Animal carcasves that one allowed to decompose on the land may contaminate a wide area that will remain infective to other livestock for several years in the future. It is the responsibility of the owner to properly dispose of all dead animals

Burving is another way to properly dispose of a dead carcass. The hole should be dug where it will not be covered by overflow from a pond or stream, it should be over 100 feet from any be over 100 feet from any stream, well, spring, public highway, residence of sta-ble. The hole should be at least 4 feet deep. After the carcass is placed in the hole the abdomen and chest cavities should be opened with a sharp instrument. The carcass should then be covered with 2 inches of quickline and at least 3 feet of earth.
