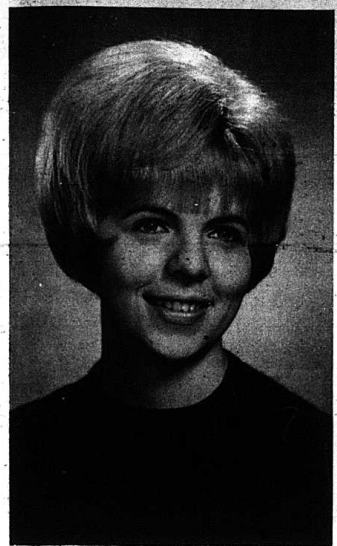

Last year's record was 4-4 and the Red Devils only have 8 returning lettermen of the 18 boys who turned out for the first practice session Monday.

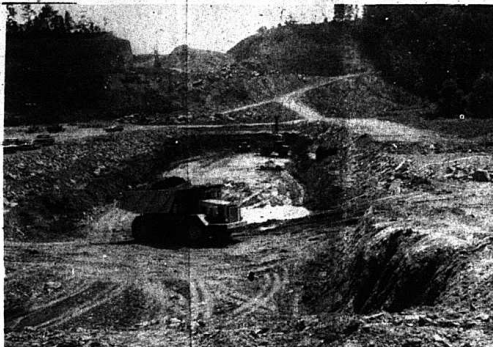
"I would encourage any boy who would like to play football to report to the practice field at 8 a.m. any morning," Coach Travis said.

"Although official notification had not been received yet, this agency (the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads) has approved the project and the 90% federal funds for the project will be made available," Ward said. "It is most gratifying to see this project, which I initiated, fulfilled and the benefits to the people of this area of Rockcastle

and the whole county will be countless," Ward further stated.

If this interchange should become a reality, it is felt that it would be a big factor in the promotion of tourism in Rockcastle and vicinity.

The interchange, located about 5 miles south of Livingston and about 1 1/2 miles downriver of Ft. Senovah, would give easy access to such tourist attractions as the 950 acre lake at Woods Creek Dam in Laurel County about three miles from the interchange, to Wildcat Battle Monument, also about three miles away, and to Ft. Sequoyah Indian Village.

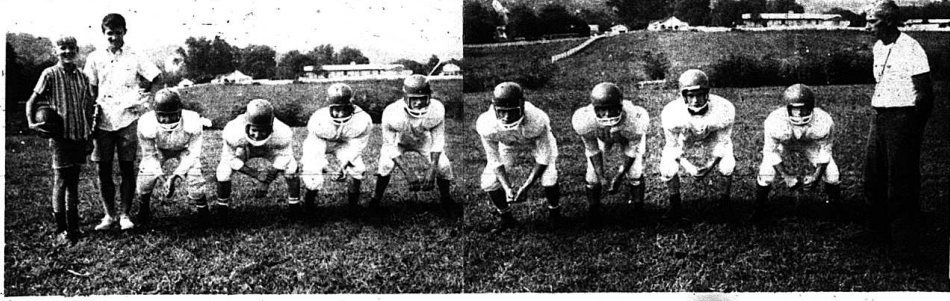

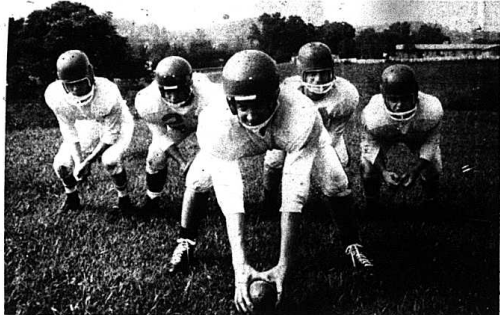


--These 160 Rockcastle youngsters wait patiently to board their buses for their trip to the Shrine Circus in Lexington--

**Babson's Authentic Report**

**RIDING DANGER OF BURGLARY**  
 Whether in the city or in the suburbs, people are a lot more likely nowadays to be victimized by burglars than ever before. So it is only sensible to know how best to avoid this disturbing -- and often costly -- circumstance. And to know, if it should happen, what to do to help recover lost possessions.

**MANY BREAKS COULD BE PREVENTED**

Police experts on burglary pretty much agree that carelessness in locking doors and windows makes an easy in for housebreakers, most of whom are likely to be amateurs. The old idea that any burglar who wants to get in will find a way is not taken to seriously by most students of the way of thieves. If an entrance is made difficult, chances are that the average felon will keep looking until he finds a house or an apartment that is an obvious easy mark.

Perhaps the "open sesame" for most breaks is the snap lock that clicks shut without the use of a key. Such a device can usu-

ally be opened in a moment or two by manipulating a thin, firm object, such as a charge card or a pocket knife. In addition, double and various types of "police locks provide superior assurance against entry. Your locksmith will help on this matter, and will make certain that there are no weak sections of wood or glass around the lock that could be easily shattered by sudden force. Some reliable locks come with magnetic keys having neither teeth nor grooves so they cannot be duplicated.

**CHANGE OF LOCKS SOMETIMES ADVISABLE**

It surely should not be considered "silly" -- nor is it particularly costly -- to have locks checked from time to time, and changed occasionally. When moving into a new house or apartment, it is definitely advisable to have the locks changed; same is applicable when maids or other domestics are replaced, especially if they were short-term or temporary tenure. Any police officer will advise altering locks in a newly rented apartment, and this is only common sense in a high-rise where strangers constantly move about.

are constantly appalled by people's inability to identify stolen goods. Insurers are urged to keep serial numbers of costly appliances. Women should note the furrier's mark on the skins in a luxurious fur coat, since any identification is likely to have been ripped off. In the case of expensive jewelry, and such items as sculpture and paintings, color photographs should be taken and put in a secure place such as a safe-deposit box. It is wise, in fact, to keep notations of all valuables together in such a repository. This will do away with the vague descriptions and forgotten details that are so discouraging to police and insurance men.

Final reminder: Police officials insist that there is an excellent chance of successfully solving a burglary, if they are summoned immediately and if everything in the rifled home is left strictly as is until they have completed their inspection.

**ORDINANCE**

ORDINANCE NO. 293  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO BLOCK OR OBSTRUCT ANY DRAINAGE DITCH ON THE PROPERTY OR THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY.

WHEREAS, the city Council of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, is charged with the responsibility of maintaining streets of the City of Mount Vernon, including the drainage ditches adjacent to said streets, and  
WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the City Council that people have willfully obstructed and filled up existing ditches,  
WHEREAS, the City is presently undertaking to make all said drainage ditches functional by cleaning them out and otherwise improving them, and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section I. That after the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to willfully or intentionally block or obstruct any drainage ditch on property owned by the City of Mount Vernon, including city streets.

Section II. "Drainage ditch" as used in Section I of this ordinance shall include all culverts, bridges or other conduits used for the drainage of surface water.

Section III. This ordinance shall become effective upon publication.

Section IV. Any person violating Section I of this ordinance shall be fined the sum of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for each offense.

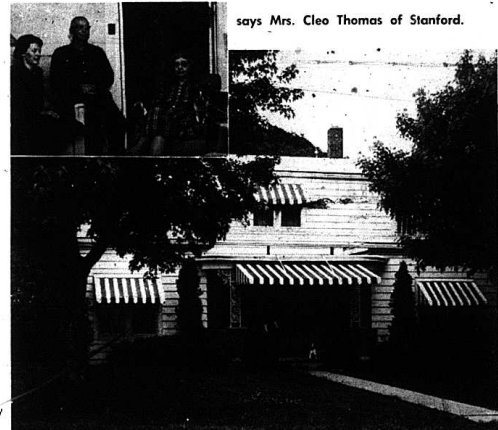

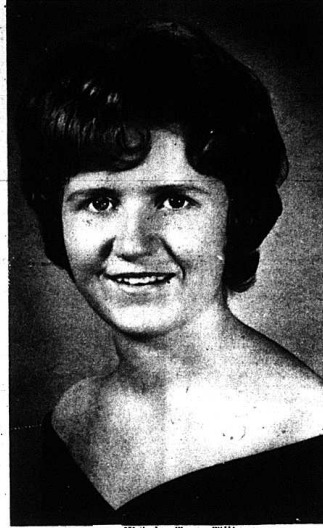

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**Sprays Expense** is a big factor—homeowners might consider using one of two materials that are taken up by the roots of the trees and distributed throughout the leaves. These are Dimethoate or Di-System. These will kill aphids. However, some trees are injured by Dimethoate and the labels should be read carefully to make sure the trees being treated isn't one of those on the prohibited list for this material.

### MORE THAN HALF STATE CROPLAND NEEDS 2-4 TONS OF LIME AN ACRE

More than half the cropland in Kentucky needs two to four tons of agricultural limestone per acre for biggest returns from crop production.

So, says George D. Corder, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service soils specialist, spread limestone this fall or late summer.

"Spread it on corn, tobacco and soybean fields as soon as these crops are harvested. It can go on hay and pasture fields any time this summer or later," he says. Limestone spread in the fall has all winter to seep with the soil and be of more benefit to next year's crops. Ground will also support heavy spreading equipment in the fall, but may be wet or soft next spring.

### GRUB-CONTROL MATERIAL IN NEW FORM LOOKS PROMISING IN TEST, U.K. SAYS

University of Kentucky Agriculture Experiment Station researchers, working with a grub-control material applied in a new formulation, find results of a one-season test "promising."

Dr. Fred Knapp, animal entomologist, says the material was Tigonon. This is a standard material usually used in pour-on preparations. But Knapp used it in a new form, called "water-missible." It is put in animals' drinking water in very small amounts (about 10 to 15 parts per million of water) and given to animals for six days.

The material is absorbed and works as a systemic to kill grubs, he said. It is easier to use this way than as a pour-on, or as a feed-additive. "He got about 95 percent average grub control in test herds. Drinking water source was controlled so that no other water was available. Other stations report that when this material is used in water earlier in the year, our test was in October-November—control is as high as 100 percent." He thinks the material ought

to be used in August or September.

The standard pour-on test gave an average of 95 percent control at the 3 percent strength, and an average of 80 percent strength.

A daily application of Cidrin in oil on dairy animals, to control grubs in the belly activity season, also was effective. One ounce per head was sprayed on animals twice a day by automatic sprayers. In three test herds, control from 74 to 98 percent.
