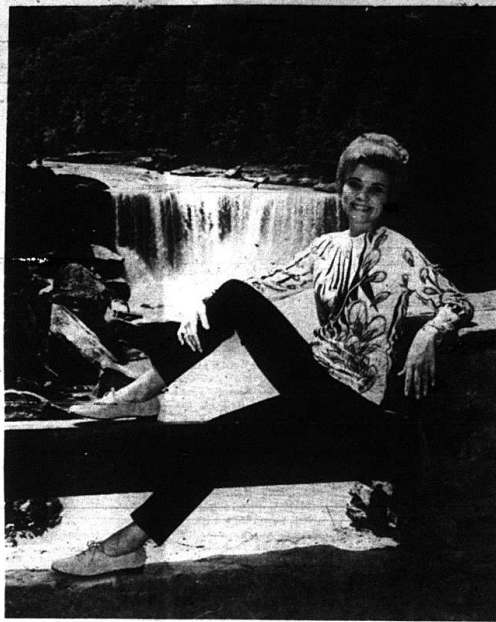

## Piquant Mushroom Gravy Sauces Veal Roll-Ups



Veal, certainly a stepchild in our country, enjoys great favor in Italy. Italians have come up with many outstanding veal dishes over the years. One such recipe is veal roll-ups.

This Americanized version is sure to delight your family. Thinly pounded veal cutlets are rolled up with a mixture of spinach, green onions, and basil tucked inside. Now here the American genius enters the picture. To further enhance the flavor of the veal, the roll-ups are simmered in convenient canned mushroom gravy, to which tomatoes, garlic, and basil have been added. The rich mushroom goodness serves as the base for all the piquant flavors to mingle. During the last few minutes, add fresh peas to complete this mouth-watering one-dish meal.

In keeping with true Italian tradition, pass round a tray of fresh fruit and cheese for dessert and, of course, pour the espresso coffee.

**VEAL ROLL-UPS ITALIANO**

1 pound (4 pieces) thinly sliced veal cutlet  
Salt and pepper  
1 cup cooked chopped spinach  
1 well-drained  
2 tablespoons finely chopped green onions  
2 tablespoons crushed 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) mushroom gravy  
1/2 cup chopped canned tomatoes  
1 medium clove garlic, minced  
1 cup fresh peas (about 1 pound)  
Found veal with meat, tomatoes or edge of heavy sauce; season with salt and pepper. Currying spinach, green onions and 1/4 teaspoon basil. Place 1/4 cup spinach mixture on each piece of veal. Roll-up, tuck in ends; fasten with skewers or toothpicks. In skillet, brown meat in shortening; pour off fat. Add gravy, tomatoes, garlic and remaining basil. Cover; cook over low heat 45 minutes. Stir now and then. Add peas; cook 15 minutes more. Uncover to thicken gravy, if desired. Makes 4 servings.

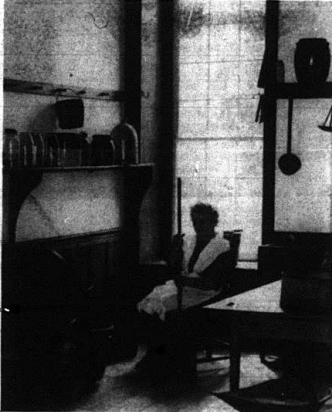
