## Appraisal of Potential for Outdoor Recreation

A committee of fourteen men, representing various agencies, worked for two days last week in an appraisal of potentials for twelve types of outdoor recreation developments in Rockcastle County.

The study was conducted jointly by the Soil Conservation Service and the Cooperative Extension Service.

Development areas studied were: vacation cabins and homesites; camping grounds, picnic and field sports areas; fishing waters; golf courses; hunting areas; natural scenic and historic areas; riding stables; shooting preserves; vacation farms and ranches; water sports area and winter sports area.

An inventory will be made of natural scenic and historic areas, existing waters and potential impoundment sites.

Appraising the potentials for outdoor recreation is an essential step for future planning in these areas.

This is part of a nation wide effort to determine potentials available for outdoor recreation development.

After the report is completed it will be published by the University of Kentucky and made available to the various

agencies and development groups.

Following order: first, the sticks of the lowest quality, then the flyings, then the next quality, etc. Next load the high quality legs. The leaf is then loaded, beginning with that of the highest quality and then in the order of quality to the lowest.

Tobacco can be mixed up when it is unloaded on the warehouse floor for sale. This work is often done by inexperienced men and can cause a big loss in dollar volume to the farmer, so it is necessary for the grower to unload directly on the basket at the warehouse. This eliminates a lot of shattering and mixing.

How your tobacco is arranged for sale may greatly influence your returns. If your tobacco is sold in order of quality, it assists both the starter and the buyer. Tobacco so displayed is more attractive and usually sells better than the laid out for sale without regard to group or quality.

Before your tobacco is sold, you should have unbiased information on the grade and approximate support price. The grade placed on the warehouse ticket will give the correct description of each lot of tobacco. The daily price report will indicate the average selling price for each grade at the time the report was issued. This will give you the information you need to find out if your tobacco is bringing a true price. If it is

not, you might wish to reject it and offer it for sale at a later date.

There are 111 standard grades of burley tobacco. You do not need to remember their characteristics in preparing your crop for market. However, if crops are well prepared, each lot of tobacco will fall into one of the standard grades. This procedure will assure each grower of the highest price possible.

New "Researched" Stripping Lights Available Now

Tobacco stripping room lights, 40-watt fluorescent tubes researched by the University of Kentucky and now available on the commercial market, should be considered by farmers.

Ira Massie, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service specialist, urged farmers this week (1) Check stripping room lights now, and replace worn out or unsatisfactory fluorescent tubes; and (2) try to get these newly researched and proven lights. The tubes, developed by Carl Clark, U.K. agricultural economist, and Gerald White, U.K. agricultural engineer, have been tried for two years over the state and comments run from "good" to "highly satisfactory."

Good lighting in the stripping room, with tubes that bring out the colors needed for accurate stripping and grading, is a must, Mr. Massie says.

Millegede Invasion On Now, But Insecticides Will Control, Homeowners are complaining now of small, horn segmented many-legged worms found on

floors of residences and around doorways and patios, says Dr. Rudy Scheiber, of the U.K. Cooperative Extension Service.

These are millepedes, who invade homes this time of year, he says. They do no harm, except for annoyance and may leave a stain when crushed.

Put a 10-foot wide band of insecticide around the house. This can be by spray, dust or granules, though sprays are preferred.

Use one of three materials -- Diazinon, Chlordane or Heptachlor. Diazinon is the quickest and most effective but wears off in a week or 10 days; Chlordane is useful but is the least effective of the three; Heptachlor is not as effective as Diazinon but its killing power remains much longer.

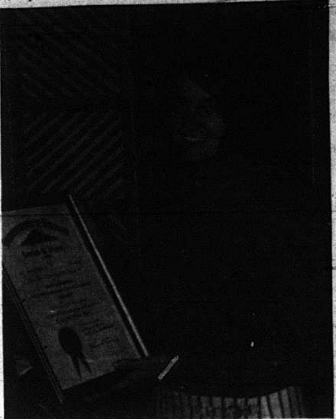

## City Votes To Annex Lake Property; Includes 80 Homes

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Tuesday night to broaden the city limits of Mt. Vernon by approximately 80 homes.

The action is the result of a petition signed by about 74 of the 80 property owners requesting the annexation by the city.

The property which will be brought into the city limits begins on West Main Street near the property of Attorney John Allen continues past Kenneth Comelius' property on the Old Broodhead Mt. Vernon Road, encompasses the lake property, takes in Gladys Hays' home, Homer Hill's property and property belong-

ing to Jack Reid Craig on the Renfro Road. The line then continues across the old Broodhead Mt. Vernon Road and beginning at the property belonging to Sue Hunt comes back down to property belonging to Burgess Evans on West Main Street. The annexation also includes the subdivision on Goldie Barnett's property.

Five of the six City Councilmen were present for Tuesday night's meeting and the annexation motion carried unanimously. Carl Kelley was the councilman absent from the meeting.

Presently, the city's sewer lines stop at the city limits on Main Street. There are no plans for the immediate installation of sewer lines to the annexed property. The sewer line extension will depend, of course, on the funds available.

Residents of the area to be annexed will of course be entitled to fire protection, when the annexation is complete, which was one of the main reasons given in the petition for desiring to be taken into the city limits.

Another factor in favor of the annexation will be the fact that Mt. Vernon's population will be raised by about 300 residents in the area.

### ROBERT HAYES, 19, INJURED IN ACCIDENT

Robert Lee Hayes, 19, is a patient at the Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington following an accident which occurred Sunday morning, November 10, on the Sand Springs Road. He is reported suffering from a broken left leg and arm.

According to State Police, Hayes had side-swiped a parked car, belonging to Marion Woodall, on Williams Street in Mt. Vernon about 10:30 a.m., Sunday morning. He then left the scene of the accident and was later met by State Trooper Gary Godby on the Sand Springs Road. According to Trooper Godby, who was coming toward Mt. Vernon at the time of the encounter with Hayes, he had already been informed of the hit-and-run accident on Williams Street by radio and upon meeting Hayes, he (Godby) immediately turned his car around and drove back to Hayes. Godby stated that Hayes was traveling about 75 m.p.h. when his car left the road in a curve. The Hayes car left the road three times, the last time going over an embankment and into a telephone pole.

## City Receives \$235,000 Check From EDA On Lake Project

Presentation of a check for \$235,000 from the Economic Development Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, to the City of Mt. Vernon, was made last Friday by H. H. Smith, Jr., Economic Development Specialist, who represents the Agency in 25 eastern Kentucky counties. Officially accepting the check on behalf of the City was Mayor Clyde Linville.

According to Smith, whose office is in Hindman, Ky.,

the initial disbursement of \$235,000 is a part of a \$965,000 grant and \$624,000 loan made to the City of Mt. Vernon by the Economic Development Administration to finance construction and improvement to the City's water system, which includes a 400 acre Lake created by the construction of Interstate Highway 75. The expanded water system will enable the City to not only provide better service to its existing cus-

tomers but will expand service to commercial developments at I-75 interchanges and will also make water-service available to the City of Broodhead and will serve many potential industrial sites.

The Economic Development Administration's Mid-Eastern Area Office, directed by William E. Davis, presented the City's application for EDA assistance to a favorable decision.

## School Board Votes To Build County High School

The Rockcastle County Board of Education voted at its regular monthly meeting Monday night to proceed with plans to build a central county high school.

The motion was made by Harold Ballinger, seconded by Preston Nunneley and carried unanimously.

Mr. Nunneley stated after the motion had been made and carried that he felt that a central high school had been needed for some time and that the only drawback had been, up till now, a lack of bonding potential.

At the present time, the school system has a bonding potential of \$1,500,000 which would be sufficient to build a central high school. Whether a four-year or three-year school will be built has not been decided yet. A Department of Education Facilities Survey recommends that only a senior high (grades 10 through 12) be built. However, a decision cannot be reached until some future date on this since more facts and figures will have to be known concerning the cost.

Charles P. Parsons, Superintendent of the board, said that he would ask Lloyd Shatts, County Schools Finance Officer, to be present at the next meeting of the board to tell them exactly how the school system stood as far as indebtedness and other financial matters.

Some approximate figures on the present indebtedness of the school system was given to the board by Superintendent Parsons. He told the members that the indebtedness for Roundstone and Broodhead Schools was about \$191,000 and that the Broodhead bonds would be paid off in 1971 with the Roundstone School being paid off in 1976.

He also said that the money, which would be used to repay the \$1,500,000, would come from Capital Outlay Funds which next year will be \$1200 per class room unit and that it would probably take from 25 to 30 years to repay the bonds. This \$1200 figure represents a 50% increase over the amount received by the school system in 1967. In 1968, \$700 per class room unit was received from Capital Outlay Funds.

There will be no tax increase to build the school since the \$1,500,000 will be sufficient for construction and this is presently the school's bonding potential without a tax increase.

The site of the new county high school will no doubt be on the Old Broodhead Road at the site of the vocational school presently under construction. Last year, the board purchased ten acre site for the vocational school and took an option on an additional twenty acres. The option has been exercised. There should be sufficient space for the high school at this site since part of the school's facilities could be located on the acreage allotted for the vocational school. Another point in favor of this location is that students who are enrolled in vocational training classes would not have to be transported from their high school to the vocational school.

One of the next steps will be for Superintendent Parsons to meet with officials from the State Department of Education and the Department of Finance and to hire a Fiscal Agent through which the bonds would be sold.

Any construction of this calibre involves a great deal

of time and effort but one of the major steps was taken last Monday night when the board voted, with unanimous backing, to undertake the construction.

In other business before the board, bids for wiring Roundstone Elementary School for Educational Television were opened.

The contractors were asked first to submit a base bid for the wiring and then to submit an alternate bid on a new tower and antennae, in the event that it proves necessary to erect them. Sneeders Supply Company of Owensboro, submitted the low base bid of \$187,300 for the wiring. However, Harney Miller's in Lexington submitted the low bid of \$268.05 on installing the tower and antennae. The third bidder, Telecast of Paris, will be higher than the other two companies on both projects.

Since the board did not know if a new tower and antennae would be needed and since they did not wish to delay the project any longer than necessary it was decided to award the contract for the wiring installation to the low bidder, Sneeders Supply Company.

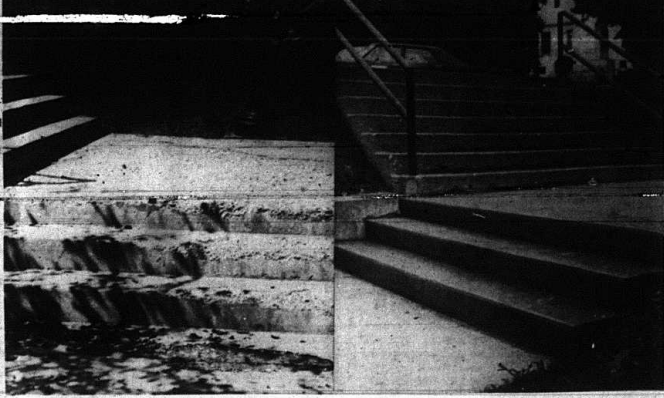

on your freedom of locomotion. The law places a high value on the right of every individual to go where he pleases. Even if your freedom is limited for only a few moments, you may have grounds for complaint. Thus, a weary housewife, walking home from the market, gratefully accepted a ride offered by the man next door. But to her dismay, he began talking to her in amorous terms. Despite her protests, he kept on driving past her house. Not until a block beyond was she able to get out of the car with some degree of dignity. When she sued the man for damages, a court ruled she had in-

deed suffered false imprisonment— although it had lasted only a few moments. The court said she had been forcibly prevented, by the man's continuing movement, from leaving when she wanted to. Nevertheless, not every interference with your freedom is false imprisonment. Take this situation: A shopper had just emerged from a department store when a clerk to the clerk. She had hurried outside after her purse she was carrying, he left when she wanted to. "Did you buy that here?" The woman said no—and then,

without being asked, painstakingly exhibited the purse and its contents on the sidewalk, not out of any compulsion by the clerk but of her own free will. Admittedly, this incident did delay her departure. But had she suffered false imprisonment? In a court case, the judge said no. He pointed out that she had lingered

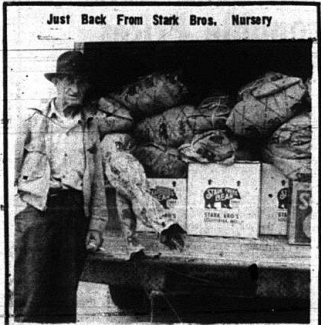

## Selective Service Board To Review Student Files

Selective Service Local Boards in Kentucky will be reviewing the files of undergraduate students who appear to be experiencing trouble in completing a proportionate share of their requirements for college graduation each academic year.

The Selective Service Law and Regulations dealing with the deferment of undergraduate students was discussed in detail at the annual Conference of the Kentucky Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admission Officers held at the University of Kentucky on November 1.

In order to retain a student deferment it is necessary for the student to complete a proportion of the work each year as relates to the total requirements for graduation. In other words if his major requires 128-hours to graduate, he would be required to complete at least 32-hours the first year, 64-hours by the end of the second year, etc. As long as he completes these requirements, he may be continued to be deferred under current Regulations until he reaches age 24, drops out of school, or graduates, whichever is the earlier. Even after losing a student deferment, an individual may be entitled to a statutory deferment until the end of his academic year, provided, he is a satisfactory student at the time he is reached for induction.

The Association had as its guest Col. Taylor L. Davidson, State Director of Selective Service and the matter of student deferments was discussed in great detail by the conferees. The State Director expressed an interest in cooperating with the colleges and universities and administering the Law fairly and equitably as relates to students.
