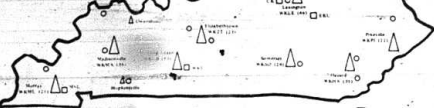

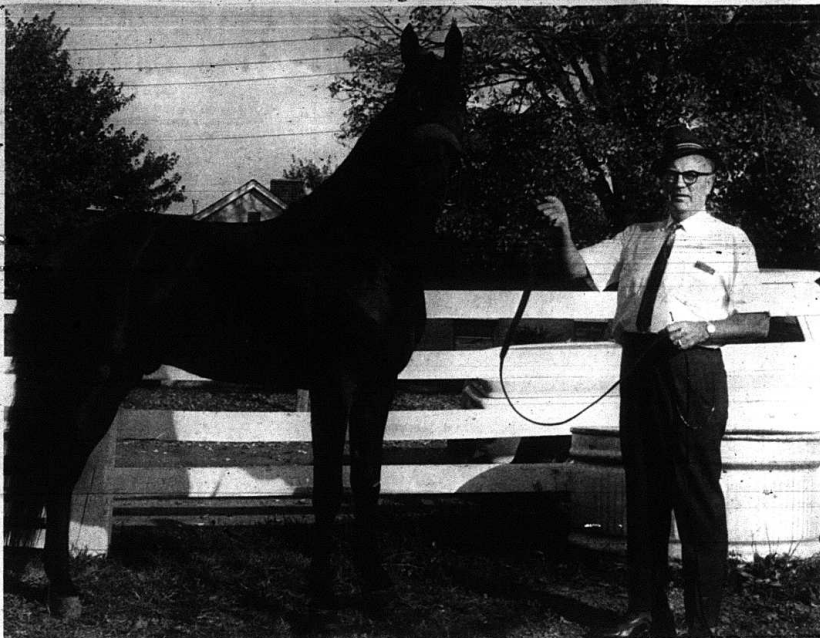

## MRS. LAURA E. HELTON DIES IN LEXINGTON

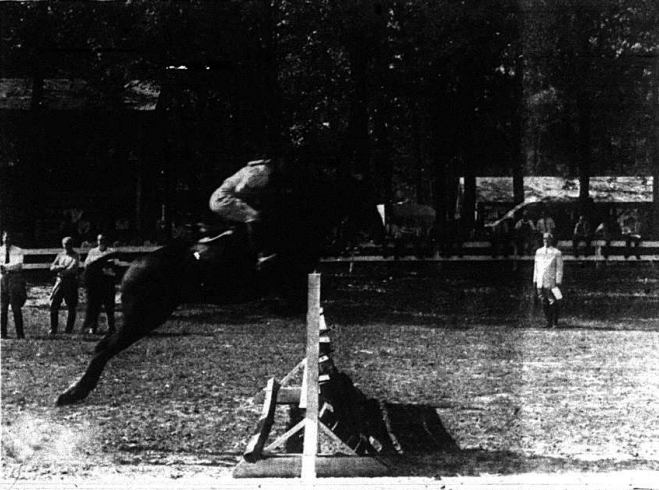

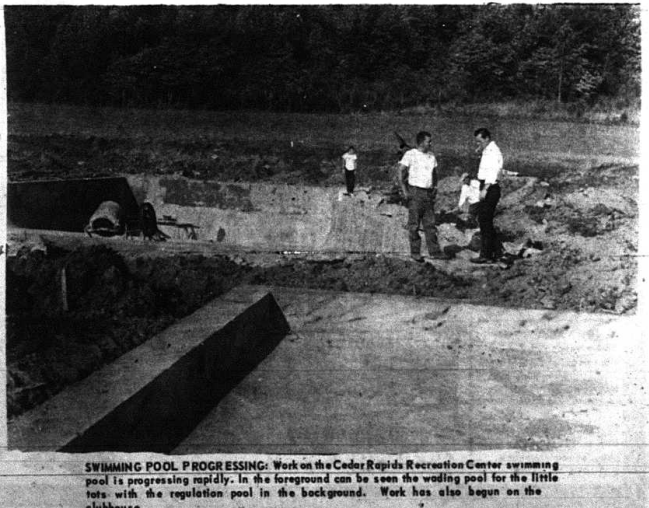

### Dairy Farmers To Push Consumer Advertising

At a district meeting held in Stanford, Kentucky, Tuesday, October 8, at the Farm Bureau Building, the dairy farmers were presented an intensified program of advertising to reach consumers. According to James Arnold Carner, a Lincoln County dairy farmer and director of American Dairy Association of Kentucky, the association will be budgeting in excess of \$500,000 for advertising in Kentucky during 1969 to reach Kentucky consumers. The additional program is the result of the referendum passed by dairy farmers last September where they will invest 4¢ a hundred pounds for fluid milk and 3¢ for manufactured milk shipped.

Mrs. J. L. Coats, Shelbyville, Kentucky introduced a statewide program being conducted by an affiliated group of dairy wives, named the "Adas." One of its main current projects is a consumer promotion, which is to be set up in each county.

The highlight of the meeting was the selection of Miss Monica Estes, of Route 1, Wayneburg, as one of the ten finalists to compete in February for the state title of Kentucky Dairy Princess.

### Kentucky Fertilizer Conference To Be Held At Lexington November 7

Fertilizer industry officials and persons from related fields meet here Thursday, November 7 for the annual Kentucky Fertilizer Conference. Site is the Imperial House Hotel and the first session is 9:30 a.m. Dr. John L. Ragland, Chairman of the U.K. agronomy department, will preside in the morning. Prof. Bruce Poundstone, in the afternoon.

The program includes talks on fertilizer labeling, water pollution, fluid fertilizers, industry-university relationships and Agricultural Conservation (ACP) programs and regulations.

Second Annual Store Fruit-Vegetable Session Scheduled December 11-12 In Hardin  
 The second annual state-wide Fruit and Vegetable Growers meeting will be held Dec. 11-12 at Elizabethtown, says W. D. Amstutz, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service horticulturist, Princeton. Site is the Nolin RECC building at Elizabethtown, Hardin County.

The first day will be on vegetables, the second day on fruits.

If Buying or Selling Cattle, Watch for Certain Factors  
 Buying or selling feeder calves this month or next? Check some important points before doing it, says Dr. Roy C. Gray, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service beef cattle specialist.

Check on prices paid for cattle this year, to see if they are up or down. Weights—lighter or heavier compared to last year—should be considered. Whether there is a demand for the cattle you will buy or sell is important, too. And, know how many cattle you can handle if you decide the price is right, keeping in mind your farm and labor facilities.

Prices for steers versus heifers of the same weight, breed and grade should be considered. Another good point is how long you intend to keep cattle bought, so you can figure supply and demand when you plan to sell.

Best information sources are auction sales, talks with buyers and sellers, market reports, professional advice,

and checking other herds and producers for information.

Beef producers should treat for cattle grub by mid-October if at all possible. Other fall management includes can-trading and "die-homing" all calves, vaccination for blackhead and malignant edema, calfhood vaccination for, brucellosis and isolation of newly purchased cattle. The cow herd should start getting 30,000 I.U. of Vitamin A per head daily by Thanksgiving day; and producers with sudan type of supplemental pasture should watch for first signs of frost since prussic acid builds up in sudan type forages after the first frost, and is very dangerous to the ruminant animal.

State's Cash Farm Receipts Up 13 Percent From 1967's

Kentucky farmers got \$820,861,000 in cash receipts from farm product sales in 1967, the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said this week in a report. James Koepfer, statistician, said the figure is 13 percent above year—earlier figures establish a new record high. The previous record year was 1964, 11 percent below the 1967 figures. Koepfer's report to the U.K. Cooperative Extension Service noted, the following: (1) Livestock and livestock products, \$380,812,000, down 5 percent from 1966; (2) dairy products, \$110,298,000, one percent above 1966; and (3)

receipts from sale of crops, \$440,049,000; tobacco receipts were up 42 percent because of heavier pre-holiday marketing in 1967 and a heavy carryover of 1966 crop tobacco into 1967; soybeans and wheat registered gains of more than 20 percent.

"Realized" gross receipts for 1967 were \$968,400,000, the report said, for 1967. This figure is 11 percent above the 1966 figure.

Government payments in 1967 accounted for \$41.5 million, the report says.

The breakdown for 1967: Tobacco, 41.8 percent of the receipts; corn, 4.2 percent; soybeans, 3.2 percent; other crops, 4.6 percent; cattle and calves, 19.4 percent; dairy products, 13.4 percent; hogs, 8.6 percent; eggs and other livestock products, 4.9 percent.

## Social Security News

Social Security beneficiaries in Rockcastle County, who need to report changes of address or other events that affect the payment of their monthly benefits may now do so through the social security office in the Tradewind Shopping Center in Somerset, James Mustian, Officer-in-Charge, said today. Reports may be made by mail, telephone, or personal visit.

Mustian said that up to 100 beneficiaries were encouraged to notify the Social Security Administration about the occurrence of these events, on postcard forms pre-addressed to one of six social security record centers throughout the county. Beneficiaries received the postcard forms when they initially applied for monthly benefits.

Mustian said that the change in reporting methods is designed to reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. The change is prompted by the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information over high speed communications circuits to record offices.

In addition to address changes, Mustian said that affect receipt of monthly events that affect receipt of monthly social security checks include employment, marriage or remarriage in some instances, divorce, and death.

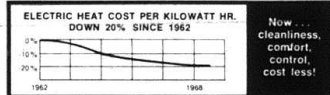
