**KENTUCKY BOWHUNTERS REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP**

Bowhunters stalking animal cut-outs along a wooded course might sound like a medieval fantasy—but not to members of the Kentucky Bowhunters Association.

This is how "they'll be shooting during the KBA-sponsored Kentucky Bowhunters Regional Championship at Corbin, Aug. 6. The meet open to anyone on central and eastern Kentucky will be held on the Knott County Bowhunters Range at 1:30 p.m. (E.S.T.). Instead of shooting at bull's-eye targets, these bowmen will follow Robin Hood style through the woods where life-size animal figures are preyed upon from undetermined range. There'll be no use of mechanical sights during the meet, a restriction that demands "instinctive shooting."

There will be four divisions involved in the shooting: Bowhunters Division, or members of the Kentucky Bowhunters Association; Associate Division, or non-club members; Ladies Division and Junior division, for participants 16 and under. The entry fee is \$2 for all divisions except the Junior one, which is \$1. No ad-

vance registration is required, but those interested in additional information may contact Jack A. Moore, Rt. 1, Box 106F, Corbin, Kentucky 40701.

The meet will last till a round 4 p.m. Spectators will be welcome free of charge, and food, soft drinks and ample parking space will be available.

**Medical ID -- Card Or Band A Lifesaver**

All over the world a simple six-sided figure has become the symbol of identification of personal medical problems.

The symbol was adopted by the American Medical Association some four years ago and three years ago was adopted by the World Medical Association as the universal indication that the individual displaying the sign has personal health problems that might require emergency attention.

Who should carry identification? Everyone, says the AMA. A card such as the AMA emergency medical identification card, is useful to identify an ill or injured person, to help locate family, friends

and personal physician, and to give information that will improve emergency care. People with special health problems should also wear a durable metal or plastic alerting signal device on their wrist, ankle or neck, indicating their need for special medical care.

The emergency medical identification card should note special problems that need immediate attention in an emergency or that could cause an emergency. For example, diabetes must be identified so that a person in diabetic coma will get proper treatment promptly.

Emergency medical identification does not mean that a person will not be overlooked during treatment for injury. The need for certain medicines must be known. Heart patients taking drugs to prevent blood clots may bleed profusely if injured unless they receive special care. Other people are sensitive to certain drugs and must never take them.

Epileptics could be saved much trouble and unnecessary hospitalization if they carried a card indicating that they may have seizures. Neck breathers (those who breathe through a tube surgically inserted below their "Adam's apple") must be recognizable to protect them from smothering.

An emergency medical identification kit may be obtained by addressing Box C, Emergency Medical Identification, American Medical Association, 535 N. Dearborn St., Chicago, Ill. 60610. Single kits are free on request. The kit contains two identification cards, a pamphlet describing the universal symbol, and a list of manufacturers of signal devices bearing this symbol.

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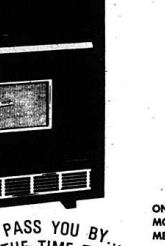

## MRS. E. DOROTHY HERD BURIED IN INDIANA

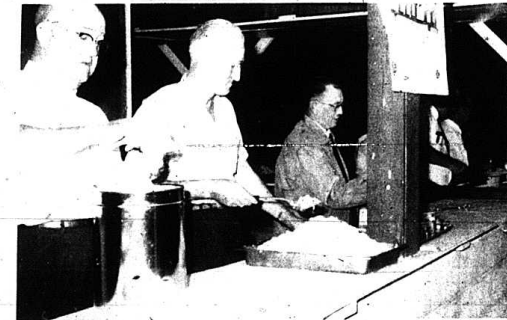

## Removal Of Fences Hold Up Road Work

Cantrill Construction Company of Lexington has been notified by the Department of Highways in Frankfort that no work on any of three county roads, which were recently scheduled for bituminous surfacing, shall be commenced until all fences have been removed from the right-of-way by the property owners.

The three roads scheduled for repairs are (1) the Scaffold Cane Road beginning at the end of bituminous surface, 3.5 miles northeast of US 25 and extending north-easterly a distance of three miles (2) Brush Creek Road beginning at the end of bituminous surface at Orlando and extending northeasterly a distance of 4.00 miles and (3) the Hansford-Level Green Road beginning at Ky. 461 and extending easterly a distance of one mile.

The contract, for a low bid of \$125,375.00, awarded to Cantrill July 5. In a letter to the Construction Company from E. P. Caldwell, District Projects Construction Engineer for the Department of Highways, Caldwell stated that "property owners along each section of these three roads have fences within the right-of-way limits. Right

of way stakes have been set and property owners have been notified to remove their fences at an early date as work would not be started until this had been done." Some property owners on all three roads have fences which must be moved from the right-of-way. "We will have our resident engineer check on these encroachments and as soon as they are removed from the right-of-way, we will notify you and you may start work at your convenience," Mr. Caldwell further stated.

### Farm Safety Urged

Farmers and farm visitors -- especially children -- were today urged to be on their guard against farm safety hazards.

Shelie Mullins, Chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, pointed out that July 23 is the start of National Farm Safety Week, as proclaimed by President Johnson. So it is a particularly appropriate time for farm families to make their farms and communities safer by eliminating hazards and unsafe practices that cause or contribute to accidents.

Many farm operations involve heavy machinery handling livestock, and strenuous physical exertion. By their nature, these require special safety precautions. Strams and water storage structures may present special hazards, particularly where children are concerned. Among these are irrigation and drainage ditches, as well as natural streams, and farm ponds and open tanks. Ponds have been installed with ACP help in all States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. Nationally ACP in recent years has stored the cost on about 50,000 to 60,000 ponds a year, for a total over the years of about 2 million. Of these, 1.6 million were constructed for livestock water, 300,000 were storage type erosion-control dams-100,000 were irrigation water-conservation reservoirs, and about 15,000 were for wildlife conservation, fish ponds, and

forest fire control.

According to the Chairman, 25 ponds and 35 water storage tanks have been built in Rockcastle County in the past 5 years under the Agricultural Conservation program.

While these very important and beneficial ACP farm ponds are constructed for agricultural and conservation purposes, fishing, swimming, boating, skating, and even water skiing are often recreational by-products. And where a person's attention is fixed on the pleasure at hand, he may not be alert to the ever-present danger around open water.

The danger may be greater if the farm pond is located some distance from the farmhouse, or if it has some deep water or steep sides, or if it slopes and banks are covered with grass and may be slippery. Having a "danger" sign, and keeping handy a boat, a length of rope, or a inflated inner tube -- or even a Tong pole -- may save a life.

So the watchword, Chairman Mullins, emphasized, is "Be Careful." Having a National Farm Safety Week just helps to stress the need for practicing safety. But we need to practice it in most farming operations and around farm installations every day of every week.

### KENTUCKY STATE POLICE

Kentucky State Police have embarked upon a program aimed at giving their manpower resources. Unable to fill the existing vacancies through normal procedures they have assigned eight officers to work full time, from July 15 to August 15 on recruiting qualified applicants. These recruiting officers, stationed in Kentucky's eight state police districts have been actively engaged in safety education work in addition to regular police duties. During this trial period they will devote full time to recruiting.

Colonel James E. Bassett said this was necessary because the shortage of troopers is critical, causing a decline in patrol coverage of highways. He further stated that the difficulty in recruiting men would not cause the State Police to let up on any of the qualifications for troopers. They are:

1. United States citizenship
  2. Age 21 to 31
  3. Height 5 ft. 9 1/2 inches. Weight 150 lbs.
  4. High School Graduate
- Applicant's must so pass physical, physical aptness and character examinations.

The new recruiting officers will make personal contact with young men who express an interest in joining the State Police. The 1966 General Assembly provided funds for 50 additional state troopers in the past fiscal year and for another 50 this fiscal year which began July 1.

## Babson's Authentic Report

**BORROWING FROM TOMORROW**  
 Last month Congress voted to increase the federal limit to the staggering total of \$365 billion. This gives Uncle Sam a green light to borrow even more and could well lead to additional hefty expansion of non-federal public debt and of private debt.

**BALLOONING FEDERAL DEBT**  
 It may be assumed that avoidance of fiscal crisis was the big motivating factor in the Administration's request for authority to create additional debt; but the size of the increase and the relative ease with which it passed Congress points up the fact that deficit financing is certainly in no immediate danger of losing favor in Washington. Time was when no federal debt could

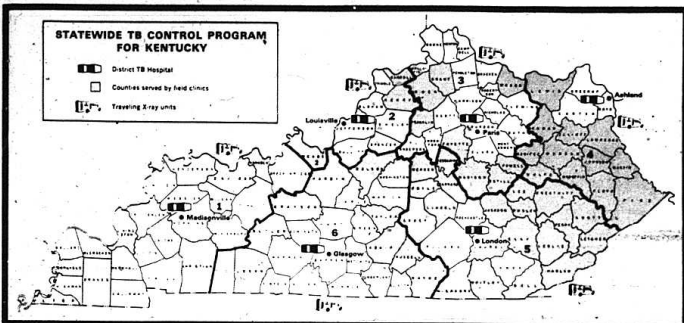
be created without a specific enabling act of Congress, identifying and limiting the purpose or program which the debt was to finance. Now, and for many years past—the Secretary of the Treasury has blanket authority to borrow, subject only to an over-all limitation by Congress which we call the "federal debt limit."  
 Deficit financing has been an easy road for Washington to follow. As a result, our federal debt—which amounted to \$54 billion in 1940—is now seven times that amount. On a per-capita basis it has expanded from \$400 to \$1,880, despite the fact that since 1940 our population has increased by about 65 million.

**ALL PUBLIC OBLIGATIONS**  
 State and local governments, too, have been finding it convenient to "borrow

from tomorrow" in financing a wide variety of projects and programs. As a result, total public debt in the U.S. has been rising at a fairly rapid pace during the past quarter century. In the decade from 1956 to 1966 these debts of all governments in our nation rose from \$348.5 billion to \$475.8 billion—an advance of 37%.  
 However, those who defend the rapid rise remind us that in the same 10 year period the Gross National Product jumped 76.4%. Because of this unprecedented economic upthrust, public debt relative to GNP stood at 64% last year, compared with 83% in 1956.

**WHAT CORPORATIONS AND INDIVIDUALS OWE**  
 But private debt—consisting of the unpaid financial obligations of both corporations and individuals—has taken the biggest jump of all. On 1955, private debt stood at \$482.5 billion. By last year, it had climbed 120% to \$1,063.4 billion.  
 When we add all the debt—public and private—it comes to the back-breaking total of \$1.5 trillion, up 85% from 10 years ago. This is about double our entire Gross National Product.

**HOW SERIOUS IS THE BURDEN?**  
 Are our debts approaching level? Unquestionably they are. The increase alone in the amount of these debts should give cause for concern; in addition, the ratio of the debts to assets itself unfavorable.  
 But probably we are still some distance from a breaking point because the real burden of any debt depends on the productivity behind it, and several times in the past our total debt relative to the GNP measure has been higher than it is today.  
 However, unless the rise in debt is curbed, we will be in peril if we should have a serious economic downturn. It is difficult, and costly, but we are still able—on balance—to make repayments on our debts, whether they be long-



**TB DETECTION-CONTROL PROGRAM**—The number of active tuberculosis cases in Kentucky has been reduced by two-thirds since 1950, primarily as a result of the State's effective detection and treatment program for TB which brings its services within reach of all Kentuckians through hospitals, field clinics and traveling X-ray units working with county health departments. 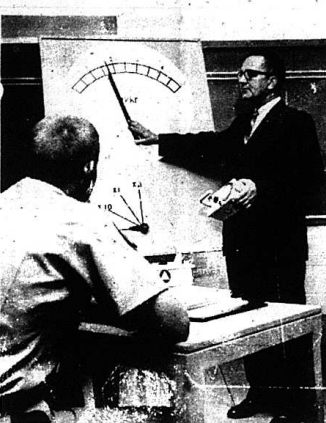
