## Miss Sue Wynn, 17, Killed In Car Wreck

Miss Wanda Sue Wynn, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Wynn of Conway, was killed instantly late Sunday afternoon when the car in which she was riding struck a tree on Ky. 212 1/2 miles south of Berea.

Miss Wynn was a passenger in a car driven by Darrell Gadd, 20, of Berea. Gadd was dead on arrival at the Berea Hospital.

According to police reports, the Gadd car and a car, driven by Willie Thacker, 20, of Mt. Vernon were both traveling south when the Thacker car struck the Gadd car in the rear causing Gadd to lose control. The Gadd auto left the highway and struck a tree roadside.

Thacker, not any of his three passengers, were hurt. Miss Wynn was a senior at Mt. Vernon High School where she was a cheerleader, a member of the Latin Club, 4-H Club, Glee Club, and a member of the school.

Besides her parents, she is survived by a half-sister, Mrs. Mary Lawson of Georgetown, and her grandparents Mr. and Mrs. John Wynn of Conway.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Conway Baptist Church with burial in the Rice Cemetery in Rockcastle County.

The sewer system. Water customers not on the sewer system will be billed at a basic rate of \$6.00 per month.

There is a breakdown of the increased rates which will go into effect with the November billing: City Customers - basic charge (2,000 gallons) \$4.50; next 8,000 gallons or any portion thereof \$5.85; next 40,000 gallons \$6.80; next 50,000 gallons \$10.15, all over 100,000 gallons \$11.05.

The sewer charge (50% of the customer's water charge) is, of course, in addition to the above rate besides a five percent sales tax on the water used.

Using the above rates, resident customers' basic bill will now be \$6.98 including sales tax as compared to the \$5.12 now being paid. The council had hoped to be able to at least keep the water rates the same for nonsewer customers as for city customers. But, according to EDA, this was not possible.

 County agents from the 50 states of the Union get a good look at Kentucky, the land of agriculture, when the National Association of County Agricultural Agents opens its annual convention in Louisville, Sunday, October 13. More than 3,000 agents and their families are expected at the five day session at Convention Center in downtown Louisville.

able for the 1970 crop, says Dr. Glenn Collins, agronomist. The release is a joint one by the U.K. Ag Experiment Station and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service. Collins is a station employee, Dr. Legg and Mr. Litton are USDA-ARS appointees. KY14 was field-tested several years at the Lexington office of the Princeton Experiment Substation in Caldwell county, plus several other official and unofficial on-farm tests throughout the state. It also was included in field trials in southern Ohio and in Missouri.

KY 14 is highly resistant to wildfire, mosaic, fusarium wilt and Javel root, not to mention resistant to black shank. Dr. Collins points out, "We do not want any farmer to think KY 14 will be useful in fields where black shank has been a problem. There are other varieties that are useful on such farms."

KY 14 is a standup variety. Dr. Collins said, comparing favorably to Burley 21, the widely used variety in this state now. Its leaves are a bit longer, wider and more numerous than Burley 21, but the plants are about the same height, approximately five feet.

The new variety is about seven days later maturing than Burley 21, but Dr. Collins says, "This is no handicap at all for the major burley-producing areas."

The KY 14 holds its bottom leaves well and has good handling characteristics in the field and curing barn. "KY 12 yields as well as KY 14 and has resistance to the four major diseases, but KY 12 has not been accepted (as well as some other varieties) because of some brittleness and handling difficulty. KY 14 probably has overcome this drawback; we think KY 14 has better handling characteristics."

**ORDINANCE No. 297**

**ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, AMENDING THE EXISTING WATER AND SEWER RATE ORDINANCE OF SAID CITY.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, is in the process of arranging to finance the construction of a waterworks project, consisting of a 470-acre water reservoir, water treatment plant, water storage tanks and additions to the existing municipal waterworks distribution system of the City, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary in connection with said plan of financing that the existing water and sewer rates of the City be increased.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** That the previous Water and Sewer Rate Ordinance of the City, fixing the respective water and sewer services furnished by the combined and consolidated municipal waterworks and sewer system of the City, which Water and Sewer Rate Ordinance was enacted on March 18, 1965, is hereby amended so as to increase the water and sewer rates for services rendered by the combined and consolidated municipal water works and sewer system of the City, as follows:

**SECTION 2. NEW MONTHLY WATER AND SEWER RATES.**

That the rates and charges for water service and for sewer service furnished by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, are hereby fixed and established on a monthly basis as follows:

**A. Minimum Monthly Water Bill for Residents of the City.**

The minimum monthly bill for water service to residents of the City, which minimum bill entitles each customer to 2,000 gallons (or less) of water in each month for such minimum charge, shall be Four Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$4.50).

**B. Monthly Water Rates for Residents of the City.**

Number of Gallons or Less of Water Per Month	Monthly Charge Per 1,000 Gallons or Part Thereof
(Minimum Rate for the first 2,000 gals.)	\$2.25 per 1,000 gallons (minimum charge-\$4.50)
For the next 8,000 gals.	1.35

All over 100,000 gals.	.60

**C. Minimum Monthly Water Bill for Nonresidents**

The minimum monthly bill for water service to nonresidents of the City, which minimum monthly bill entitles each customer to 2,000 gallons (or less) of water in each month for such minimum charge, shall be \$6.00 per month.

**D. Monthly Water Rates for Nonresidential Customers.**

Minimum Rate for the first 2,000 gals.	\$3.00 per 1,000 gals. (Minimum Monthly Charge is \$6.00)

**E. Fire Hydrant Rentals.**

All Standard Fire Hydrants (public or private) shall be billed at the rate of Seventeen Dollars (\$17.00) per year, and the City will pay the sum of \$17.00 per year for each Fire Hydrant maintained by the City, said sum to be deposited into the same Fund as the Fund into which all other revenues of said municipal waterworks system (which is combined and consolidated with the municipal sewer system) are deposited. Said payment shall be made in twelve equal monthly payments on the first day of each month.

**F. Monthly Sewer Rates.**

The rates or charges for sewer service rendered by the municipal sewer system shall be based insofar as possible upon the quantity of water supplied each month to the respective premises and shall be an amount equal to fifty percent (50%) of the face amount of each water bill computed according to the rates hereinabove specified; provided that in any event the minimum monthly sewer bill for nonresident sewer customers and the minimum monthly sewer bill for non-resident sewer customers, if any, shall be \$3.00.

**SECTION 3. CONNECTIONS AND CONNECTION CHARGES.**

New customers of the waterworks system located within the City limits of the City shall pay a sewer connection charge of \$25.00 for any size connection. New customers of the waterworks system who are not residents of the City shall pay a connection charge of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for a water connection of 3/4-inch size provided, however, such cost shall be reduced to \$75.00 for those nonresident customers who shall have deposited the sum of at least \$100.00 in advance of compliance by the City with the requirements of the Federal EDA Loan Agreement to finance said construction project in order to enable the City to comply with said requirements and provide such persons request service within sixty days after same is available.

Higher connection charges, subject to the same \$25.00 reduction specified above, shall be made to nonresident water customers for larger size connections to cover increased meter costs, as follows:

Size of Connection	Connection Charge
3/4 inch	\$ 100.00
1 inch	150.00
1-1/2 inch	200.00
2 inch	250.00

New customers of the sewer system shall pay a connection charge of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00).

**SECTION 4. RIGHTS ON PAYMENT OF CONNECTION CHARGES.**

The payment of a connection charge by a property owner entitles the owner of such property to have the water line and/or sewer line, as the case may be, brought to a point in the edge of his property line or easement.

The payment of the applicable water connection charge entitles the applicant to the following:

- (a) A tap at the water main.
- (b) A sufficient amount of 3/4 inch tubing to extend from the water main to a point at least 6 inches inside the utility easement or sidewalk line of the Applicant's property if there is a sidewalk; otherwise to a point at least two feet inside the property line or utility easement of the Applicant if there is no sidewalk.
- (c) A complete meter installation to be installed at the point of ending of the tubing, which meter installation will consist of a meter.

Said waterworks connection charge is a tap-in or service charge for the privilege of connecting to the waterworks system of the City, and the payment of such amount does not constitute the purchase of a water meter. Title to water meters shall at all times remain vested in the City, and, if a meter is not used by an applicant, such meter may be removed by the City as needed.

All property owners in the City who apply for water and/or sewer service and who tender the applicable connection charges, shall be entitled with reference to any premises abutting on any street, road, alley, public way or easement in which there exists, within fifty (50) feet of the property line or easement of such owner, a water line and/or sewer pipe, main, lateral or other structure, or installation of the sewer system capable of receiving flowable wastes, as the case may be, to have such water line and/or sewer line brought, by average depth, to a point located at the edge of his property line or easement; or if his property line or easement is located more than 50 feet therefrom and/or requires that a line or lines be laid more than average depth in order to serve his premises, he may be entitled to the same privilege by paying the additional cost of bringing said line or lines the additional distance, in excess of 50 feet, to his property line or easement, and by paying the additional cost, if any, of laying such line or lines deeper than average depth.

Each customer must bear the cost of running his water line and/or sewer line from the building located on his premises to the point in his property line or easement or such other point as such water and/or sewer line has been brought by the City to serve his premises.

Each property owner shall indemnify the City from any loss or damage that may directly or indirectly be occasioned by the construction of a water line and/or sewer line from the respective premises to the point or points where the City has brought such line or lines, and all water and sewer connections shall be made under the supervision of the Superintendent of the municipal waterworks and sewer systems.

**SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE FOR WATER CHARGES**

The foregoing water rates and charges shall be effective as to existing water customers for the next monthly billing beginning immediately after the effective date of this Ordinance, and shall be effective as to the respective premises of new water customers beginning on the date on which such customer connects his premises to the water line made available to such premises.

**SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE FOR SEWER CHARGES**

The sewer system shall be considered "available" to any premises which abut upon any street, road, alley, public or private way or easement in which there exists a sewer pipe, main, lateral or other structure or installation of the municipal sanitary sewer system of the City, capable of receiving flowable wastes, in which there has been brought or will have been brought a sewer line to a point located at the edge of the property line or easement of the owner of such premises.

The foregoing sewer rates and charges prescribed in this Ordinance shall be effective as to all premises whose water or sewer lines are made available as above defined, upon the date of actual connection thereto, or upon a date ninety (90) days after the Superintendent of the sewer system furnishes notice to such property owner, either by personal written notice or by notice published in a newspaper of general circulation throughout Rockcastle County, Kentucky, to the effect that sewer service is available to such premises, as defined above, whichever service is discontinued by the City, reconnection of such service shall not be made until the customer or user pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of Five Dollars (\$5.00) as a disconnection and reconnection charge.

**SECTION 7. RATES ARE EXCLUSIVE OF SALES TAX**

The foregoing rates and rates to be charged by the City of Mt. Vernon, and any applicable State sales tax shall be added to each bill as a separate charge.

**SECTION 8. ALL CUSTOMERS METERED: NO FREE SERVICE**

It shall be mandatory for all customers of the waterworks system to be metered. No one shall receive or be entitled to free water or sewer service or to any such service without paying the full rates herein specified.

**SECTION 9. METERS READ MONTHLY.**

Water meters shall be read monthly commencing on the fifteenth day of each calendar month or as soon thereafter as weather and other conditions and circumstances may reasonably permit, and such readings shall continue as expeditiously as possible until all of the meters have been read. In the event that upon the occasion of a monthly meter reading, it is found that the meter of a customer is defective or non-operative, the bill of such customer shall be computed on the basis of the average monthly water consumption of such customer shown by the three preceding monthly meter readings, provided that if no such readings are then available, the applicable water bill may be computed on the basis of an estimate of water consumption, estimated by the Superintendent of the waterworks system, subject to adjustment upward or downward according to the average of the next three succeeding monthly meter readings.

**SECTION 10. DEPOSITS.**

Deposits shall be required of applicants for water service for the respective size connections, for both residents and nonresidents of the City as follows:

Size of Connection	Amount of Deposit Required
3/4 inch	\$10.00
1 inch	20.00
1-1/2 inch	30.00
2 inch	50.00

The applicable deposit shall be paid to the City by any applicant for water service before such applicant shall be entitled to such service. No such separate charge shall be made for sewer services except for such customers, if any, as shall desire sewer service without also being customers of the municipal water system of the City, in which event, such customers must make adequate satisfactory arrangements with the Superintendent of the municipal sewer system for separate metering of the sewer service usage comparable to the charges based on water consumption. The amount of deposits required, less any unpaid charges, shall be refunded to the customer paying same, or to his heirs or assigns, whenever the City is duly notified legally to disconnect or terminate service to such customer.

**SECTION 11. OWNERS PAY CONNECTION CHARGES; OCCUPANTS PAY MONTHLY RATES.**

Connection charges, where applicable, shall be the personal obligation, collectible by law, of the person or persons who own the lot, property or building receiving the benefits of such use and service so long as the same continues, provided that the satisfaction of the liability by any party shall be a discharge of the liability for which the payment is made.

**SECTION 12. MULTIPLE USERS.**

Where two or more tenants or occupants (of different rental units) of property are served by a single water meter, the water and sewer rates and charges shall be the personal obligation, collectible by law, of the person or persons who apply for such service and, where applicable, make the required deposit. Each such occupant shall be billed his proportionate (to the number of users and not to the quantity used) share of the water and sewer charges applicable to such property, and each shall constitute a separate user and be billed accordingly, and in any event, not less than the minimum rate herein prescribed. The computation of water (and sewer) consumption applicable to each user shall be made the same as if only one customer occupied the entire property; provided, however, that upon the filing of an application for a separate water meter and upon payment of the applicable fee and deposit therefor, the City shall install a separate water meter for such applicant, in which event such applicant will be billed at the water and sewer rates applicable to the usage of water and sewer service recorded by such separate meter.

**SECTION 13. REVISION OF RATES.**

The schedule of rates and charges prescribed in this Ordinance shall be revised from time to time, and whenever required shall be increased, so as to produce income and revenues from the municipal waterworks and sewer systems, adequate to comply with such covenants and agreements as may be made by the City in connection with any Revenue Bonds issued by the City.

**SECTION 14. SPECIAL RATES**

In the event that the sewage, water or other liquid wastes are discharged into the municipal sewer system from any premises shall contain unduly high concentrations of any substances which tend to the operating costs of the municipal sewer system, then special rates, rentals or charges may be established, charged and collected as to such building or premises; or the owner or other interested party may be required to treat specially such sewage, water or other liquid wastes before it is discharged into the municipal sewer system.

**SECTION 15. BILLING; COLLECTIONS; PENALTIES.**

The rates or charges aforesaid shall be billed monthly on or about the first of each month, and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable within (20) days after rendition. If a bill is not paid as aforesaid within such 20 day period, such bill shall be deemed delinquent, and the City shall, in any event, be a party to each bill not so paid, in an amount equal to ten percent (10%) of the charges (other than sales tax) shown on the face amount of said bill not so paid, for each period of thirty (30) days thereafter that same remains unpaid. If a bill is not paid within the first thirty days after becoming delinquent (50 days after rendition), the City Attorney is hereby authorized and directed to enforce and collect any such delinquent charges.

**SECTION 26. DELINQUENCY; DISCONNECTION OF WATER SERVICE; RECONNECTION.**

If a bill is not paid after remaining delinquent for thirty (30) days (50 days after rendition), the Superintendent of the municipal waterworks system shall thereupon turn off the water of such delinquent customer and may further enjoin the use of the water facilities of the City by said customer until payment is made in full. If any deadline date herein specified falls on a Sunday or on a legal holiday, such deadline shall not expire until the end of the next secular day thereafter. If such water service is discontinued by the City, reconnection of such service shall not be made until the customer or user pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of Five Dollars (\$5.00) as a disconnection and reconnection charge.

**SECTION 17. DEPOSIT IS NO EXCUSE OR DELINQUENCY**

The foregoing provisions are intended to and shall apply regardless of the availability of any initial deposit required by this Ordinance.

**SECTION 18. RECORDS AND AUDITS**

The rates, rentals, and charges for the use of and services rendered by the municipal waterworks and sewer systems shall be billed and collected by the City, and the full amount of the proceeds of such service shall be deposited as received and as aside into the appropriate Fund designated, in such manner as the Superintendent of the project may determine, or to any other different designation which may be made in any ordinance relating to the issuance of Revenue Bonds. The records of the City with respect to charging, billing, collecting and accounting for water and sewer service shall be audited at least once a year by an Independent Certified Public Accountant, and a report thereof shall be filed with the City Clerk, or such report (if any) shall be filed in such manner and at such other time or times as may be stipulated in any ordinance relating to the issuance of Revenue Bonds. The cost of such audit shall be classified and paid as an expense of operation and maintenance of the municipal waterworks and sewer systems.

**SECTION 19. SEVERABILITY**

If any clause, provision, paragraph or section of this Ordinance be held void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder hereof is intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

**SECTION 20. ALL FORMER PROVISIONS REPEALED; EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE.**

All City ordinances, orders, resolutions, motions, or parts thereof, insofar as same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption, approval and publication as provided by law, except that the rates herein prescribed shall be effective on the respective dates herein provided.

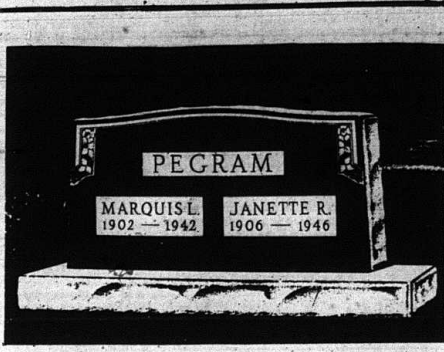

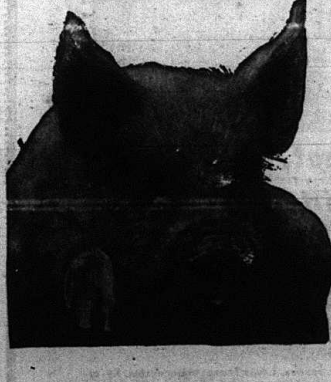

**VETERANS Q. & A.**

Q- Last year I attended college under the G. I. Bill. I plan to return to school this fall, but desire to enter a different college. Must I notify VA in advance?

A- Yes. This will allow VA to process your payments much quicker and will permit them to issue you a new Certificate of Eligibility for the school of your choice.

Q- May I borrow on my G.I. Insurance to help pay college expenses for my son or daughter?

A- If you have a permanent plan G. I. insurance policy, you may borrow up to 84 percent of the cash value of the policy. The interest charge is 4 percent.

Q- I am a service-connected disabled veteran rated 50 percent disabled. My son is 22 years of age, is a Post Korean veteran, and is enrolled

in school under the new G. I. Bill. Am I still eligible for additional compensation?

A- Yes, you may be eligible for additional compensation (until your son reaches age 23) although he is receiving educational benefits as a veteran.

Children of deceased servicemen may be eligible for pensions even though their mothers are not, the Veterans Administration reminded today.

The reminder explained that this situation occurs under either of two circumstances: First, the unmarried widow may be ineligible because her income exceeds limits set by law.

Second, when a widow receives a pension for herself and her children remarries, she loses her personal elig-

ibility for a pension based on her veteran husband's death.

Minor children, however, may continue to receive pension payments in either case, even though they live with their mother, VA said. Their personal eligibility is limited only by their personal incomes.

If a child's income is greater than \$1,800 per year, no pension will be paid, but the child's own earnings are not counted.

The VA stressed that a widow's personal ineligibility should not prevent her from applying to a Veterans Administration office. Unless an application is made, VA has no way of knowing about children who might be eligible.

Pensions may be paid to certain survivors of veterans of all wars, including the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Era Conflict, who die of

causes not related to their service. Eligibility and the amount of pension are determined by the survivor's income.

Compensation, on the other hand, is paid to the survivors of veterans who die of service-connected causes, and income of the survivor has no bearing on eligibility or amount paid. Remarriage of the widow receiving compensation makes her ineligible, but, as in the case of pensions, the mother's remarriage does not affect the eligibility of her children.
