According to Republican State Headquarters, there will be no prolonged airport ceremony; instead, the party will be hustled to cross and

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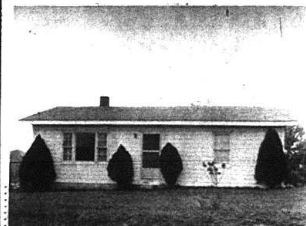
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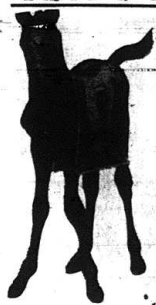

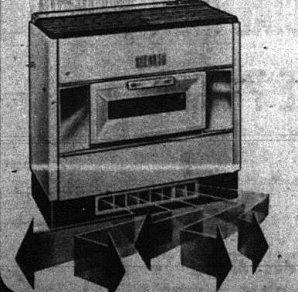

Mullins Files For School Board Seat

Virgil Mullins, who was a lecturer to the Rockcastle County Board of Education four years ago and was then ousted on a suit filed by Robert Matthews, State Attorney General, will again seek election to the board in the November general election.

Mr. Mullins was ousted from the board in 1966 after a suit was filed in Rockcastle County Circuit Court, declaring that he did not have an eighth grade education as required by the Kentucky Revised Statutes for school board members. Mr. Mullins contested the suit but to no avail and Harold Ballinger was named to replace him on the board.

Mr. Ballinger also filed last week for election to the seat which he now holds. There are no other candidates for the seat from the Fourth Educational District consisting of the Orlando and Climax precincts.

Mr. Mullins owns and operates a 450-acre farm, a grocery store, and a sawmill. Mrs. Mullins is postmistress at Climax. Her father, Stanley Mullins, is chairman of

the Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization Committee.

Mr. Mullins told the Signal, "I am running to represent the people in my district. To get from them the best in educational facilities which we can afford. I have a personal animosity toward the present school system, but I feel that more progress could be, and must be, made than has been to date."

Three of the five school board seats are up for grabs in November but there will be no contest in Educational Division No. 2 since Willie Taylor, incumbent school board member from that District, has no opposition. Mr. Taylor was named to the board in the latter part of 1966 following the resignation of Board Chairman John Harris.

In Educational Division No. 5, two newcomers to politics, Dr. Jack Lewis and Kenneth Adams, will fight it out for a seat on the board. Coleman Mink, incumbent board member from Division No. 5, is not to stand for re-election.

Interest Shown In Kindergarten Here

Final Rites Held For Cpl. David Hale

Funeral services for Cpl. Michael David Hale, USMC, of Lebanon, Indiana, who was killed in action, August 18, 1967, in An Hoa in Northern South Vietnam, were held Monday, September 9 at 11 a.m. at the Lebanon, Indiana, Burial Home in the Oak Hill Cemetery.

Cpl. Hale's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Owens, live at Johnetta. He is also the grandson of the late Martha Hale from this county.

Accompanying the body home for burial was another Marine from Lebanon, Indiana, Mike McCoughlin, who served as an honor guard for the military rites. Cpl. Hale was the seventh serviceman from this county in Indiana to be killed in Vietnam.

He was serving with Company G, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, at the time of his death and was reportedly on patrol when struck by enemy fire.

A 1966 graduate of Lebanon High School, where he participated in wrestling and baseball, Cpl. Hale attended Purdue, extension classes, in Indianapolis, Indiana, for a year before joining the U.S. Marine in June of 1967.

Following basic training and combat training at Camp Pendleton in California, he was sent to Vietnam in October of 1967. He earned the Meritorious Achievement medal

before traveling overseas. He was wounded in combat in Vietnam for which he received other medals while there.

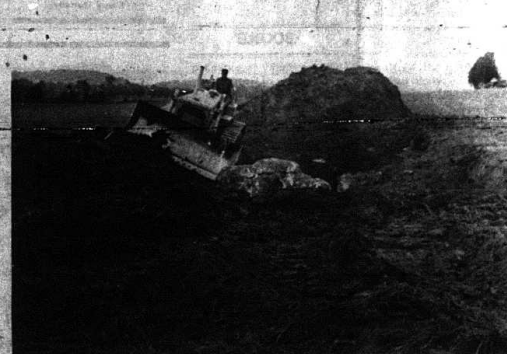

BROWN RECLUSE SPIDER IDENTIFICATION UP TO 43 COUNTIES

The brown recluse spider, a relatively dangerous pest from the poisonous nature of its bite, now is identified in 43 Kentucky counties. It apparently is spreading outward at a slow rate, says Dr. Rudy Scheibner, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service entomologist. When first noted in this state in 1965, it apparently was confined to five or six far-western counties.

Latest positive identification, Dr. Scheibner says, is Madison County. Closest "identification" counties are Marion or Taylor, he says. He is unable to account for this "jump" in counties, but there is a strong suspicion of a "leapfrog" pattern. Many of the counties in Ken-

tucky have the spider but it has not been identified yet. Before a county is listed as positive for the brown recluse, a spider specimen must be sent in and the spider positively identified by University or other taxonomists. Scheibner says the new number—43—is a filling in of the gaps on the distributional map.

Department, rather than a spider large as reported by the brown recluse. An example: No specimens had been received or identified from Hopkins county, though a neighboring county, Muhlenberg, has been on the positive list some months.

"Counties which most likely have the spider but for which we have no positive identification are Crittenden, McLean, Davises, Hancock, Ohio, Larse, Nelson and Green. Some of these have sent spiders in for identification but none was a brown recluse.

The positive county list now: Hickman, Graves, Livingston, Henderson, Clinton, Meade, Oldham, Lyon, Caldwell, Hopkins, Webster, Hardin, Jefferson, Madison, Balland, McCracken, Carlisle, Fulton, Marshall, Calloway, Muhlenberg, Tigg, Christian, Todd, Union, Adair, Breckinridge, Grayson, Ballitt, Marion, Taylor, Cumberland, Russell, Logan, Simpson, Allen, Monroe, Butler, Warren, Metcalfe, Barren, Edmondson, and Hart.

Last January, Wayne County was one of those reported positive, Scheibner said, but this is an error. A recheck of records shows no positive "identification" on specimens from Wayne County yet. The spider is in neighboring Clinton to the west.

The brown recluse is a small, tan to chocolate colored spider that shuns light and is very shy. It likes dark rafters, crevices, dark closets and similar locations. Its bite can cause a breakdown of flesh in the bite area, as well as nausea and other symptoms, however, doctors have been researching the venom for some years now and have worked out a reasonably satisfactory treatment.

"Not many bite cases were reported in Kentucky, or even in the U. S., until a national publication did a story on the spider. Many bites, undoubtedly from brown recluses, have occurred but were not always suspected or identified as coming from the brown recluse. Now that the danger of the spider's bite is better known, bite

case records are increasing. An estimated 20 such cases have been reported in Kentucky in the last two years. None of these cases resulted in death of the victims, although deaths from bite cause have been reported from several other states," Dr. Scheibner says.

FALL-TREAT AND PREPARE PLANT BEDS

"If you like first-rate conditions to prepare and treat tobacco plant beds, autumn is a good time. Soil usually is right for working, temperatures are high enough, moisture conditions just right and work loads a little lighter, says Ir. Messie, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service Specialist.

Sites should be plowed seven to 14 days ahead of weed-control treatment. If burning is to be used, level off high spots. For steaming or chemical, weed-control, work the site into a good seedbed condition—break up clods, smooth the area and ditch the site to carry off surface runoff water. Soil temperature ought to be at least 50 degrees Fahrenheit for any method (burning, steaming and chemical). Don't try to treat if soil temperature is less than 50 degrees F. Soil must be dry enough to work. (Measure the soil temperature from a point one inch under the surface).

Soil insecticides should be applied in fall, Mr. Messie says. This should be added after the soil is worked in the fall but before the weed treatment is done.

A soil insecticide is recommended if a new bed site is to be used for the 1969 crop particularly if sod must be broken on this new site. Don't add soil insecticides on old sites treated with one or two years.

Sites usually need a new soil insecticide application after three years, sometimes two.

SMALL-GRAIN SEEDING TIMES AFFECT YIELDS

Small-grain seeding dates influence yields and other factors, says S. H. Phillips, U. K. Cooperative Extension Service agronomist. "Seedbed planting helps," he notes. "Plants get established once to survive the winter better, early maturity means double-cropping is possible, less insecticide damage, and the double-crop six to 10 days; grain yields are higher, and pasture also becomes available."

Best planting dates for small grains are: Oats, by the first week in October; barley, from Sept. 15 to Oct. 20, and rye by mid-November. If late-planting is a necessity for any reason: (1) Use higher rates on barley and wheat (seed per acre); switch to hardier varieties or types, such as substituting barley for oats; and be sure you have an excellent fertility system for these late-planted grains.

If the season is early enough, clip the small grains or graze them. After pointing time, are more susceptible to winter kill from freezing, clipping or grazing, slows the growth and prevents jointing.

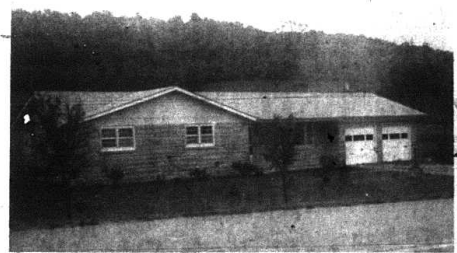

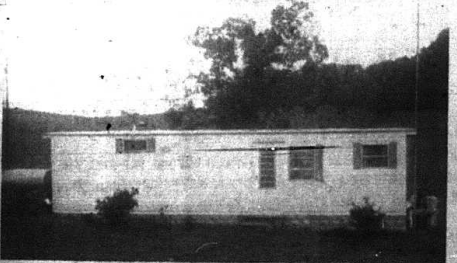


