County Prepares Fight Against 15% Increase

County officials have been fighting a list of the seventy-five property sales used by the State Department of Revenue in determining that a 15% increase in assessment of the farm and non-farm rural property was necessary.

The Department of Revenue told county officials that this increase was necessary on these two types of property since the seventy-five sales showed that property in the county was selling for quite a bit more than it was assessed for and this increase would bring the property more in line with present value.

A group of county officials and interested citizens went to a public hearing held last Tuesday at Frankfort to protect the increase. A two-week extension was granted the county at that time for them to look over the sales used and prepare a case against the increase.

Tax Commissioner Robert Cromer received this list last Friday and proceeded to investigate each sale to see what had caused the increase in value.

He found that although the state had said they had used no interchange property that two of the sales were on the interchange. They also said they had used no city property sales in determining the increase but three property transactions in the City were used. And, several of the sale prices included property other than the real estate in the amount paid which naturally made the sale price higher than the assessment.

Five of the seventy-five sales did not even have a sale price listed, and therefore could not have been considered and in eighteen transactions, the buyer paid less than the assessed value and in three cases paid exactly the same. In two other transactions, the buyer told Mr. Cromer that they did not pay the amount which the state had listed as being paid for the property.

This leaves forty-seven transactions in which the buyer actually paid more than the assessed value of the property and these include the three city property sales and the two interchange property. Also included in this figure is one piece of property which the state said was assessed for

\$20,000 but sold for \$29,750, but which was, according to Mr. Cromer's records, assessed at \$30,000.

There is Renfro Lake property in this category, which would surely account for the increase in value, and there is also a piece of property bought by two men for \$800, and it was assessed for the purchase price, which they later sold for \$2,000.

There are actually only about four pieces of property in which the selling price was a great deal larger than the assessed value and in all forty-seven cases the assessment has now been brought in line with the purchase price and in some cases been assessed higher than the purchase price.

A representative of the Department of Revenue is scheduled to meet with Mr. Cromer within the next day or two to hear Mr. Cromer and other county officials' case against the increase.

With the research that Mr. Cromer has done on each of these sales then there should be a good chance that the increase will not be necessary.

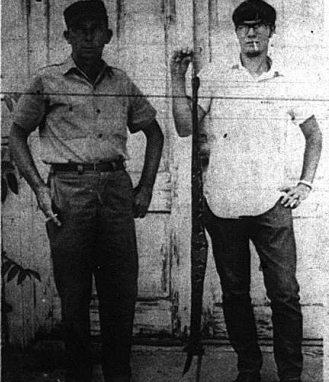

CORN TOURS SET

Corn growers in the Wilderness Trail Area who are interested in seeing some of the latest developments in corn production are invited to take part in one of the corn tours set for July 11 and 12.

July 11, corn growers will meet at the County Extension Office in the Knox County Courthouse in Barboursville, Kentucky at 10:00 a.m. and tour no-till planting demonstrations in Knox County. This group will also visit fields in which MDM, (Maize Dwarf Mosaic), a serious corn disease has been identified.

July 12, corn growers will meet at the Brohead Mills in Brohead, Kentucky at 10:00 a.m. and tour no-till planting demonstrations in Rockcastle County. Stops are scheduled for Earl Robert's Farm, East Ottawa; Clay Colson's Farm, Brindle Ridge, W.S. and Kenneth Stewart's Farm at Wildie.

A number of corn growers throughout the area have indicated an interest in this new practice and are planning to take part in one of these corn tours. No-till planting of corn, a new practice using a special fluted coulters

front of a heavy-duty corn planter which enables the operator to plant corn in sod land or in stubble fields without plowing, is the latest development in corn production.

Before using this specially built planter, the sod is killed by spraying with paraquat and atrazine is used to control weed and grass seeds that germinate later.

A friend of the farmer will furnish lunch for both these corn tours. Corn growers from Rockcastle, Whitley, Laurel, Clay, Knox, Jackson, Harlan and Bell Counties are invited to take part in one of these tours.

DESTRUCTIVE CEREAL LEAF BEETLE FOUND IN 12 KY. COUNTIES

The cereal leaf beetle, a destructive pest of small grains long known in Europe is in Kentucky now.

It is in 12 counties, says Dr. Lee Townsend, state entomologist and chairman of the U.K. Ag. Experiment Station entomology department. It has been identified in Boone, Oldham, Gallatin, Pendleton, Bracken, Robertson, Mason, Lewis, Fleming, Scott, Fayette,

and Boyd counties this year. It also is suspect in two other Kentucky counties but not positively identified.

The beetle, first noticed in this country in 1961 in Michigan, feeds on small grains such as wheat, oats, barley, rye and others. It also will attack corn. Main damage comes from the beetle's feeding on plant leaves and stems.

The beetle (Oulema melanopus) has bluish wing covers and a light reddish-brown body. It is about a quarter inch long. It is a voracious feeder. Because it is such a new pest, American research has not settled yet on control measures. However, the beetle apparently may be controlled by readily available insecticides. A wasp parasite has been set out in research projects to test biological control.

The beetle also has been found the first time in West Virginia, Illinois and Pennsylvania. State programs to control spread of the pest are under way now.

Dr. Townsend asks that suspect specimens be sent to his department, U.K. Ag. Experiment Station, Lexington, Ky. 40506 for positive identification.

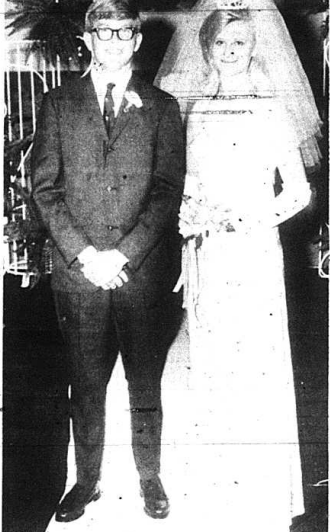

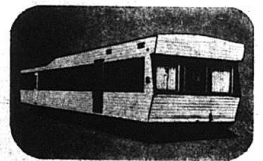
