





APHIDS ON ORNAMENTAL TREESCAUSING PROBLEMS GRUB-CONTROLMATERIAL U.K. SAYS PROMISING IN TEST, U.K.

Aphids are a problem on many home ornamental trees, says the University of Ken-tucky Cooperative Extension Service entomology depart-University of Kentucky Ag Experiment Station research-ers, working with a grub-control material applied in a new formulation, find re-ults of a one-season test "promising." ults of a one-season test "promising." Dr. Fred Knapp, sanimal entomologist, says the ma-terial was Tigavon. This is a standard material usually used in pour-optroparations. But Knapp used it in a new form, called "watermiss-tible." It is put in animals" drinking water in very small amounts (about 10 to 15 parts permillion of water) and given to animals for six days. The material is absorbed and works as a systemic to

awys. The material is absorbed and works as a systemic to kill grubs, he said. It is easier to use this way than as a pour-on, or as a feed-additive. The got about 95 percent average grub sontrol in test herds. Drinking water source was controlled so that no other water was available. "Other stations report that when this material is used in water earlier in the year-our test was in October-November-control is as high as 100 percent." He thinks the material ought

to be used in August or Sept-ember. The standard pour-on test gave an average of 95 per-cent control at the 3 percent stringth, thad an average ~{ 80 percent strength.
