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## Babson's Authentic Report

**COMING - TAX BATTLE**  
Will Uncle Sam be taking a bigger tax bite out of your paycheck before the end of 1967? By January 1968 in his State of the Union message last January, President Johnson recommended a tax surcharge of 6%. Since then, neither LBJ nor the Congress has shown any insistence on upping the federal tax take. But the tace is about over. The tax-hike battle will soon be joined amid sounds of rising fury.

**YEAR OF GREAT DEFICIT**  
Our government's New Year has just begun. It will end June 30, 1968. Economists, legislators, accountants, financiers -- and just plain citizens who have been watching the U. S. spending spree shift into high gear -- are shocked by the prospect of a federal deficit that may hit the \$30-billion mark for this fiscal year.

Despite this towering evidence of budget mismanagement, our Administration and our Congress continue to amble along a path of business-as-usual. Here and there you hear of the upcoming deficit as the "greatest

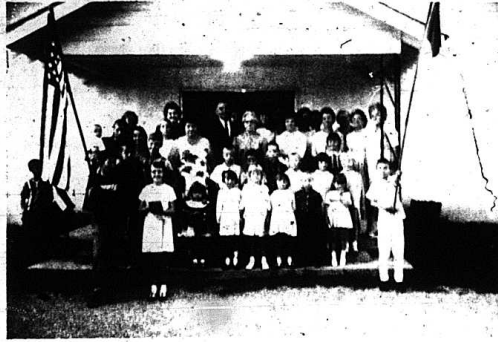
in peccetite." Unfortunately, the nation is engaged in one of the biggest, though undeclared, wars in our history.

**HIGHWAY TO INFLATION**  
Remember the days of President Franklin Roosevelt? He took office at the depth of our most severe depression. His "brain trust" (that was before the time of the Council of Economic Advisers) recommended that he spend a great deal more than would be taken in through taxes. This was called "priming the pump." The idea was that the additional dollars spent by Uncle Sam would find their way into consumers' pockets, and hence "prime" the business "pump." Hopefully, prosperity would be restored.

Both President Roosevelt and his advisers were sorely disappointed. Business and employment did pick up slowly for some years; but there followed the severe depression of 1937-1938. Unemployment climbed back to a staggering 9 million. It did not subside substantially until World War II vastly stimulated demands both abroad and at home. Despite controls, higher taxes, and price ceilings, wartime deficits created huge additions to U. S. money supplies. At the end of hostilities, our tremendous monetary expansion provided a broad highway to inflation. Wages and prices triply exploded.

**REPEAT PERFORMANCE**  
Right now it looks as if we are going to have a repeat performance. The Federal Reserve is upping the money supplies of the nation at an 8% yearly clip. This at a time when the government is heading toward a \$30-billion deficit. The combination of an easy-money policy and a huge "pump priming" makes a renewed surge in prices almost a certainty.

That is what all the "hot-

ling" will be about in the weeks just ahead. The "kickoff" was done the last week in June by Mr. Martin, head of the Federal Reserve Board, calling loudly for an income tax increase. Then Mr. Ackley, top man in the President's Economic Council, got into the bigger-tax lineup.

### HEAVY OPPOSITION TO BIGGER TAXES

Despite the formidable support and prestigious names plumping for increased income taxes, there is no guarantee that Congress will vote them...at least not soon. Many legislators are not convinced that rising money supplies will produce an automatic pickup in total business. They do not agree with the Council of Economic Advisers that the coming fourth quarter will bring a sizable upswing in sales and profits.

More important, the opposition points to the Council's earlier belief that a business recovery would be under way by early July. Congressmen and Senators ask themselves:

"What if business does not surge ahead in the fourth quarter? If a new boom fails to 'catch on,' we may be blamed later for having killed the goose that lays the golden eggs." This is why we predict that an early tax boost will be hard to come by. The bigger-tax advocates may win in the end; but the battle will be drawn out. And the actual levy may not be effective before the turn of the year.

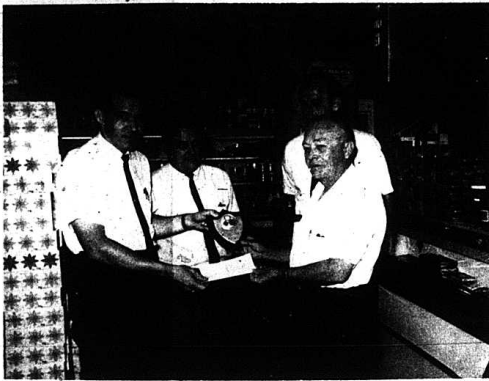

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## Area Agent's Notes

### OLD TOBACCO BEDS NEED DESTROYING

In order to avoid some problems in next spring's tobacco plant bed, there needs to be some thought given to where next year's plant bed will be located.

If the same site used this year will be used again next year, it is extremely important that this year's planted receive attention now.

When setting is completed, the plant beds should be plowed to destroy the remaining plants. The soil should be thoroughly prepared to provide a good seedbed, and seeded to cowpeas, soybeans, or some other broad-leaved legume to provide a dense covering during the summer. Fertilizing the legume ahead of seeding with a mixed fertilizer, containing phosphate and potash, coupled with inoculation of the legume seed provides for maximum growth of the crop and reduces the need for using chemical fertilizers on the plant bed in the spring. This program provides for highly fertile soils for growing the plants and prevents fertilizer injury to the young plants.

When not plan now to prepare your 1968 planted this fall. Many farmers throughout the state are avoiding the spring rush and also avoiding some of the usual

plant bed diseases and other problems by preparing and treating their plantbeds in the fall.

For fall planted preparation, the last half of September, or the first half of October is an ideal time for this job.

### GRUB CONTROL MEANS PROFITS TO KENTUCKY BEEF PRODUCERS

If your cattle herd is infested with grubs, you are losing money. Some packers will not buy on slaughter cattle that are grubbed because the animals are "money-losers" in the cooler and hides are heavily discounted.

So says Dr. Roy Gray, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service beef specialist, control these parasites. Proper treating of cattle can be done easily.

Systemic materials are highly recommended, he says. These come in materials that can be applied as backline sprays, by high pressure sprayers, by dipping, or by including in the feed or mineral supply. These materials, which control grubs before they show up on backlines, also help control lice, horn-flies and other parasites.

Grub free cattle, Dr. Gray points out, give extra weight for age, better milk production in cows, stronger buyer

appeal, reduced upkeep on hams, corks and corals, less trouble moving cattle in heat-of season, and the added bonus in control of other parasites or insects.

"There is no excuse for living with cattle grubs when producers realize what the grub costs them, they appreciate how much this control is needed."

### ALFALFA SEEDING TIME CALLS FOR ADHERENCE TO SIMPLE PRINCIPLES

Alfalfa seeding time will be here soon. Follow well-established rules to get a good stand, says Warren Thompson, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service forage specialist.

The Rules: **PLANT EARLY:** It takes up to nine weeks of growing time to get alfalfa ready for winter freezes. Seeding should start Sept. 10 in Kentucky have little chance to survive the winter in a vigorous condition. When you seed in July, pick soils free of crab grass and other late-season weeds.

**INOCULATE THE SEED:** Dampen the seed with sugar water (using as much sugar as will dissolve in the water). Sprinkle the dry inoculant on the seed and mix thoroughly. If the seed is sticky, add cornstarch, dry skim milk, wheat, flour, or similar material, so the seed will flow freely. If seeding is not finished in one day, inoculate the seed again.

**COVER THE SEED:** About one-quarter inch seems to be right depth for average conditions. Moisture, time of seeding and equipment used will affect seeding depth.

**SEED FOR A STAND:** Use 10 to 15 pounds of seed an acre if alfalfa is needed alone. Reduce the amount of alfalfa seed if you are seeding with grass. (Don't try to overcome late seedings and poor seedbed preparation with a higher seeding rate.) But, most farmers in this state go to 18 to 20 pounds of seed an acre as "insurance."

**PROPER CARE:** Don't graze or mow new seedings the first fall or winter. Harvest the following year when stand is in full bloom.

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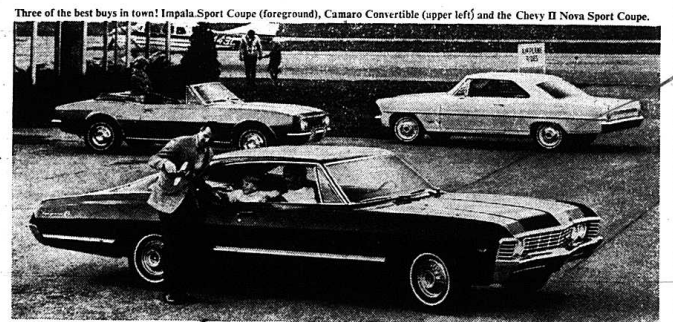
