Cattle - Feeding To Heavy Weights An Item To Be Watched Carefully.

Be cautious if you try to feed cattle out to heavy weights, says Dr. Roy C. Gray Jr., U.K. Co-operative Extension Service beef cattle specialist.

**Coart of pairs you so heavier weights, be says. *Any time it costs more to put on a pound of beef than it will sell for, the feeder needs to change his program immediately. In fact, feeding beef cattle out to what the trade catils heavy weights sometimes is false economy. The company of the control of the cost per pound of gain on cattle weighting 1,100 pounds was 27 per cent higher than for 1,000 pound cattle. When the cattle were fed out to 1,200 pounds,
