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SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Students were reminded today of the importance of having a social security number when applying for summer employment. James Mustian, social security officer-in-charge in Somerset pointed out that an employer needs a record of each worker's social security number so that he can report the wages paid to each individual's social security account and pay the taxes due, the earnings credited to a worker's social

security account, he pointed out, are the basis for determining the amount of benefits payable to him and his family when he retires or becomes disabled. If the employer does not have a worker's social security number when he sends in his first report after a worker is hired, he must file an additional report when he does get it. To avoid extra reports, some employers have adopted the practice of withholding wages until the worker supplies his number. A few have decided to refuse employment if the job applicant does not have his social security number with him. Mustian advised students to call or write the social security office as early as possible if they do not have social security numbers. By getting the number early, you will save your future employer time and avoid the risk of being turned down for a job. The social secur-

Inspection Laws In Use

"Nearly a quarter of a million unsafe vehicles were permanently removed from Kentucky's highways last year. And approximately 25.7 per cent of all cars checked under Kentucky's motor vehicle inspection program since Jan. 1 of this year - about 121,000 vehicles - have been rejected by safety inspectors because of mechanical defects.

Reporting on the progress of the Commonwealth's inspection program, Deputy Commissioner for Public Safety Robert Shirley said that the number of mechanically defective vehicles uncovered to date is indicative of the significant impact which such a program can have on statewide highway safety efforts.

Although safety experts generally agree, Shirley said, that realistic appraisal of any such program's effectiveness cannot be made until it is at least four years old, "a review of our efforts within the short space of 15 months since motor vehicle inspection was first inaugurated reveals that much has already been accomplished."

By the last day of 1968, more than 1.2 million automobiles were displaying the 12-month safety inspection sticker on their windshields. And, since Jan. 1 of this year, nearly 569,000 vehicles have already undergone the 1969 inspection. Enforcement by the Kentucky State Police has been highly effective in singling out violators. According to statistics compiled by the KSP, approximately 1300 motorists a month were cited into court during the last six months of 1968 for failure to comply with the law.

Since Jan. 1 of this year, the rate has risen to about 2,100 a month.

Lack of cooperation on the part of motorists is cited as chief problem in establishing more effective enforcement throughout the state.

"Many courts have shown a reluctance to convict offenders brought before them," said Jonn Parrott, Deputy Director of the State Public Safety Department's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, "choosing instead to either dismiss the charge or file it away."

The current conviction rate, based on figures collected by the Public Safety Department, is about 18.7 per cent.

An allied problem, Parrott noted, is the tendency on the part of many local law enforcement officers to overlook violations of the inspection law.

"With fully 42 per cent of all registered automobiles being owned by persons living in or near Kentucky's larger cities, the necessity for widespread enforcement on the local scene assumes considerable importance," Shirley agreed. "If the program is over to achieve total effectiveness."

Louisville and Lexington were both cited as notable exceptions in the "soft approach" toward vehicle owners ignoring the inspection law. Both cities are noted for making vigorous efforts to crack down on violators.

Although Kentucky is only one of some 32 states now enforcing vehicle inspection laws, careful advance planning led the Commonwealth to creation of a system unique among all others - and one which is now serving as a model for other states, the formal training of all inspectors.

With the assistance of the State Education Department's Vocational Training Bureau, arrangements were made with vocational schools across the State to train and certify mechanics and station owners as vehicle safety inspectors. And certification was established as a requirement for any station operator/mechanic desiring to become an inspector.

Initially, 25 vocational schools participated in the program, training some 8,000 inspectors. The number of participating schools has since been reduced to 12. The school program has been credited, in large measure, for both a relatively low number of motorist complaints against inspection stations and the large percentage of vehicle defects uncovered.

Costs of training mechanic-inspectors were assumed by the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division as part of its total operational expense outlay. Operating without any budgetary appropriation, the Division has met all costs for its survival through the annual \$25 licensing fee charged each inspection station and of the \$2, 25 cents collected from the

annual sale of each vehicle inspection sticker.

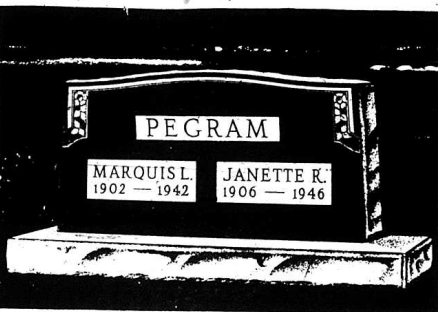

County Tax Assessment Increases By \$1,897,271

Rockcastle County's 1969 Property Tax Assessment increased by \$1,897,271.00 to a total assessment of \$39,606,497.00, according to the first estimate filed this week with the Department of Revenue by Robert Cromer, County Tax Commissioner. The 1968 assessment was \$37,709,226.00.

According to Mr. Cromer, the big gain was in the Real Estate assessment which is up \$1,225,910 over last year's assessment of \$27,658,030.00 for a total 1969 assessment of \$28,893,940.00.

There was a surprising drop of almost \$500,000 in the Motor Vehicle assessment, which last year was \$3,947,532 compared to this year's figure of \$3,551,765.

This figure is obtained by using the blue book figure for each truck and automobile licensed in Rockcastle County in 1969. It is not known exactly what caused the drop but possibly the increase in license plates and the new motor vehicle inspection law accounted in some measure to the decrease in assessment.

State Trooper William Irvin said the mishap occurred about 1:30 a.m. with the trio's car on off the right side of the highway, traveled approximately 102 feet, struck a highway sign, went another 180 feet, hit a concrete bridge abutment, turned over, skidded 20 feet and came to rest upside down on a concrete retaining wall.

Iris Show, Open to Public, To Be Held at UK May 18
If you grow flowers yourself or if you enjoy seeing flowers others have grown, come to the Iris Show at the University of Kentucky, Sunday, May 18.
The show, entitled "Fantasy Land," will be held at UK's Agricultural Science Center, located at the corner of South Limestone St. and Cooper Drive in Lexington, according to Dr. Hubert C. Mohr, chairman of the UK Horticulture Department. The public is invited to attend, at no charge, on Sunday afternoon, from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Any Kentucky gardener can exhibit iris in this fourth annual show of the Blue Grass Iris Society, he continues. Entries must be submitted between 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m., Sunday morning, May 18. No entry fee will be charged.
The modern iris is called the "rainbow flower" because it is available in so many different colors, Mohr points out. Forty different classes or iris, according to color and color pattern, will be exhibited in the horticultural division of the May 18 show.
Mohr lists the following rules for entering iris in

the show. An entry consists of a single bloom stalk, cut off at ground level, with leaves removed. Each stalk should be placed in a clear glass quart milk or juice bottle. The exhibitor must have grown the iris himself and must identify the variety by name on the entry tag. These tags will be available at the show. Entries received after 10:30 a.m. Sunday will not be eligible for prizes. Growers and other visitors at the show also will be interested in the artistic arrangements division. Mohr notes. Entries in the eight classes of this division must be registered before the day of the show. Persons interested in competing in this division should contact the UK Horticulture Department immediately for information on registration.
A special class for iris seedlings is open to amateur hybridizers, he says. The UK Horticulture Department will also have an educational exhibit at the show featuring some of their research with iris culture. For further information on the show, contact Mohr or any member of the Blue Grass Society.

Timely Tips to Peppercorn Growers
Most of the pepper acreage grown in Kentucky has a plant population of 10 to 12 thousand per acre. Records indicate that yields may be reduced when less than 10,000 plants are set per acre. There is some evidence that yields may be better when more than 10,000 plants are set per acre. If rows are 3 feet apart and plants 15-16 inches apart, it requires about 10,000 plants to set an acre. After receiving transplants, untie the bundles and sort the plants. Select and pull out the largest ones, retie the bundles, and place them back in the crates. Save the small plants to get in an area by themselves or for re-setting. It may become necessary for you to hold transplants for several days due to rainy weather. If this becomes necessary, set the plant crates in two to three inches of water for 5-6 hours,

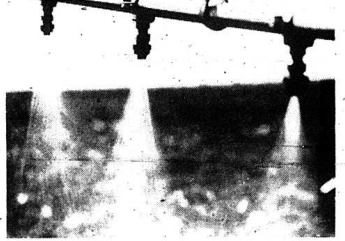
making sure that you do not wet the leaves. Wetting the roots may have to be repeated if plants must be held very long.
Transplanting is best done with a tobacco setter. It is faster and easier, and the plants live better. As you know, a wilted plant is difficult to set. Place the plants in water the night before they are to be set, being careful not to wet the leaves.
A 3-pound package of starter fertilizers should be added to each 50 gallons of transplanting water. A starter solution helps the plant to recover quickly from transplanting. Tests have shown that the addition of a starter solution has increased yields as much as three tons per acre. The best and most economical way to fertilize peppers is to drill the fertilizer two to three inches to the side of the row. Pepper roots should not be set so they are in direct contact with the fertilizer; as the fertilizers will burn the roots. Your best guide in determining the amount of fertilizer needed is a soil test. If you do not have your soil tested, apply 400 to 800 pounds of 20-20-20 fertilizer per acre.
If it is both practical and economical to control weeds chemically. For complete information on which chemicals to pick up and how to use them, pick up a copy of U. of Ky. Cooperative Service Misc 373, "Chemical Weed Control of Vegetable Crops," at your county extension office.

Timely Tips for Cucumber Growers
Before you even plant your pickle crop, you know the price per pound you will receive for the various grades of cucumbers delivered to the grading station. You know that No. 1's bring more than No. 2's, and that No. 2's bring more than No. 3's, etc. The amount of money you receive will depend on the kind of job you do.
Each year new information is made available to growers which will help them do a better job. Growers who attend pickle grower meetings and read the latest information on production are increasing their incomes each year. These same growers are always looking for better and easier ways to do the job.
Are you interested in saving work in your pickle patch? If so, check to see if you are using some of these work-saving and yield-boosting practices.
Rowing: Turning back into the row all the vines that have started across the middle is called rowing or training. Training or gathering the vines into narrow rows helps speed up pick-

ing. Trained vines are easier to pick, dust, nitrate, and cultivate. (1) Start early. Start training vines as soon as they begin to run. (2) Keep your vines rowed. Once vines are started in the row they will do a lot of their own "training." After them start together by further rowing. (3) Row and pick at the same time. With the new, easy-picking method, the picker flops the vines over to get at the pickles. After picking, vines are flopped back to their original position. This helps keep vines together, too.
Sidedressing: Pickles come from female blossoms. New blossoms appear when new leaves are formed. To keep new leaves coming, plants need a steady supply of nitrogen. (1) Sidedress 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre just after the first or second picking. (2) Broadcast or drill nitrogen in the middle between the rows. Dusting: Pickle insects and leaf diseases can bog growers of most of their profits! (1) Use 5% Sevin until blooms appear, then change to special pickle dust. (2) Cover the whole plant - upper side of the leaf as well as the underneath. (3) Start dusting as soon as young plants break through the ground. (4) Use a crank duster. (5) Dust every week.
Check yourself on these work-saving, money-making practices. Vine training can cut picking work in half, dusting keeps vines healthy, sidedressing increases yields. Good luck for a high yield.

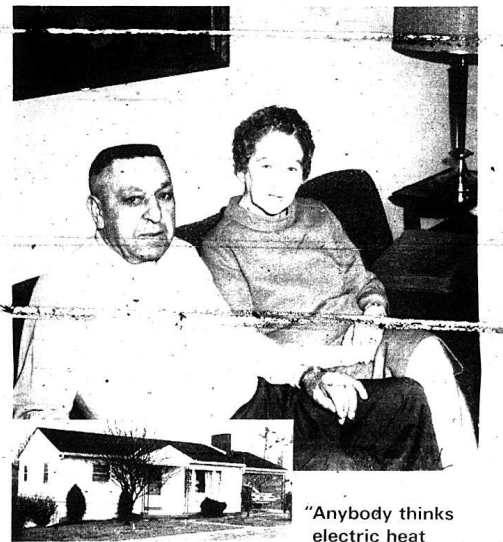

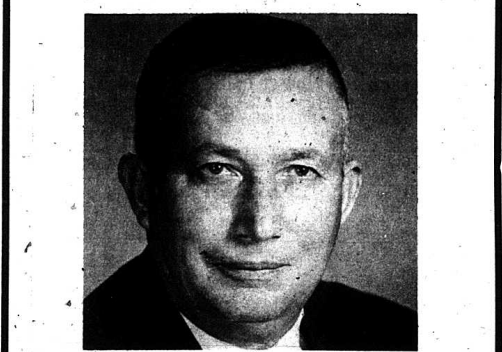

...tives which we feel will be of interest to the people of the Fifth District, Kentucky, and the Nation.

This most important bill, if enacted into law, is one that would exempt a member of the Armed Forces from service in a combat zone, such as Vietnam, when such serviceman is the only son of a family, except during a certain war or a national emergency declared by the Congress. Present Defense Department policy exempts a "sole surviving son" from serving in a combat zone but does exempt only a son.

Another bill introduced by Rep. Carter, H.R. 5961, would enable citizens of Kentucky and the United States who change their residence requirements without having to meet certain residence requirements of the state. Many people who change their residences, Carter said, are denied the right to vote simply because they are unable to meet the state's residence requirements.

Thirdly, Rep. Carter has introduced a Joint Resolution in the House of Representatives to authorize the President to designate the period beginning November 16, 1969, and ending November 22, 1969, as "National Family Health Week." A similar Resolution introduced in the House last year was passed by the Congress.

Carter said he would work hard for Congressional approval of all three of these bills.

VETERANS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q— I was wounded in Vietnam and hospitalized to a military hospital in the United States. I will be separated from service at this hospital. Will I receive any counseling or information about veteran benefits before separation?

A— Yes, a Veterans Administration representative will visit you at the hospital to advise you of your veteran benefits. Further, he will help you file for these benefits. After separation, your records will be forwarded to the VA regional office having control over your records. That office will follow up to insure any applications you filed at the military hospital are processed in a timely manner.

Q— My grandfather served in the Confederate army. His grave is unmarked. Will the Government furnish a marker for his grave?

A— Yes, The Department of the Army will furnish at no cost a headstone or marker to be placed at the unmarked grave of a member of the armed forces of the U.S., or of the Confederate States of America, who died in service or whose last discharge was honorable.

The applicant must arrange for placement of the marker.

CONSUMER COMMENTS...

A recent experience that was brought to the attention of our Consumer Protection Division involved the purchase of a home food freezer coupled with a frozen food purchase plan.

Part of the sales presentation that the purchaser through such savings would pay for the cost of the freezer in a short period of time -- the savings being obtained through purchasing food at wholesale.

Difficulties arose, however, when the contract of purchase for the freezer was assigned to a finance company and in time the company selling the food at wholesale went out of business.

Usually when a contract is formed between two parties if one does not perform his part of the bargain, the other may be excused from payment. However, when the purchaser signs a contract which allows the seller to give his right to payment to a third party the purchaser may lose his defenses if the contract contains a waiver of defenses clause.

In the example I noted above, the finance company is still able to collect payments for the freezer from the purchaser even though the seller has gone out of business and the low cost food is no longer available.

Investigate before you make a purchase from a company you do not know.

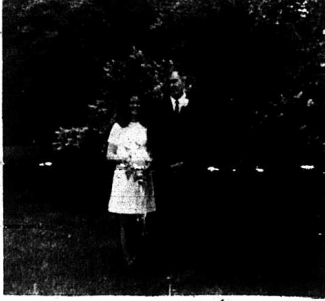
