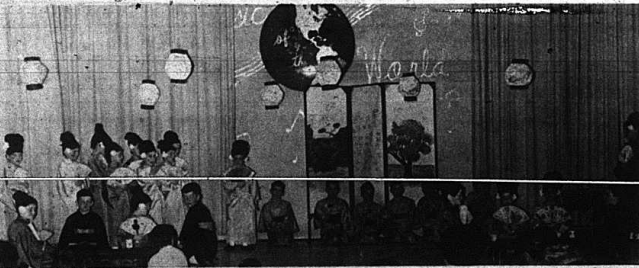

The four boys and four girls who are runners-up in the state-wide selection process will each receive a \$100 savings bond.

The two state winners, eight runners-up and their parents, will receive an all-expense paid trip to Louisville to receive their awards at the annual farm awards luncheon.

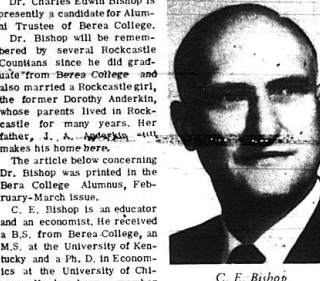

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SHORTCOMINGS OF CONGRESS

Our founding fathers intended that Congress should be a bulwark against centralization of power. They expected its acts to be an authoritative reflection of the collective will of the people.

MUCH CRITICISM NOT CRITICISME

If Congress is to reflect the true will of the people, that will be expressed continually, frankly, and constructively. As almost any Congressman will confirm, the will of the people is being expressed only partially and imperfectly today. To be sure, incoming mail to Capitol Hill is impressively large, while communications from Senators and Representatives to the folks back home are flowing in record volume. But real dialog between members of Congress and the people still leaves much to be desired.

Few indeed are the suggestions sent to Congress which deal convincingly and objectively with today's problems. But in this era of swift communication, expanding industrialization, and multiplying government functions and programs, Congress is showered with criticism... much of it not constructive.

PROCEDURES NEED UPDATING

Certainly it is that Congress is slow, and sometimes bogged down, because of the rigidity of its dedication to tradition. If you

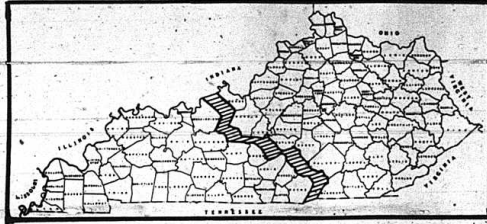
really want to plead your views personally on a bill before a congress session, you'll find it relatively easy to get the nod to present yourself. But be prepared for delays, and possibly postponements, in your appearance date and time; for committees meet mostly about mid-morning and adjourn by noon when the Senate and the House convene. Sessions, are short, hurried, often superficial.

For lack of time, informed and well-meaning citizens are brushed through. Some get the impression they are being brushed off; feelings bruised, these people become discouraged. Often they never again return to Capitol Hill, leaving the committee hearings to the professional lobbyists who survive and thrive because they are Johnny-on-the-spot and persistent in their pleadings.

DYNAMISM AND THE SENIORITY SYSTEM

One — perhaps forever — are the really strong Speakers of the House who almost single-handedly made a good deal of the congressional history of yesterday. But Congress is still blessed with numerous men of stature — capable, articulate, and often highly individualistic. The colorful flavor of bygone years may or may not be recaptured, but the dynamism should be retrievable.

Some claim the liss of Congress stem mostly from the so-called seniority system which provides that committee assignments, chairmanships, and influence generally depend on

CRIME IN AMERICA

The report issued recently by the FBI on crime in America was a shocking statement. It showed that crime is one of the largest and most successful businesses in this country, with enormous profits which are, of course, tax free.

Many of you will remember, "I am sure, when Chicago was the crime capital of America the days of Al Capone, St. Valentine's Massacre, etc. It was so bad, many persons were afraid to stop off there, even overnight."

Today, crime stalks Chicago and nearly every American city, large and small. People are afraid to venture onto the streets at night. The Nation's Capital, which should be a model for others, is high on the list when it comes to such crimes as murder, rape and robbery.

FBI's figures on crime for last year showed a 10% increase in serious crimes in our country. Murder increased 12%; rape 9%; aggravated assault 8%; robbery 7% and property crimes 10%. And, of course, the recent tragic event in Memphis gave that small percentage of the Negro community the opportunity and excuse they have been waiting for to smash and destroy, burn

surprised at this. What can be done?

Most Americans interviewed believe that:

1. The size of the police force across the country should be increased.
2. We should give full support to our police force.
3. Penalties should be made more severe, to fit the crime.
4. We should correct social and economic conditions which often spawn juvenile delinquency and crime.
5. The Congress should enact a strong anti-crime law. The House passed such a bill last year and it is now awaiting action by the Senate.
6. The individual citizen can join the effort to combat lawlessness. A recent survey shows that 9 out of 10 citizens would be willing to help local police in community anti-crime programs.

If we are to root out crime in America, all like-minded citizens will have to join in the effort. Interested citizens should contact their local police department for details.

KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT of AGRICULTURE NEWS

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, announced a new all-time record number of farmers plan to participate in the feed grain program.

On the basis of preliminary final reports from states, 1,497,724 farms have been signed up as participants in the 1968 program, compared with 1,308,000 last year and 1,400,000 (including barley) in 1966.

A near-record acreage diversion is also planned by producers signed up in the 1968 program. Preliminary total estimates from states show diversion of 34,360,000 acres from production of corn and grain sorghum this year. This total is virtually the same as the record diversion reported in 1965 and 1966; programs, with barley acreage deducted from those signups.

The Secretary said corn-sorghum base on sloped farms also set new records.

Of the 76.5 million acres of corn-sorghum base acreage on sloped farms, preliminary estimates show 57.9 million acres is corn base and 18.6 million is sorghum. The total base on signed farms represent 67 percent of the national total base.

"In my opinion, American farmers this year have given a phenomenal expression of confidence in the workability and success of the feed grain program," Secretary Freeman said, adding "Those growers who failed to participate in the 1967 program caused much of the margin of overproduction which depressed the major futures and cash markets. With the record-breaking signup from February 5 through March 15 this year, farmers themselves have laid the foundation for strong markets during the coming months and throughout the next marketing year."

"This is precisely the situation I have been continuously striving to achieve with the feed grain programs, beginning in 1961 and continuing under the provisions of the Food and Agriculture Act of 1955. Our feed grain producers can now look forward to the coming

crop year with confidence," the Secretary declared.

Final officials returns by states will be compiled and issued on April 2.
