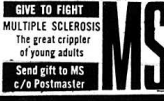

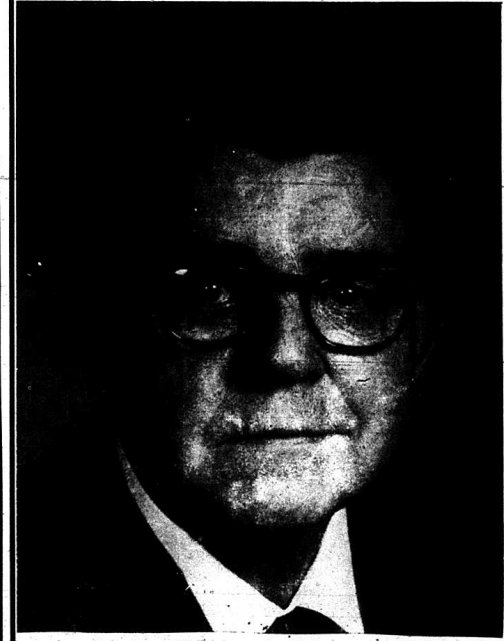

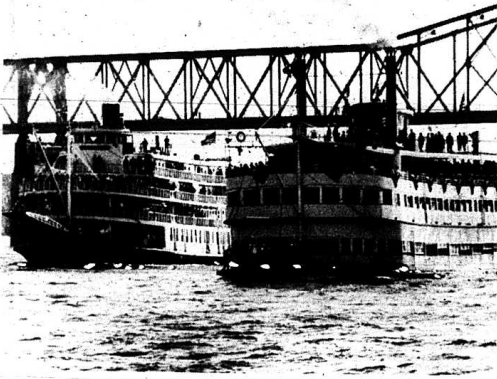

## Library Notes

**SONG OF THE YOUNG SENTRY**, by David Westheimer. A novel about Allied prisoners in World War II. Lt. Steven Lane, nose-pierced of a bomber and his two buddies are captured by the Italians and sent to a P.O.W. camp near Rome. Byrd is married, steady, sensible. Moran is unmarried, rugged and impious. Dubbed Blubberbutt by his crew, Lang is naive, fearful and self-conscious about his weight. In the Italian camp, the three learn to adjust—to steal, hoard and trade food and other small amenities; to plot and attempt escapes;

to fight boredom and discover previously unrealized resources in themselves. **I SWEAR BY APOLLO**, by Agatha Christie. A mystery doctor—a young man starting his career at the close of the Civil War. Set against the expanding medical horizons of 19th-century America, it tells of Mathew Chapin's career in the South, in Vermont, at Harvard, at Bellevue, and of his inner conflict as trapped in an incompatible marriage—he tries to discover the "art of healing" both as a surgeon and as a

man. This is the first volume of a projected family chronicle about several generations of surgeons on the forefront of medicine in the United States.

**THE DEVIL'S HALF**, by Elizabeth Seifert. The two Cohen sisters, Meg and Lucy had been in love with Young Dr. Mike Tyson since childhood. Now he was coming home to be chief of medical service at the university's new teaching hospital. But on the night of his return, Meg was viciously assaulted by an unknown maniac, and from then on she retreated into an emotional isolation. The half-serious rivalry with Lucy was ended, and it seemed that not even Mike could cross the barrier she had built around herself.

**TESTIMONY OF TWO MEN**, by Taylor Caldwell. A long dramatic novel of life in a Pennsylvania town at the turn of the century. The central figure is Dr. Jonathan Ferrier, who has been accused, then acquitted, of killing his young wife. The town, however, still believes him guilty, and shares his medical colleagues, resentful of his advanced ideas and techniques, are against him. Ferrier has sold his practice to a young doctor, but before leaving town hopes to resolve the personal problems of his mother and brother, and hopes also to win over the girl he loves, who shares the town's hostility to him.

"Impersonation of Government employees is a Federal offense," James Mustian, officer-in-charge of the Social Security Office in

Somerset, warned today. Mustian said that a man is believed to be posing as a "Social Security doctor." The suspected impostor sells medicines door to door and promises monthly benefit increases to elderly persons. The Social Security Administration is making this information known to prevent any further Social Security beneficiaries from being swindled. Social Security representatives occasionally do visit residents of this area at their homes. These employees have identification cards with pictures which show that they are employees of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. If a Social Security employee visits a resident of this community, the visitor should be asked to show his identification card. If the visitor does not have an identification card, the resident should call the Social Security office which is located in the Tradeswind Center in Somerset. The phone number is 678-8168. The office is open from 8:45 AM to 7:00 PM on Monday and from 8:45 AM to 5:00 PM Tuesday through Friday.

Q— I recently received my National Service Life Insurance dividend check. I am now drawing 100 percent service-connected disability compensation and, because of this, the premiums on my policy are waived. Since I do not pay anything into the insurance fund, should I return the dividend check?

A— No. You need not return the check since you are entitled to this dividend. However, you should understand that the waiver of

NSLI premiums is not due to your 100 percent disability compensation rating. Rather, it is due to the fact that your disability meets the premium waiver requirement of "any impairment of mind or body which continuously renders it impossible for the insured to follow any substantially gainful occupation."

If you become employed, your NSLI premium waiver may be terminated.

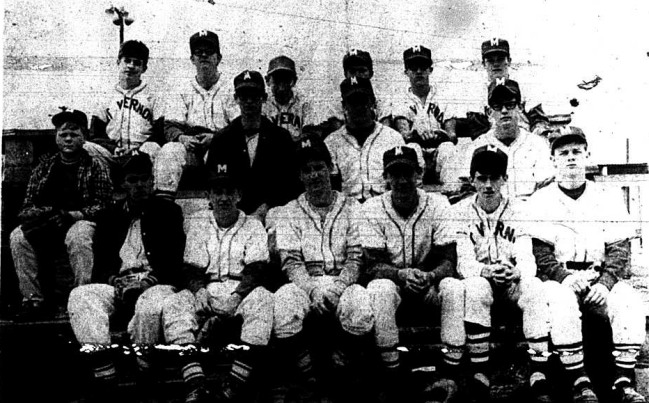

### BIG SINGING DAY AT BENTON MAY 25

Age-old hymns once sung by the Welsh ancestors of Kentucky mountaineers will be revived again in Benton, Ky., on May 25 for the annual Big Singing Day. Every year since 1884, and its neighboring states have gathered in Benton, located on US-64 just west of Kentucky Lake, for Big Singing Day. Traditionally held on the fourth Sunday in May, the day is devoted to preserving a type of

music that has long since vanished in most parts of the country — shape-note singing.

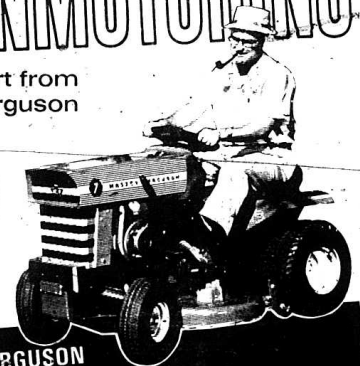

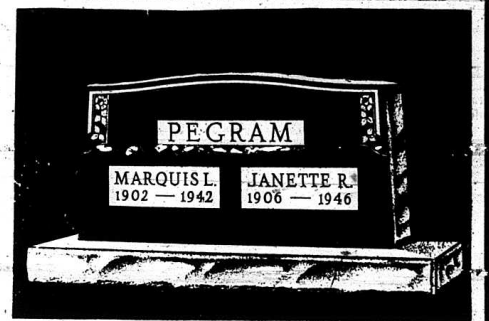

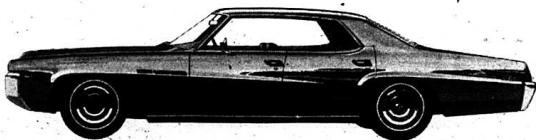

**BLACK-EYED SUSAN IS A REAL BEAUTY**  
You can wager the weekly "sunny allowance" that the black-eyed Susan is a real beauty, loved by persons from Canada to Florida. This lovely lady of the flower world is so cherished in Maryland that it is the State flower.  
The black-eyed Susan grows to an average height of about two feet and sometimes reaches up to three feet in height. The flowers were named because its florets form a beautiful blue-brown, eye-like center in each flower. This is surrounded and accented by yellow rays, about two inches in length.

**VETERANS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
Q—I am a veteran of World War II and will soon reach my 65th birthday. Will I be entitled to a VA pension?  
A— You may be eligible for a pension from the Veterans Administration at age 65 if your income from all sources does not exceed \$2,000 a year if you are single, or \$3,000 a year if you have one or more dependents. A wife's income and the size of your estate are factors which must also be considered.  
For further information and assistance, check with your nearest VA office.

Q—My husband has a heart condition which developed in service. He was able to work until three months ago when he had a heart attack and the Veterans Administration awarded him 100 percent disability.  
The doctor says that he will never be able to go to work. With two children in college, I will have to work to help support us but I don't have any training. Can the VA help me?

A— Possibly, VA educational assistance is available to the wives, sons and daughters of veterans who are determined by the VA to be permanently as well as totally disabled. For a maximum of 36 months, the VA will pay a wife, son or daughter up to \$130 a month for full-time institutional training.  
Since you indicate that your husband has been rated totally disabled, you should check with the VA regional office where his records are on file to see if his current condition is considered permanent by (Cont. To 12)

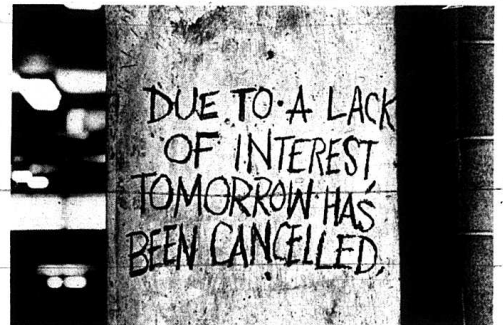

# Area Agent's Notes

## The Eastern Tent Caterpillar and Its Control

The eastern tent caterpillar, or apple-tree tent caterpillar, is the larval stage of one of the most important insect defoliators of many of our trees in spring. Although the trees usually are not killed directly from being stripped of their leaves by the caterpillars, they may be so weakened that they become susceptible to disease and other insect attacks. The nests and webbing of the caterpillars are unsightly along out roadsides, in parks, and in yards, and the caterpillars are a nuisance when they crawl from the trees in search of more food or to find a place to spin their cocoons.

Wild cherry is the tree most frequently attacked and perhaps is the source of many outbreaks. Apple also is a favorite host, but plum, peach, rose, and hawthorn are frequently attacked also. Less commonly attacked are beech,

birch, barberry, oak, willow, poplar, and witch hazel, and rarely elm.

Natural controls account for some reduction in the number of eastern tent caterpillars. The larvae are preyed upon by some ground beetles, predaceous bugs, toads, and certain birds. Several kinds of small wasps attack the eggs, larvae, and pupae. Unfavorable weather and disease will at times cause a considerable reduction in eastern tent caterpillar populations.

When natural controls are not enough, several insecticides may be used for effective control. They include DDT, lead arsenate, methoxychlor and malathion. The insecticides are available in several forms, but wettable powder formulations are generally preferred.

Contact the county agent's office for more information on formulation strengths to use, etc.

Tents in small yard trees can be torn out by a pole

and the caterpillars destroyed mechanically, but this method is not feasible for large trees or for many trees over a wide area.

## Disposal of Dead Domestic Animals

The disposal of dead domestic animals has become increasingly difficult because of the closing of several rendering plants in the state. These rendering plants are going out of business because of lack of profit from their operations. The synthetic leather-like materials have reduced the demand for hides of animals for leather. Detergents have taken the place of soap. Oil seed meals have replaced tankage in animal feeds. All of these things added together are making the rendering of dead animals unprofitable.

Dr. L. G. Northington, State Veterinarian, has recently made known the fact that several disease outbreaks have been attributed to the improper disposal of dead animal carcasses. These animals died as the result of an infectious disease. The carcasses were dragged out on the hillside and left to rot or to be disposed of by other animals and birds. Dogs, cats and birds that feed on these dead diseased animal carcasses may carry the infection many miles to other animals susceptible to the disease. Dead infected carcasses that are placed near streams may contaminate the downstream area for several miles. Some disease organisms live in the soil for many years. Animal carcasses that are allowed to decompose on the land may contaminate a wide area that will remain infective to other livestock for several years in the future.

It is the responsibility of the owner to properly dispose of all dead animals.

The Department of Veterinary Science has on file plans for the proper disposal of poultry carcasses. These disposal pits can be modified to care for small and large poultry operations where the disposal of dead birds may become a problem. All animal and bird carcasses should be disposed of properly to prevent the spread of disease and contamination of the surroundings.

combustible material to completely cremate some large animals. Wood, hay, used oil and old tires are some of the materials that can be used for cremating carcasses.

Burying is another way to properly dispose of a dead carcass. The hole should be dug where it will not be covered by overflow from a pond or stream, it should be over 100 feet from any stream, well, spring, public highway, residence of stable. The hole should be at least 4 feet deep. After the carcass is placed in the hole the abdomen and chest cavities should be opened with a sharp instrument. The carcass should then be covered with 2 inches of quicklime and at least 3 feet of earth.

The Department of Veterinary Science has on file plans for the proper disposal of poultry carcasses. These disposal pits can be modified to care for small and large poultry operations where the disposal of dead birds may become a problem. All animal and bird carcasses should be disposed of properly to prevent the spread of disease and contamination of the surroundings.

Proper Fertilization Pays

At times products are placed on the market with the claim that they will revolutionize crop production and replace the need for commercial fertilizer. With many such products no

unbiased research data is available. They are sold on the basis of testimonials and claims of the manufacturer with no indication as to what the fertilizer is.

The use of commercial fertilizers to supply nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium on soils where these nutrients are deficient consistently increases production and profits. Without these chemical fertilizers crop yields on much of the land in Kentucky would be very low and unprofitable. This fact has been proven through years of carefully controlled research and demonstrated by thousands of farmers throughout the state.

For years the Kentucky Fertilizer Law has protected the farmer and the reputable fertilizer manufacturer by requiring that the nutrient content of the fertilizer materials offered for sale in the state be guaranteed and shown on the label. This law is strictly enforced and enables the purchaser of commercial fertilizer to know what he is buying.

Any material other than those properly labelled in compliance with the present fertilizer regulations should not be used as a substitute for commercial fertilizers.

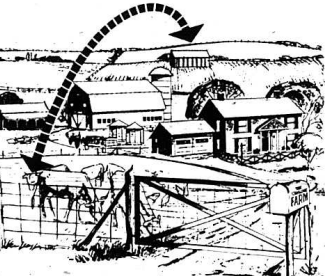
