

An Editorial

Since the completion of the dam at Lake Linville, the City Council must now begin considering the many other details involved in getting the lake operable in the next couple of years.

One of the most important of these related details will be leasing the boat dock facilities to private individuals or corporations.

It has come to our attention that there is some consideration being made by city officials of leasing the boat dock rights to a corporation without benefit of advertising for the best bid.

While this can legally be done, we personally feel that city officials should, by all means, advertise for the best bid for the boat dock rights. We are sure that there could be an agreeable deal made with this corporation by members of the city council, we still feel that in the best interests of the citizens of Mt. Vernon, this should not be decided without advertising for bids.

According to a legal opinion, solicited by one city official, the lessee (the corporation leasing the dock rights) does not even have to obtain the approval of the city council as to its terms and prices. All the lessee may terminate the lease on one-year's notice, irregardless of the fact that the city will have to float enough revenue bonds for a period of ten years to cover construction costs.

Of course, at the end of twenty years, the city would own the boat dock but they would have derived very little, if any, income from the facilities during the twenty-year period and no doubt the dock, by that time, would not be in the "best" state of repair.

Of course, all this can be done legally but we still feel that in all fairness to everyone concerned, the matter should be given ample consideration by the council and that the boat dock lease should be a matter of publicly advertising for bids so that the most benefits may be derived by the citizens of Mt. Vernon.

represents that division. Mrs. Mullins would probably not have any problems until the election since the board could grant her the authority to represent Division No. 1 until the election.

The board decided to do nothing definite on the re-districting at Monday night's meeting choosing to give the proposal more thought.

In other business before the board, Lloyd Shattuck, finance officer, was given the authority to pay the school personnel on the last working day of the month instead of the last calendar day, an intent to purchase more school buses through state bids was authorized by the board; Dallas Morgan was officially hired to replace Joe Martin as bus driver, and board voted to allow students to get a total of 6 credits from classes at the vocational school over a two year period. The school is expected to be ready for use next September. The board also authorized a letter of intent to be sent to the Department of Education notifying them of the board's intent to participate in the ESSEA Title III program for the coming year and on a motion made by Preston Nunnally and seconded by Vashli Mullins the students for Appalachia (SPA) were denied the use of school property and grounds for community programs.

Brothers that cut the dirt from the road since it contained the type of dirt needed to fill the core of the dam. The highway department later decided that the original road would have been covered by water anyway and told the residents that they were responsible for replacing only those roads which would have still been usable after the lake filled. So, the State cancelled the contract for the new road, and informed the county that it was their responsibility to rebuild responsibility to rebuild the road.

The road has caved in completely where the dirt was taken by Greer Brothers and there is water already being backed up by the dam and covering the road at another point.

The Fiscal Court deferred action on the matter until J. P. Noonan, District Highway Engineer, can meet with the court at a called meeting. Another business before the court, Robert Pybas, chairman of the Mt. Vernon Planning Commission, asked the court for the authority to be "involved" in the planning and zoning of the land within a three-mile radius of Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Pybas told the court that if the planning commission would participate in the zoning of Renfro Valley, the Burz Interchange property, and the Cedar Rapids Recreation Center area to the extent of making recommendations to the court concerning the zoning of these areas so that the residents might be better protected in their investments.

The court deferred taking action on Mr. Pybas's request until a later date.

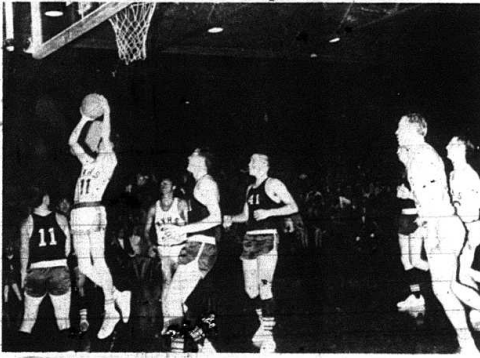

The December Swine Meeting will be held Monday, December 9 at 7 p.m. in the County courtroom of the courthouse.

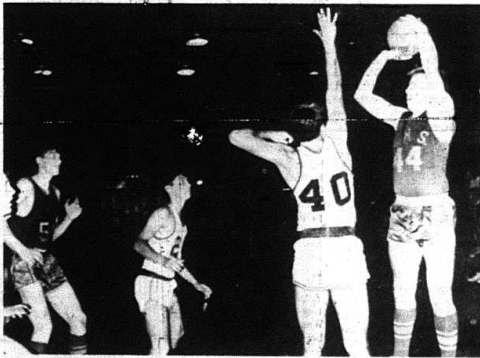

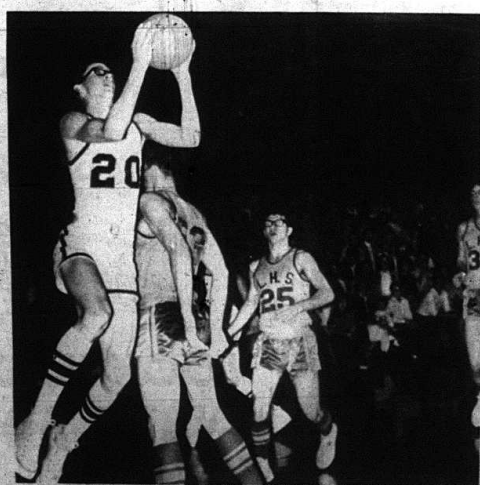

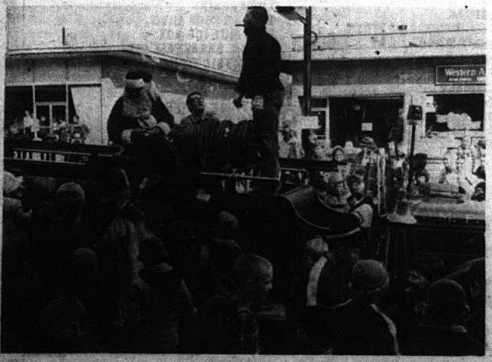

Board Discusses Redistricting

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met Monday night and discussed several important items of business. Two of the members sat on the board for the last time, Harold Ballinger, who was defeated by Virgil Mullins in the November election, and Chairman Coleman Mink, who did not run for re-election and who's seat was again by Kenneth Adams.

One of the most important items of business on the agenda was the redistricting of the five school board divisions. Superintendent Charles Parsons told the members that Sam Alexander of the State Department of Education had brought to his attention that the divisions were not

proportioned right according to the number of registered voters in each division. According to state law, there can not be more than 15% difference in the number of registered voters in the largest and smallest division.

As the divisions now stand, Division No. 4 (Climax and Orlando precincts) only has 499 registered voters while Division No. 3 (North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon and Bullock) has 1468 registered voters. The fourteen precincts are now divided into the following educational divisions: Div. 1 - East Livingston, West Livingston, South Mt. Vernon; Div. 2 - North Brodhead, West Brodhead, Brown; Div. 3 - North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon, Bullock; Div. 4 - Climax and Orlando; Div. 5 - East Mt. Vernon, Conway, Roundstone.

Under the new proposal the five divisions would be lined up as follows:

Div. 1 - North Mt. Vernon, East Mt. Vernon, West Livingston; Div. 2 - West Brodhead, Brown, Bullock; Div. 3 - West Mt. Vernon, North Brodhead; Div. 4 - Climax, East Livingston, and South Mt. Vernon.
Under the new redistricting proposal, the largest division (Division No. 2) would have 1282 registered voters in it and the smallest division (Division No. 3) would have 1135 registered voters.

CLAYTON RAY DIES OF GUNSHOT WOUND

Clayton Dale Ray, 47, of Route 1, Crab Orchard, died Sunday afternoon about 3 p.m. from an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound.

According to Sheriff Tip Reppert, Ray had checked into Gregory's motel in Mt. Vernon about 5 a.m. Sunday morning. About 2:20 p.m., Helmer Abrams of Morfill, found Ray in the room and called for help. Miss Abrams had checked in at the same time as Ray and told police that at the time of the shooting had been across the street to a drive-in restaurant for sandwiches.

Ray, a one-time field man for the ASC office in this area, was shot over the right ear with a .22 calibre pistol. He died at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital with ongoing consciousness. Coroner Bill Howell has not set the cause of death, as to whether it was suicide or not. The case has been turned over to the grand jury for investigation.

They were chased away and reportedly shot at by the Singleton's wounding Phillips and Jack Griffin.

Secondhand Bargains
Buy a secondhand lawn mower from the man next door and "speak" speaking, you're your own chances. If it falls through sooner than you expect, you will have small chance of getting your money back—at least, in a court of law.

For in the eyes of the law, one ingredient of the typical secondhand purchase is the buyer's acceptance of extra risk. You pay less not only because there is less wear left in the article, but because you don't get the implied assurance that come along with something new.

However, even in a secondhand purchase, you still have a certain degree of protection. To begin with, you are entitled to know that the article is indeed secondhand. Consider this case: A music dealer put a used piano, nicely polished, on display among his new pianos—and an unsuspecting woman bought it. When she discovered the instrument was secondhand, she sued the dealer for deceiving her.

"I told her no lies," he protested in court. "She just failed to ask me whether the piano was new."

But the court ruled in the woman's favor. The judge said the dealer had an affirmative duty to clear up a misunderstanding for which he himself was to blame. Besides information that the merchandise is used, you are entitled also to a fair description of its identity. Thus: A man who bought a 1964 Ford which turned out to be a 1963 Ford, won damages in court—despite the fact that he had bought the car "as is." The court decided that "as is" does not include "as is."

PASTURE RENOVATION MEETING SET

If you are interested in pastures that carry more livestock than your present pastures, you should plan now to attend a special pasture renovation meeting set for December 7 in the Mt. Zion community of Laurel County.

According to Manuel B. Amett, U.K. Area Extension Agent in Agronomy for the Wilderness Trail Area, the special pasture renovation meeting will be held on the Nathan Cornelius Farm, Saturday, December 7 at 10 a.m.

According to Amett, Mr. Charles and Russell Cornelius, who are now operating the farm, have improved pastures that this year have carried a cow and calf per acre. Most pastures in Kentucky fall far short of this carrying capacity.

Farmers who attend the meeting will be shown a series of slides showing the steps that have been taken to develop the improved pastures on the Cornelius farm.

Pasture renovation techniques will be demonstrated and those attending can see the equipment used and have an opportunity to ask questions, Amett says.

Any farmer in the area who is planning to do some pasture renovation within

Staw or hay mulch is beneficial if winter temperatures dip below zero.

The styrofoam rose cone is a more recent winter protection innovation. Some growers experience good success with cones, while others, have gone back to simple mounding. If a cone is used it is still advisable to mound the soil. The rose stems should not be placed under the styrofoam cap until temperatures are in the twenties.

Placing the cone on the plant too early can lead to problems. If the temperature climbs, so does the air within the cone. This new micro-climate situation provides an excellent site for disease growth and spread.

Some cones have removable tops that are taken off when the temperature rises and replaced when it falls. These work, but there is always a chance that the gardeners will forget to replace the top when it gets cold. When spring comes the cones should be removed when night temperatures are above 32 degrees F. The soil mound can be left on longer and

removed about March 15. Rose cones provide excellent homes for mice. Mice extensively damage rose canes by gnawing the stems. It is best to place a poisoned bait under each cone to eliminate this problem.

Insecticide Season Virtually Over, So Store Chemicals Safely. Summer's insect problems are gone now—so store your insecticides properly says Dr. Rudy Scheibner, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service entomologist.

"Except for some perpetual insects, pesticides should be moved now to safe storage places. One item of this safe storage is keeping these chemicals out of reach of children," Dr. Scheibner notes. "Keep them under lock and key now that the 'bug' season is virtually over."

Warm, dry storage places should be picked, because some materials breakdown from freezing and can not be used again, he notes.
