastle County, Kentucky was held at Brodhead at the City Hall on the 1st day of May 1957. There were present: Clarence E. Bradley, Mayor, who presided and the following councilmen: Loyd Adams, Johnny Wilcop and Bobby Proctor.

E. H. Robbins, Clerk, was also present, recorded, and the following commitments were adopted: Treston Farret.

The members constituted a quorum.

The following ordinance was introduced by councilman, Bobby Proctor, seconded by Johnny Wilcop, and publicly read by the Clerk, E. H. Robbins.

An ordinance providing for the sale of a franchise or privilege to construct, lay, maintain, operate, repair and remove mains, pipes and connections, and appurtenant equipment for the purpose of transporting, distributing and vending natural and artificial gas or a mixture of said gases for public and private uses along, under, over and across the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds of the City of Brodhead, Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for a period of twenty (20) years.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRODHEAD does hereby ordain as follows:

That the right and privilege to use the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds within the city limits of the City of Brodhead for the purpose of constructing, laying, maintaining, operating, repairing and removing mains, pipes and connections, and appurtenant equipment through which to transport and vend natural and artificial gas or a mixture of said gases for a period of twenty (20) years, be duly advertised for sale publicly to the highest and best bidder, the City of Brodhead reserving the right to reject any and all bids; but which franchise, right and privilege shall not be exclusive for any part of such twenty (20) year period.

Said sale shall be made for cash in hand at time of sale, plus all cost of advertising and selling. Said sale shall be subject to confirmation by ratification or rejection by the City Council of the City of Brodhead, Ky., and if the sale shall not be so confirmed and ratified, the amount shall be returned to the successful bidder.

The sale of the franchise herein contemplated shall be made by E. H. Robbins, City Clerk of the City of Brodhead, or by someone designated by him, who is hereby commissioned to make due advertisement of said sale, which advertisement shall include a description of said franchise, right and privilege in the Mt. Vernon Signal, a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and by posting typewritten notices of sale in three public places in the City of Brodhead for at least ten (10) days next before June 30 1957, on which date, between the hours of 1:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m., he shall at the front door of the CITY HALL in the City of Brodhead offer for sale at public outcry to the highest and best bidder for cash in hand or certificate check, plus cost including advertising cost, the franchise, right and privilege

herein contemplated. The newspaper advertisement aforesaid shall be published in the three issues of the aforesaid newspaper most preceding the date of sale. The aforesaid Clerk shall submit a report of such sale in writing to the City Council of the City of Brodhead at its next regular meeting.

The terms and conditions of the franchise and privilege so to be advertised and offered for sale, and to be granted in the event the sale is confirmed by the City Council shall be as follows: (Section 1.) The purchaser, his successors or assigns, shall have the franchise, privilege, right and power to open the streets, avenues, alleys, lanes and public grounds within the city limits of the City of Brodhead and to introduce thereunder, construct, lay, maintain, operate, repair and remove mains and pipes with street boxes, valves, gauges, regulators, meters, house connections and other connections, overhead, under, across, in and upon said streets, alleys, lanes and public grounds, necessary or convenient for the purpose of conveying, transporting, distributing and vending natural and artificial gas or a mixture of said gases, for public and private uses, during a term of twenty (20) years after the date of the ratification of such sale; but under the restrictions and subject expressly to the provisions herein contained.

(Section 2.) All excavations made by the purchaser, his or its successors or assigns, for introduction, maintenance, repair or removal of such mains, pipes and appliances shall be made with the least practicable inconvenience to the public or individuals and with all reasonable dispatch, and shall be protected properly at all time to avoid danger, and all damage to streets, sidewalks or other public property caused by such excavations shall be repaired by the purchaser, his or its successors or assigns, at his or their proper cost and without unnecessary delay, and he or they shall fall or neglect to remove all obstructions caused by him or them or shall fall or neglect to make unnecessary repairs within a reasonable time, the City of Brodhead may remove or repair the same, after reasonable notice of its intention so to do, at the cost of the purchaser or the then owner and holder of said franchise; and the purchaser, his or its successors or assigns, shall be responsible for all injuries or damage to persons or property occasioned by want of care in opening, closing or repairing, in any other manner unnecessarily or carelessly obstructing said streets, avenues, lanes or public grounds.

(Section 3.) All mains, pipes and appliances shall be so constructed, laid, placed and main-

tained as not in any manner to interfere with the drainage of the City, or with underground fixtures for the conveyance of water. All work done under the provisions of said franchise shall be subject to the approval of the engineer of the City of Brodhead and will and without further consent of some other authorized agent of the City.

(Section 4.) The purchaser, his or its successors or assigns, shall have the right to remove all mains, pipes, connections, appliances and other property from the streets, avenues, lanes, or his heirs, personal representatives, successors or assigns of the City of Brodhead within a reasonable time after the expiration or other termination of this franchise.

(Section 5.) The franchise, right and privilege so to be advertised and offered for sale, and to be granted in the event the sale is confirmed by the City Council shall be as follows: (Section 1.) The purchaser, his or its successors or assigns, shall have the franchise, privilege, right and power to open the streets, avenues, alleys, lanes and public grounds within the city limits of the City of Brodhead and to introduce thereunder, construct, lay, maintain, operate, repair and remove mains and pipes with street boxes, valves, gauges, regulators, meters, house connections and other connections, overhead, under, across, in and upon said streets, alleys, lanes and public grounds, necessary or convenient for the purpose of conveying, transporting, distributing and vending natural and artificial gas or a mixture of said gases, for public and private uses, during a term of twenty (20) years after the date of the ratification of such sale; but under the restrictions and subject expressly to the provisions herein contained.

## Assault Charges Continued To July Term of Circuit Court

Two cases of assault and battery, one assault with a deadly weapon charge, a reckless driving charge, and a breach of peace charge were continued to the July term of Circuit Court Monday by County Judge Wayne Vanhook.

The charges allegedly stem from incidents which took place May 11 and May 22 of this year on the Old Copper Creek Road between Clarence E. Riddle of Brodhead and Mrs. Kenneth McGuire of Route 3, Crab Orchard.

According to Mrs. McGuire, Riddle stopped her car on the road, insulted her and took her car keys away from her. Mrs. McGuire filed a complaint charging breach of peace following this incident.

Mr. Riddle filed a reckless driving charge against Mrs. McGuire following the incident, charging the Mrs. McGuire had been unlawfully operating a motor vehicle in a reckless and negligent manner.

The other charges allegedly stem from an encounter the following day, May 12, between Mrs. McGuire, her husband, and Riddle on the same road.

One of the assault and battery charges was filed by Riddle against Kenneth McGuire after, according to Riddle, his car was stopped by the McGuire's and McGuire "unlawfully committed assault and battery upon the affiant (Riddle) by striking and beating him with his fist, upon the affiant's head and body."

The other assault and battery charge was filed by Kenneth McGuire against Riddle. The complaint reads in part that Riddle "unlawfully assaulted and battered the affiant (McGuire) by striking him and twisting his arm thereby breaking bones in the arm of the affiant."

A charge of assault with a deadly weapon was filed against Mrs. McGuire by Riddle who claimed that Mrs. McGuire "unlawfully and feloniously struck the affiant (Riddle) with a gun, a heavy object and a deadly weapon, upon the affiant's head and body with the intent to kill the affiant but from which injuries the affiant did not die."

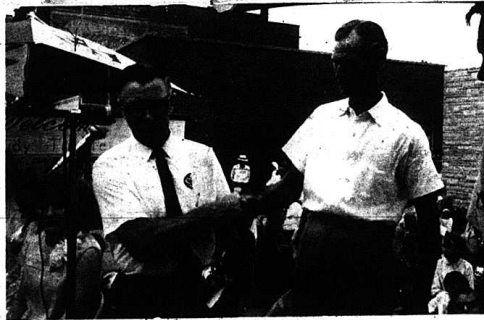
