### Hazards To Health Now

Winter is commonly the time for colds and flu and, besides, there are some diseases and accidents that do their worst in hot weather.

The American Medical Association points out that some of these are obvious. Sun strokes and heat strokes are more likely to occur in July and August than in January. Too much exposure and too much exercise in the hot sun may produce sun stroke. Prolonged excessive heat, either in or out of doors, can cause heat stroke. The symptoms are the same and in either case it is important to keep the victim cool and call a physician at once. Heat

prostration also is caused by getting overheated, but instead of developing a high fever, the victim becomes cold and clammy. Prompt medical attention and keeping the patient as warm as possible are important.

Sunburn has hospitalized many a vacationer. Everyone should know that gradual exposure to the sun, beginning with a few minutes a day, is the recommended course. But many of us forget to watch the clock and to take precautions against sunburn in the excitement of the first day at camp or at the seashore.

The bacteria that cause diarrhea multiply much faster in lukewarm liquids, and it's important to keep cold foods in refrigeration and to keep hot foods hot.

Swimming is fine exercise and also is good for cooling off on a hot day. Those with sinus or ear troubles should be careful about swimming. Swimmers should make

certain that the water is safe from pollution. A clear mountain stream may look attractive. It also may be loaded with crabs. And there still are cases of typhoid and dysentery from drinking untreated water.

Campers can disinfect water by boiling or by commercial disinfectant tablets.

If there are horses or cows around, there is likely to be tetanus. Tetanus (lockjaw) is very serious. It can be prevented by injections of tetanus toxoid. If your family hasn't had tetanus boosters recently, get your shots before going to the country.

Mosquitoes, mosquitoes and ticks are troublesome in the hot months. Insecticides and screens usually can keep them under control. In tick country it is essential to make a close examination after dismounting to remove all ticks.

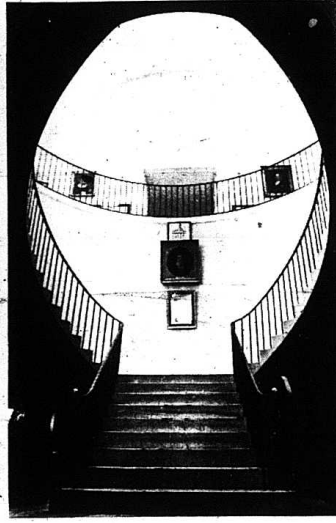

The circular self-supporting staircase, made of Kentucky river marble, is supported by the arch action of each stone step upon the other and is locked with the top step, the keystone. To move the keystone one-tenth of an inch would destroy the entire structure. The building and staircase were designed by a 25-year-old architect, Gideon Shryock, of Lexington, in 1827.

Drink more liquids than usual, but take extra salt only on your physician's advice, particularly if you have liver or kidney trouble or a heart condition.

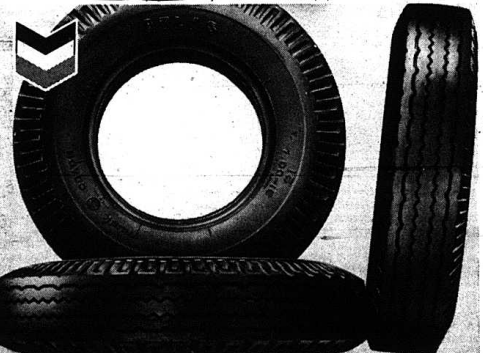

## Wreck Injuries Fatal To Everett F. Harper

Hall, 59, of Winamac, Ind., slid into the rear of Harper's van knocking it into the northbound lane and into the path of a car driven by Carl M. Hammetts, 59, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Harper, an employee of Sanitary Cleaners in Mt. Vernon, was driving a van belonging to the cleaners. The van was totally demolished.

Harper was rushed to Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital and immediately transferred to Berea College Hospital where he died about one-half hour after arrival.

Hall, his wife and daughter were uninjured.

Mt. Vernon Troop 156, newly organized under the direction of Charles Alfred Mullins, Scoutmaster, consists of four troops. "We are extremely pleased with the interest shown and

the progress made by the Mt. Vernon Troop although it is ironic in a way that this Troop has been inactive for so long since Mt. Vernon is one of the closest towns to the McKee Boy Scout Reservation located at Mt. Sterling," Mr. Barton told the Signal.

A Court of Honor ceremony will be held in Mt. Vernon July 27 to present Tenderfoot badges to 35 Boy Scouts from the Mt. Vernon Troop who have achieved this rank. Location for the ceremony has been tentatively set for the Mt. Vernon Christian Church.

Troop 82 from Somerset will conduct the ceremony. The Boy Scout Organization in recognition of National Boy Scout week in Somerset, the donation amounted to about \$200, according to Mr. Barton.

The Boy Scout Organization is the largest boy's organization in the area.

## City Sells Buildings On Lake Linville Property

The City Council of Mt. Vernon opened sealed bids for buildings located on the site of Lake Linville at Renfro Valley at their regular monthly meeting last Thursday night.

All of the buildings except one were purchased by the original owners. Mrs. Esther Griffin's barn was bid by another party. Mrs. Griffin submitted no bid for the building.

The City Water Department will realize about \$1550 from the sale of the buildings.

Mayor Clyde Linville commented to the Council members that they would probably be criticized for selling the buildings for the amount received but that he hoped that people would realize that to move the buildings off the land would probably cost the purchaser as much as it would to build the buildings now. The land must be cleared by September 15 when the dam, now under construction, is scheduled for completion.

The old Chestnut home located on James O. Smith's land, which the city purchased, was given to John Lair at Renfro Valley on the condition that Mr. Lair move the dwelling at his own expense.

The home, which is now the oldest house in Rockcastle County will be moved to Mr. Lair's property at Renfro where he plans to restore it and have it open to the public at no charge.

The Council was then informed that the Louisville and Nashville Railroad had agreed to lease their property located at the corner of River and Street to the city for a municipal parking lot for the sum of \$25 a year. The lease is to run for 5 years.

The lease from L. N. stipulated that no parking meters could be installed and no other charge could be made for parking there by motorists.

Councilman Carl Kelley raised an objection to the city leasing the location under the "no charge" stipulation. Since the city has had to lay off one city policeman and take various other economy measures and since the town is without police protection for a period of time, he stated, "I am against paying L. N. \$25 a year for a parking lot on which the city can realize no revenue," Mr. Kelley stated.

He also pointed out that with the city's present condition it would cost the city quite a bit to fix it up for use.

Councilman Bob Jasper suggested that local merchants would no doubt put up the lease fee themselves since the parking lot would

be a great asset to them. To back up his statement, Jasper then donated \$5 toward the fee and four others present immediately followed suit. The others donating \$5 were Councilman Ed Winstead, City Police Judge Sam Hoskins, Mayor Clyde Linville, and City Treasurer Jess Bullock.

Councilman Winstead then made a motion that the council authorize Mayor Linville to sign the contract with L. N. All voted in favor with the exception of Kelley.

City Magistrate G. H. (Hobe) Griffin to approach Fiscal Court about supplying the necessary equipment to clean up the area. Griffin agreed that it behooved the court at its next regular meeting. Griffin was also asked to contact individuals for donations to blacktop the lot.

Oscar Bullock, a resident of Terry Street in Owens Subdivision, then asked the Council if anything had ever been decided about fixing the street he lives on. Councilman Fred Morris,

a member of the Council's Street Committee, told Mr. Bullock that the Committee had looked into the situation and had found that with the drain ditches in their present condition it would be a waste of taxpayers money to repair the street until the ditches were cleaned out.

He stated that the ditches were being filled with debris, obstructing the flow of water and washing the street out.

The Council then voted unanimously to publish a city ordinance giving property owners in Mt. Vernon, where these conditions exist, a 30-day notice to purchase tile for their own drain ditching. After these tiles are purchased, the city will clean out the drains and lay the tile.

The council decided that after the 30-day notice was issued to the property owners, if they failed to comply a \$25 fine would be imposed on them. The ordinance will appear in the Signal in the near future.

## New Night Set For School Board Meeting

At the regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County School Board, the Board voted to change the regular meeting night to the first Thursday night of each month at 7:30 p.m. The Board has previously met the first Monday night at 7 p.m.

Sealed bids for purchase of the old Chestnut Ridge school building were opened. Amos A. Dwee submitted high bid of \$97.50.

Bids for Rockcastle County School Bus Insurance were opened and State Farm Insurance submitted the low bid of \$1,635. Bill Bailey is State Farm's local agent.

The Board voted to submit an application to the State for several emergency teaching certificates.

According to Mrs. Neuroll Miracle, superintendent, not quite enough fully qualified teachers have applied

for positions. The Board asked for the emergency certificates if they cannot find enough qualified teachers before school opens.

A person must have 64 college hours to get an emergency certificate.

No emergency certificates will be issued for positions in the consolidated schools in the county.

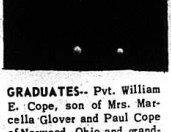

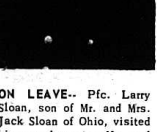

## Area Agent's Notes

**MAKING FAMILY AGREEMENTS, WHEN FATHER AND SON FARM TOGETHER**

Family farming agreements are becoming increasingly important. When two or more families are sharing in the income from a farm business, a basis for deciding how the income will be shared needs to be agreed on in advance. From a business standpoint this is just as important in making an agreement between a father and son or other relatives as it is between unrelated families. An agreement as to division of income and usually including the sharing of farm operating expenses, decreases misunderstanding and encourages interest in the efficient operation of the farm business by all concerned. When they begin making their own living by farming, most young men begin by arranging some kind of farming agreement with their father, mother (in case the father is deceased), grandfather or other relatives.

At this time of year many young men on farms have finished high school or returned from service in the U.S. armed forces, or have married and are faced with a new responsibility of providing for their own livelihood. If a farmer and one or more of his sons have developed, or can develop, a farm business large enough to provide them with productive employment, this usually pro-

vides the best opportunity for the interested young farmer to get well established in farming. In some instances a father and son may rent or buy additional farm land in order to have a large enough business for both of them.

The usual setup of a family farm business agreement is that each party to the agreement is paid (at conservative values) for what he contributes (such as labor) or for the use of what he furnishes to the farm business.

All farm expenses are paid out of a farm business bank account; and any balance of income from the farm business that remains after paying the expenditures of the business will be divided according to the agreement made at the beginning of the year.

An example of a simplified father-son agreement can be obtained from your county extension office.

**GRAIN-FOR-FORAGE SUBSTITUTE INVOLVES FIGURING, U. K. SAYS**

Farmers like sometimes to substitute grain for forage for their livestock. But this takes observation of some basic rules, says Warren Thompson, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service forage specialist.

**GRAIN-FOR-FORAGE:** When this is done, feed at least one pound of long, coarse forage for each 100 pounds of bodyweight per day. This amount (one pound per 100 pounds bodyweight) is needed to maintain normal rumen function and fat test in

dairy herds," he says. **HIGH ENERGY GRAIN FOR EXCELLENT FORAGE:** If you want to substitute high energy grain for excellent forage, one pound of grain is equal to approximately two pounds of forage on a net-energy basis. "The ration needs to be balanced for other nutrients, especially protein, minerals and vitamins," Mr. Thompson says. (Note: The letter printed below was written by Mr. F. W. Rickard, Winchester, Kentucky):

**TO THOSE INTERESTED IN TOBACCO:**

"Many areas are greatly affected by tobacco blooming prematurely this year. Farmers are very much disturbed about it and, naturally, they feel that it is coming from the breeding and cross breeding of tobacco; but we can assure you that it is happening in all varieties. Thus far, we have found three of the standard varieties that are blooming very low and some of the hybrids. The standard varieties seem really to be blooming lower than the hybrids.

We have been to a number of farms where this has happened, and have had representatives of the University of Kentucky with us. We are very definite that it is a weather condition. One of the plant breeders has found that he can get tobacco to bloom at about any number of leaves by turning a jet of cold air on the plants at certain times. We know that this year plants came on early and had a good start and then the cold spell came and stopped them from growing for ten days. As an indication of how critical temperature can be, one man reported having one tree or

the hill and one by the creek out of the same package. Plants from one bed are fine, the other blooming low. This does not mean that the lowest temperature is always the critical temperature.

If this is happening in your area, please check on the time that the beds were sowed and whether they are on the hill or in low land. There is some indication that the early seeded beds are much more affected than the late seeded beds. The only suggestion we have had so far is as follows: Some farmers say that when a plant blooms too extremely low, they can cut it off, leaving two good leaves, and produce a good plant of tobacco. We have not had this kind of experience but it seems logical that this would probably be true.

Naturally, it is difficult for the farmer to think it is a weather condition and not a fault of the variety, but we are assured that it is happening in all varieties.

The American Medical Association cautions that if you're headed for some really high mountains, above 7000 feet, it would be wise to make the change gradually if you wish to avoid "high altitude sickness." Anyone who has made a trip to Mexico City can tell you of his troubles in this respect.  
Try, if you can, to make the

ascend over a span of days so that your body can adjust to the oxygen-poor "thin air" at higher elevations. Gaugons' Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.  
Symptoms of high-altitude sickness are drowsiness; headache; blueness of the nails, lips, nose and ears; a feeling of warmth and flushing of the face soon after arrival; troubled sleep; irritability, and shortness of breath.  
There are some precautions that may help prevent distress if you have to make a fast trip from a low level to high elevations. Before the trip, get a good night's rest.

Patients with certain heart and respiratory conditions may encounter more serious discomfort by abrupt changes in high altitudes. However, physicians have noted that most patients with cardiac or pulmonary disease who can move around and engage in moderate activity at sea level most often can tolerate altitudes of 7,000 to 8,000 feet without serious effect.  
If you have doubts as to whether you or someone in your family may suffer from a trip to the high mountains, consult your physician in advance.

The Arab-Israeli War of 1967 lasted less than a week. Although Israeli casualties were amazingly low, Arab dead and wounded mounted to the tens of thousands. Israel's out-of-pocket costs are estimated at \$800 million, while the cost to the Arab nations must be reckoned in billions. While this may still not convince us of the complete futility of the war, it should at least drive home the fact that even little wars are far too expensive to tolerate.

**COST IS PROHIBITIVE**  
Israel and the Arab nations are poles apart on many issues, but surely their estrangement is no greater than that between the victors and the vanquished in World War II who found a way to rise above their animosities and work together for the reconstruction of their homelands. What the Israeli and their Arab neighbors do have in common are problems of taxation, heavy defense burdens, irrigation costs, difficulties of reclaiming the desert and making it productive, and the need to lift the regional
