

CORN FIELD TREATED WITH WEED-KILLER "TROUBLE" FOR THIS YEAR'S TOBACCO

YEAR'S TOBACCO If you are planning to put your 1968 tobacco crop on last year's corn field and the field re-ceived certain weed-kill-

tield and the field re-ceived certain weed kill-ing chemicals Jastyear --you are asking for trouble. "Tobaccogrowing and certain courfield weed-killers are incompatible." says Dr. J.H. Smiley., U.K. Cooperative Ex-tension Service special-ist. "You should NOT plant tobacco this year in fields which were (1) in com last year and (2) received either Atrazine or Simazine, to control weeds. Tobacco often is injured by residues of these materials.
