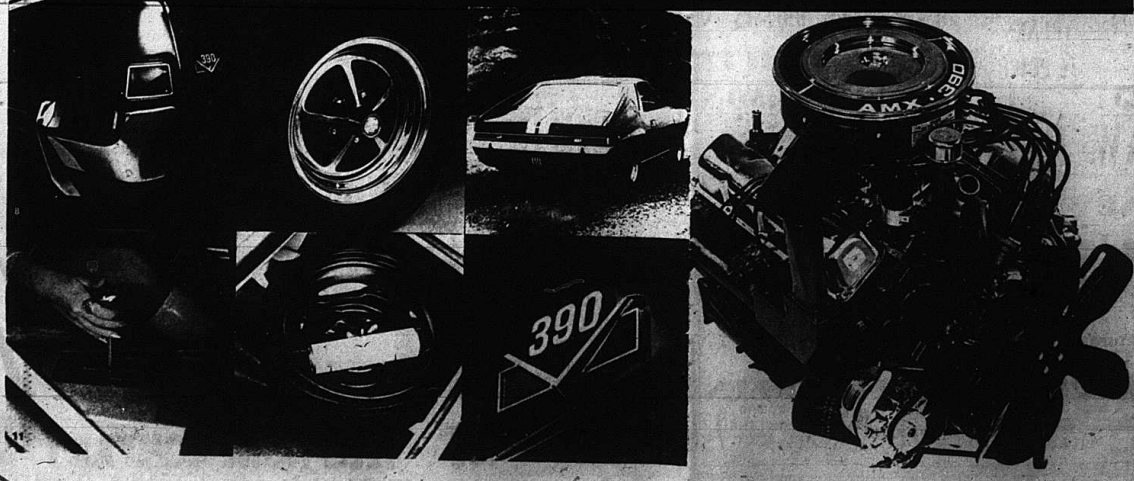

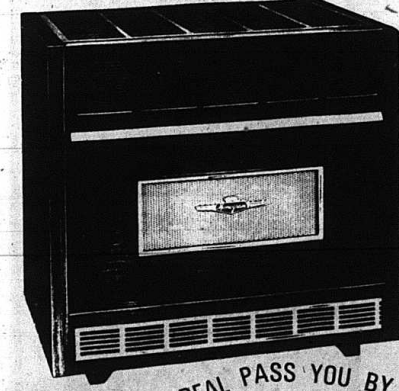

Gun Registration

The controversy rages on concerning the legislation should we or should not we have stricter gun laws. Does it or does it not violate our constitutional rights. Is it a step toward the government becoming socialist or even communistic in nature? Is it a move to enable the government to tax citizens for their right to own guns? We, personally, are against any move to force a citizen to register a gun. We are against it mainly because it would not be of enough benefit in curbing crime to justify the expense involved. It does not stand to reason that a person planning such a crime as the recent assassination of Senator Kennedy will let such a little thing as not owning a gun stand in his way. A person so mentally deranged as to plan such a crime could find dozens of ways to obtain a gun for his purposes. Of course, the easiest way would be to steal some law-abiding person's registered gun. Alright, so the next step is to confiscate all guns so that this won't happen again. Fine, the next time a person wants to commit a crime of this caliber or any crime large or small, why not just use a butcher knife. So what does Congress do then, call up all the knives?

It seems as though experience with the Prohibition Law would have stopped any talk of gun registration before it got started. Needless to say prohibiting the sale of alcohol legally far from stopped the sale or consumption of liquor. In fact it bred one of the largest underground gangster rackets of our time and in this same kind of gangster would no doubt find quite a large market for the illegal sale of firearms.

Our registration is not the answer to our criminal problems. We do not profess to know the answer to a problem that has evidently stumped some of the best minds in the country. But, a partial solution might be to stop molly-coddling criminals and put the blame directly where it belongs on the criminal and his background not on a citizen such as myself who only goes into "killer rages" when I find myself and others like me bearing the brunt for some degenerate person's actions.

If you feel strongly about this bill before Congress, one way or another, do not hesitate, in fact make an effort to let Rep. Tim Lee Carter and Congressmen Cooper and Maston know of your feelings. After all they are there to dictate the majority of their voters wishes and should be made aware of your feelings on this highly controversial and important legislation.

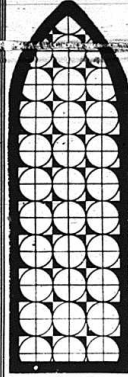
