Liverwort Causes Domage In Tobacco Plant Beds If your tobacco plant bed was treated in the fall and covered with plastic this past winter, check it for growth of liverworth, sug-gests Dr. J.H. Smiley, UK Extension tobacco special-ist.

ist.

This strange-looking little plant can cause damage in plant beds by competing with the tobacco seedlings, he says. It is dark green, fleshy, flattened, and shaped and think like seedless. ething like a rosette, and it grows on maist, bare appearing in early spring.

Liverwort is found pri-

marily in fall-treated plant beds that were covered plastic during the Apparently.

plastic provides a good environment for liverwort growth.

First-found in Kentucky tobacco plant beds about 1965, Inverwort has appear-ed in most areas of the state. Several farmers have already reported liverwort in plant beds this year, Smiley notes.

sod areas that can cause serious damage to tobacco seedlings. Ditch all the way around the plant bed, and make the ditch deep enough, to carry off hard, washing rains.

Anthracnose is a leaf spot disease that causes may small spots on the tobacco leaves. You can tell the difference between anthracnose and other leaf spot diseases by the red-Liverwort can be killed by sprinkling the plant bed through the cotton or can-vas with bluestone-lime mixture (3 lbs. bluestone and 4 lbs. hydrated lime in 50 gals. water.) Apply it at the rate of 1 qt. per anthraenose and other lead spot diseases by the red-dish-brown, elongated spots that appear on the underside of the leaf midriff and veins of plants affected by anthraenose, causing the leaf to pucker or break. If anthraenose appears in your plant bed, use one of the following materials for control: (1) Polyram - Spray 1 to z. in 3 gal. water. Use any one of these in early April. The materials must work down through thick bluegrass thatch to root zones where the grubs

Social Security News

April 15th is an important date for social security beneficiaries who worked in 1968, James Mustian, officer-in-charge of the Somerset social security office, said today.

For beneficiaries who worked and earned over \$1,680 last year, this is the deadline for making an annual report of earnings, he said. The report is not required, Mustian said, of anyone who was age 72 or older during the entire year. People of that age may carn as much as they can and still be entitled to all their social security benefits.

The annual report, Mustiar explained, is used to deheneficiaries who

explained, is used to de-termine the correct amount. payable for 1968. A bene-ficiary who earned \$1,680

or less is entitled to bene-fits for all 12 months. If earnings were over \$1,800, some or all of the benefits-are not payable. But re-gardless of how much a person earns, he will get his social security benefit for any month in which he earns wages of \$140 or less and is not actively self-employed. self-employed. beneficiaries will
