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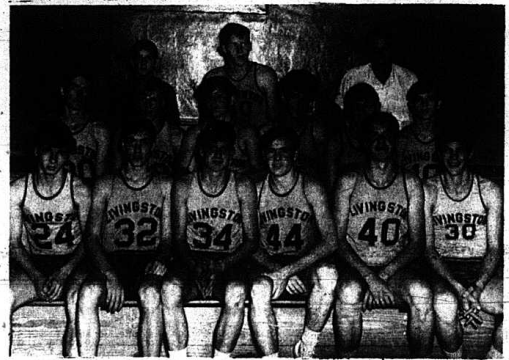
Brodhead - Livingston Basketball Season Opens

Gary Allen, Henry Vanzant, and Gary Mink. Most of these boys have been on all-tournament teams. In the preliminary game, the Freshmen Blue Devils will take on the Sophomores. "The Blue Devils are looking forward to a much better season this year. In the coming season, we will floor one of the largest starting fives that we have ever had. This is a youthful squad but it has experience at several positions. There is only one senior on the

squad." Coach Preston Parrett told the Signal. 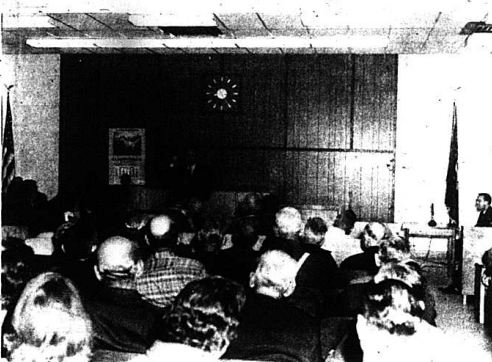
CITY FIRE

INDEBTEDNESS—A STATUS SYMBOL

A surprisingly large cross-section of citizens today are living — and even planning futures that will be — permanently in debt. Credit men who study this phenomenon claim that many of these families are only two to four weekly pay envelopes ahead of total insolvency. Consider the state of our consumer economy if a recession should plunge suddenly these people into a swamp of unemployment!

OLD-HAT TO BE THRIFTY

Like the federal government, numbers of men and women have adopted the concept of perpetual personal indebtedness with their creditors holding an endless lien on their future income. Millions of our people replace their cars every year or two, getting in the old for the new while still paying for the old. They count their auto bills as just as regular and have a monthly responsibility as their rent or grocery bills. Owning a car and putting money away every payday toward another has become a habit to more and more buyers.

Another such development is the tendency of a great many families never actually to own their homes. When they buy an old home equity, they remortgage and use the money for new cars, boats, luxury vacations, or even to pay off outstanding debts so that they can take on more.

Today's offers report that 75% of their loans are for renewal or enlargement of existing accounts.

MANY WHO COULD PAY, DON'T

Time was when a luxury was what you couldn't afford unless you saved for it by consistently putting something aside until you had enough to splurge. Today, however, the standard of living has become so high that "luxuries" are now "necessities" which borrowers refuse to give up in order to settle their debts. The sale of smart cookies who see to it that they pay their installments on larger items such as cars, TV sets, pianos, refrigerators, and anything else that might be repossessed if they fell behind.

But they will hold out — forever if possible — on bills they owe the doctor, the grocer, the barber, the department store, or the druggist. Such unsecured creditors suffer especially heavily if the matter comes to personal bankruptcy proceedings.

Somewhat of a paradox is the ease with which most of the purveyors of goods and services grant credit. Many of them virtually beg potential customers to become their creditors...far too often requiring no security and conducting only nominal credit investigations.

BANKRUPTCY A WAY OUT FOR DELINQUENTS

Fifty years ago, bankruptcy was the "last resort" for business concerns unable to make the grade financially. But today it is almost a way of life for a good many individual consumers. Out of a record-breaking 1,329 bankruptcies filed in fiscal 1967 (ended June 30), close to 175,000 were petitions from wage and salary workers seeking to get rid of their debts by way of the courts.

Case analyses reveal that almost half of such employee bankrupts could — if they had the courage and integrity to try pay off their debts in two or three years, and plunging their families or themselves into undue hardship. Perhaps even more revealing are the statistics which show that four out of five of these delinquent debtors will be right back in the same financial scrape within three years.

Answer: Current regulations will not permit a registrant to enlist in the national guard or reserve unit after he has received his order to report for induction.

Answer: If your enrollment was timely and properly certified to the local board by your school under current regulations, you may be considered for a classification of II-A while completing the school requirements and for the apprenticeship period, which is required to become a licensed embalmer.

Question: I am a county attorney. Recently I was recommended for appointment as local board appeal agent. Am I eligible to serve in this capacity?

Answer: The elected office you now hold now precludes serving in the capacity of government appeal agent to the local board.

WORKSHOP FOR TAX CONSULTANTS

The Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Kentucky is planning workshops for farm tax consultants. These schools will be two day affairs. Instruction will be provided by the Internal Revenue Service and the Social Security Administration.

The purpose of these schools is to provide help in filing farm income tax returns for 1967. The information will be of value to tax consultants in working with farmer income tax returns. There will be no charge for attendance.

Workshops are set up as follows:
November 20-21, Lexington, Caranah House; November 28-29, Henderson Community Hospital, November 30 - December 1, Hopkinsville Community College; December 12-13, Elizabethtown Community College, and December 14-15, Somerset Community College.

FARMER-BUSINESSMEN'S BANQUET

The annual Farmer-Businessmen's Banquet will be held Friday, November 10 at 7 p.m. at Brodhead School Cafeteria. The businessmen are host this year. Dr. Harry Sparks, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, will be the guest speaker.

CATTLE GRUB TREATMENTS CAN BE USED NOW

Certain treatments can be given cattle now to protect against cattle grubs, says Dr. Rudy Scheibner, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service entomologist.

"It is too late in the season now to begin feed-additive treatments," he points out, "but there are some pour-on treatments which are effective."

They are the materials (use only one) Nuggvort, Co-Ral or Ruelene. "However, after October 31, Ruelene cannot be used because it may cause such as thoracic edema." Follow label directions for dosage rates, safety, and application procedures, Dr.

Scheibner says. He advises that particular attention be paid to restrictions concerning use on any of these materials on lactating, sick or distressed-condition animals.

PRESSING, BULKING TO BACCO IMPORTANT PRE-MARKET JOB

After all the hours spent raising, cutting, housing and curing a tobacco crop - don't waste them by careless pressing and bulking of stripped tobacco.

Follow these well-established rules, says Ira E. Massie, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service tobacco specialist:

1. Use a tobacco press for stripped leaf. It is inexpensive and can be made on the farm. Use one press for every two tobacco leaf-strippers. As each 12 to 14 hand stick is filled, put it in the press and leave it till the next strip is filled.

2. Make a "chicken coop" bulk pile as sticks are removed from the press. This is a square, with butts of the hands forming the sides of the bulk, tips loose in the middle. Leave tobacco in this bulk about five days or until it is in safe "keeping order." Then put it in a solid bulk to stay 8 or 10 days before moving to market.

3. Grade tobacco on farm and load it on the truck in the same manner it was taken from the stalk. That would be lowest quality first, then in order through the best flying, lugs and bright leaf. Leave tips on top. Cover the crop well before heading to market to protect it against rain or snow.

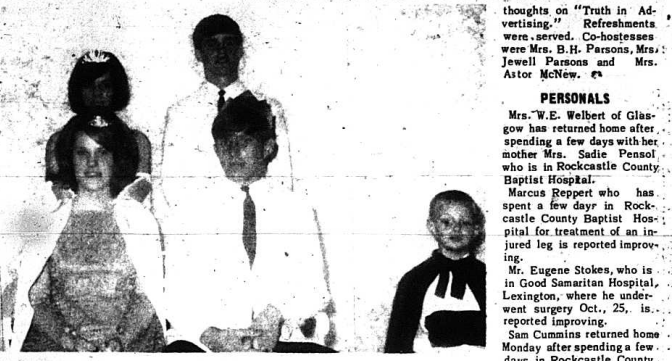

TRAVELS WITH CHARLEY. by John Steinbeck. With a French poe as companion and a truck trailer for transportation novelist Steinbeck recently rediscovered the United States. He talked with many types of persons, sadly not of the passing of regional speech, fell in love with Montana, was appalled by a display of racial fanaticism in New Orleans, and at journey's end, suddenly weary of travel, returned gratefully to New York City, his point of departure.

A TIME TO PASS OVER, by Henry Gordon Green. On a summer day in 1935 eighty-year-old Mary Ann Green and her family believe she is dying, but she delays her "passing over" to think back on her life and settle a score or two. In a series of flash

backs she recalls her marriage at sixteen, her thirteen children, and the humor and tragedy of a pioneering life. Mary Ann's view is realistic, her language uninhibited, and her attitude toward her daughter-in-law's proselytizing recalcitrant, but she is determined, loyal, and well acquainted with God on an informal basis.

THE PASANG RUN, by Ellenton Trevor. Adventure and romance in Malaya, where Hugh Copland, seeking oblivion in a tough job, is appointed manager of a decaying airstrip, menaced by the encroaching jungle and by Communist Guerrillas. B.H. Copland and a eurasian air stewardess become involved in a dramatic and dangerous power struggle between the Sultan of Tamarah and his elusive enemies.

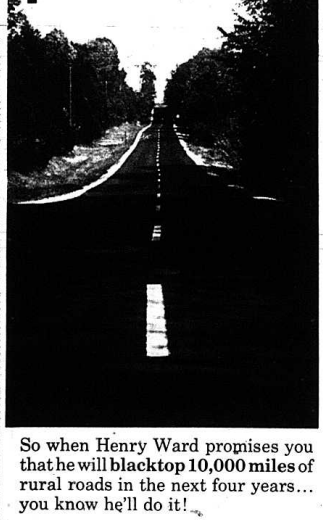
