to authorize Mr. Parsons to employ a surveyor to survey the land around Sand Hill and Brush Ridge Schools so that the schools might be sold. Since the board already had a deed to the Clinton grounds, it will not be necessary for these grounds to be surveyed.

Mr. Neil Craig was granted a leave-of-absence for the remainder of the year by the board and Mrs. Virginia Taylor was granted a leave-of-absence, because of illness, for the 1969-70 school year.

Board member Virgil Mullins brought up the Climax School lunchroom situation at the meeting. Mr. Mullins told the board that, at present, the teacher was being to devote too much of her time to cooking for the youngsters since the regular cook had quit and hadn't been replaced. He asked the board if there wasn't something that could be done about getting a cook for the school.

Supt. Parsons explained to the board that the lunchroom has a deficit of \$256 now and that since the lunchroom couldn't pay for itself it had been decided to let the teacher, Mrs. Hill, do the cooking rather than to run it at a deficit. However, Mr. Parsons told Mr. Mullins that he would see if something couldn't possibly be worked out at least by the beginning of the next school year.

The new Vocational School will be turned over to the school board the first of May, according to Supt. Parsons. Among other things, this means that the board will then have to assume the responsibility of insuring the building. It was decided by the board to have the building moved into the blanket policy now covering all school buildings in the county since this would be cheaper than advertising for bids and writing a separate policy.


Mr. Parsons pointed out to the board that this blanket coverage policy would come up for bids in April of 1970.

Engineers "Re-Evaluating" Rockcastle Dam Project

The chance that there will be a dam and reservoir built on the Rockcastle River has been given a boost, according to Rep. Harold DeMarcus.

DeMarcus recently wrote President Nixon concerning the strong interest for the project and President Nixon asked C.H. Dunn, Major General of the Army and Acting Chief of Engineers, to reply to Mr. DeMarcus's letter.

In the letter, Maj. Gen. Dunn stated "President Nixon has asked that I reply to your letter with inclosed resolution concerning a dam and reservoir project on the Rockcastle River in southeastern Kentucky.

The resolution that you introduced in the Kentucky General Assembly in 1965, which was passed by both Houses of the State Legislature, was most helpful in

calling our attention to the strong local interest in the construction of a dam and reservoir project on the Rockcastle River. Our District Engineer in Nashville is aware of the local interest that has been evidenced and he has been re-evaluating the project in light of the new criteria being applied for potential water resources projects in Appalachia.

Our studies on the development of the water resources of the Appalachian Region, as directed by the Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965, are still underway and no final conclusion has been reached with respect to whether or not a dam and reservoir project on the Rockcastle River will be recommended for construction in our forthcoming report to the Congress.

Architects Hired For County High School

Donald B. Shelton Architects of Lexington will serve as the architectural firm for the new county high school. Mr. Shelton's firm was hired at Monday night's meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education by unanimous vote of the board.

Shelton's firm which is ten-years old, has built several high schools some of which are the Wolfe County High School, Maceo County Elementary, and Dixie Elementary in Fayette County. Shelton told the board that if his firm was hired they would be able to begin work immediately on the project and would provide full-time inspection at no additional cost to the board.

Mr. Shelton's fee of five and one-quarter per cent was about one-half per cent lower than most of the other architects and this, along with the fact that full time inspection would be provided and that they could begin work on the project immediately, were pretty much the deciding factors for the board.

Shelton told the board that he had studied quite thoroughly the work being done by Dr. John W. Gilliland and thought that he had some very good and worthwhile ideas in school planning.

Superintendent Parsons then explained to the board exactly who Dr. Gilliland is and the type of work which he does. Mr. Parsons told the board that he went to Harlan recently, where Dr. Gilliland is involved in planning a school and talked with him. He (Dr. Gilliland) is associated with the School Planning Laboratory at the University of Tennessee and he, along with a staff trained in planning schools, has done the planning for over \$400,000, 000 worth of schools.

Half of Dr. Gilliland's fee, which would be about \$8,000 on a project the size of Rockcastle's, is paid for by the Ford Foundation. Mr. Parsons told the board that quite often the other half is absorbed by the architects.

Dr. Gilliland and his staff study what the faculty and school board want in the curriculum and building and make suggestions on how best to accomplish the desired end. A contract is signed for one year and he

and his staff stay on from beginning through inspection of the school. One school in which Dr. Gilliland was involved in the new school in Berea which features the new "team" teaching. This new teaching concept divides the classrooms up either with folding partitions or only with a row of file cabinets or other equipment. This enables a teacher to throw open several classrooms at once to show a film, to have a demonstration, to hear a lecture, etc.

Mr. Shelton told the board that his firm would absorb the amount not paid by the Ford Foundation if the board desired to hire Dr. Gilliland. He (Shelton) stated that for a three-year program with about 650 to 700 students and a 3500 seat gymnasium the cost would be about \$1,500,000.00 and that for a four-year program with about 900 students and the same size gymnasium the cost would run about \$1,700,000.00.

Concerning the four-year high school as opposed to a three-year school, Mr. Parsons told the board that a couple of members of the State Department of Education were now advising that the county school system try to build a four-year school. He said however that the Survey Committee, which earlier recommended that a three-year school be built, would have to be requested by the local board to meet again and re-evaluate their study before the four-year program could be definitely decided on. A motion was made and carried unanimously that a letter be written by Mr. Parsons to the Survey Committee requesting that they re-evaluate their study.

Mr. Parsons also told the board that if a four-year school were built it would be necessary to use some Title I funds since the county would not have enough money from the sale of bonds to swing a \$1,700,000.00 building.

Up to twenty-five percent of the Title I funds can be used for a specific area of the building such as the library, cafeteria, etc. However in order to get enough Title I money, the deductions will have to be made over a two-year period and should give the school an additional \$100,000.00 to work with.

In other business before the Board, Supt. Parsons reported that the Cove Branch School, which was sold at public auction recently, was purchased by P. Eas Mobley for \$500.

The Brush Ridge School, Orlando School, and Sand Hill, will all be sold eventually the board decided. A motion was made (Cont. To 6)

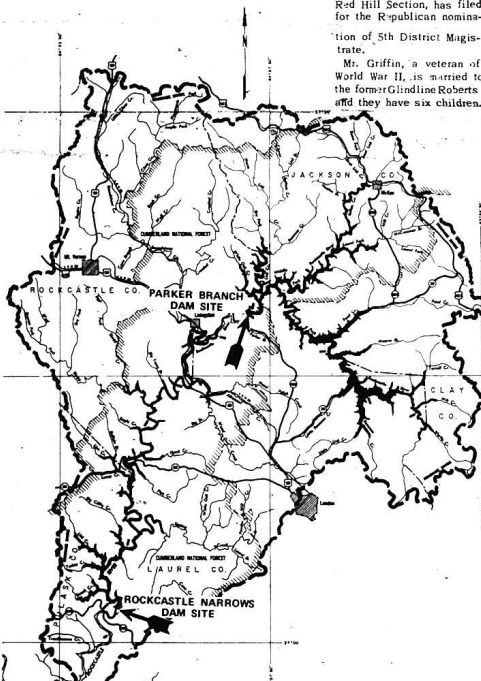

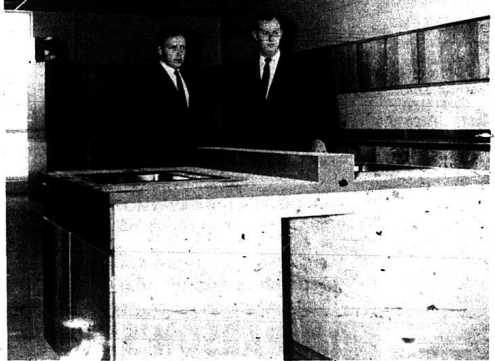

Liverwort Causes Damage In Tobacco Plant Beds

If your tobacco plant bed was treated in the fall and covered with plastic this past winter, check it for growth of liverwort, suggests Dr. J.H. Smiley, UK Extension tobacco specialist.

This strange-looking little plant can cause damage in plant beds by competing with the tobacco seedlings, he says. It is dark green, fleshy, flattened, and shaped something like a rosette, and it grows on moist, bare soil, appearing in early spring.

Liverwort is found primarily in fall-treated plant beds that were covered with plastic during the winter. Apparently, the

plastic provides a good environment for liverwort growth.

First found in Kentucky tobacco plant beds about 1965, liverwort has appeared in most areas of the state. Several farmers have already reported liverwort in plant beds this year, Smiley notes.

Liverwort can be killed by sprinkling the plant bed through the cotton or canvas with bluestone-lime mixture (3 lbs. bluestone and 4 lbs. hydrated lime in 50 gals. water). Apply it at the rate of 1 qt. per square yard - 50 gals. will cover 200 ft. of bed, 9 ft. wide, or 150 ft. of bed, 12 ft. wide.

Prevent Anthracnose in Tobacco Plant Bed

Ditch around tobacco plant beds to keep out anthracnose disease. Surface water flowing over plant beds may carry anthracnose disease organisms from sod areas that can cause serious damage to tobacco seedlings. Ditch all the way around the plant bed, and make the ditch deep enough, to carry off hard, washing rains.

Anthracnose is a leaf spot disease that causes many small spots on the tobacco leaves. You can tell the difference between anthracnose and other leaf spot diseases by the reddish-brown, elongated spots that appear on the underside of the leaf midrib and veins of plants affected by anthracnose, causing the leaf to pucker or break.

If anthracnose appears in your plant bed, use one of the following materials for control: (1) Polyram - Spray 1 oz. in 3 gal. water, Dust or wettable powder 80 W; (2) Ferbam - Spray 5 tablespoons per gal. water, Dust wettable powder 15%; (3) "Fungus" - Spray 2 1/2 tablespoons per gal. water, Dust or wettable powder 10%; (4) Maneb - Spray 1 teaspoon per gal. water, Dust or wettable powder 2%.

Apply the spray, dust or wettable powder weekly, using enough to give uniform coverage of the tobacco plants. As the plants grow larger, more of the control material will be needed to cover them.

Lawn Grubworm Problem Will Be Coming Soon

Homeowners soon will need to treat lawns to get rid of the grubworm (white grubs).

Large, dead patches of grass may appear in lawns in April. The grass area can actually be rolled up like a carpet in many cases. This is because the grubworm overwinters deep in the soil, but in early spring comes up to

feed on grass roots.

To control the grubworm, use one of the following: Aldrin or Heptachlor, strength 4 pounds active (killing agent) per gallon of the emulsifiable concentrate. Put five tablespoons of this in enough water to cover 1,000 square feet of lawn thoroughly. If the 20 percent granules of aldrin or Heptachlor are desired, use one cup of granules per 1,000 square feet.

Dieldrin, at 1.5 pounds active (killing agent) material per gallon of emulsifiable concentrate; use 8 tablespoons of enough water to cover 1,000 square feet of lawn. If Dieldrin granules are preferred, use 2 1/2 pounds of the 2 1/2 percent strength granules per 1,000 square feet of lawn.

Use any one of these in early April. The materials must work down through thick bluegrass that to root zones where the grubs will come in contact with them. Spring rains help do this, so early April is an excellent time for application.

Social Security News

April 15th is an important date for social security beneficiaries who worked in 1968. James Mustian, officer-in-charge of the Somerset social security office, said today.

For beneficiaries who worked and earned over \$1,680 last year, this is the deadline for making an annual report of earnings, he said. The report is not required, Mustian said, of anyone who was age 72 or older during the entire year. People of that age may earn as much as they can and still be entitled to all their social security benefits.

The annual report, Mustian explained, is used to determine the correct amount of social security benefits payable for 1968. A beneficiary who earned \$1,680

or less is entitled to benefits for all 12 months. If earnings were over \$1,680, some or all of the benefits are not payable. But regardless of how much a person earns, he will get his social security benefit for any month in which he earns wages of \$140 or less and is not actively self-employed.

Most beneficiaries will receive the report form in the mail, Mustian said, but for those who did not, the report is still due by April 15th. The social security office will be glad to send the form to anyone who calls, writes, or visits the office and asks for it. If a beneficiary would like help in completing the report, Mustian added, he should visit the social security office, bring with him the

W-2 form his employer gave him. Beneficiaries who were self-employed in 1968 should bring a copy of their 1968 tax returns, Mustian said.

The social security office for this area is located in the Treadwing Shopping Center in Somerset. The phone number is 678-8168. Hours of operation are 8:45 AM to 5:00 PM Monday thru Friday and until 7:00 PM on Monday.

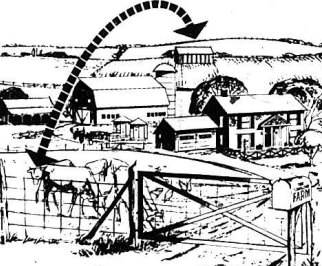
