C.H. Webb of Livingston, who is a candidate for Magistrate himself this year, sent us the article below which he had clipped from the Corbin daily paper. It is self-explanatory and we wonder if it will sound familiar to our many candidates for county office.

A political campaign, such as is being waged here at the present time, often has its humorous side. K. Earl Cox handed me a quotation from an Arkansas which illustrates this point. The candidate said, "Lost four months and twenty days canvassing; lost 1360 hours of sleep thinking about the election; lost 40 acres of corn and a whole lot of sweet potatoes, lost two front teeth and an lot of hair in a personal encounter with an opponent; gave away two pairs of suspenders; five calico dresses, five dolls and fifty baby rattles; kissed 126 babies; kindled 14 kitchen fires; put up 8 stoves and cut 14 cords of wood; carried 24 buckets of water; gathered seven wagon loads of corn, pulled 4,000 miles of bulldozer, walked 4,000 miles, shook hands 9,000 times, and talked enough to make 10,000 volumes; attended 26 revivals; was baptized 4 times; by immersion and twice some other way; contributed to foreign missions; made love to nine grass widows; got dog-bit 39 times, and then got defeated."

Residents Of RS District Protest Mullins Removal

A crowd of over three hundred residents of the Roundstone Elementary School district met last Saturday night to discuss the news that Roland Mullins, principal at Roundstone, would be transferred the next school year. The crowd was very orderly and conducted the meeting in a high-level manner.

It was the general consensus of the people present and of the speakers, that a vast majority of the parents of students enrolled at the school did not want to see Mr. Mullins transferred and that they would and should, protect the transfer to the County School Board and Charles C. Parsons, Superintendent.

Several community residents spoke during the evening and the theme was 100% in favor of Mr. Mullins and his policy at Roundstone. There was not a dissenter present, at least they didn't speak up when given the opportunity.

Mr. Mullins was notified of the transfer, to either Brodhead School, as an assistant principal or to Mt. Vernon School to teach, in a letter last week from Superintendent C. Parsons. The letter reportedly stated in part that he was being transferred because "the atmosphere (at Roundstone) was not conducive to learning."

The decision was reportedly made when several teachers and other staff requested a transfer to another school for the next school year. This touched off a chain of reaction among the residents of this school district which resulted in last Saturday night's meeting to see what course of action they would take to get the decision reversed.

peaceful negotiation on Saturday, May 17, 1969 and that twelve persons were elected to represent and state their desires before the School Administrator(s) on Wednesday, May 21, 1969.

THEREFORE, the School Administrator(s) should review their decision and consider our wishes to reinstate Mr. Roland Mullins to the office of Principal of Roundstone School and use their office, in every way, to aid the solution of those differences which has brought about this so-called "atmosphere" on which your hasty action was taken. In addition, we respectfully request that the School Administrator(s) give his (or their) response by Monday, May 26, 1969.

The resolution was presented to Superintendent Parsons early Wednesday morning (yesterday) and copy mailed to each board member. The committee requested an answer by Monday, May 26.

The resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS Mr. Roland Mullins, Principal at Roundstone School, has been relieved of his position because of alleged "atmosphere" not "conductive" to learning;

WHEREAS We, the people of those communities whose children attend the Roundstone School, have evidence that the children are learning and generally there is a better atmosphere at the school since Mr. Mullins became Principal;

WHEREAS those who work for him, who have come forward, express their appreciation of, and acclaim, the good atmosphere that surrounds his school;

WHEREAS we feel the children's welfare and education come before personality differences; and

WHEREAS we feel personality differences can be solved by those involved without involving or jeopardizing the welfare and education of our children;

WHEREAS Mr. Mullins was relieved of office without the knowledge of at least two School Board Members; and

WHEREAS we believe in a Democratic Society in Rockcastle County as well as Kentucky and these United States and that we must be represented by our duly elected School Board representative and that School Administrator(s) must abide by the laws of this state; and

WHEREAS in view of the fact a great majority of those persons so directly involved feel that this decision by the School Administrator(s) is wrong and opposite to their wishes; and

WHEREAS a meeting of members of these communities whose children attend the Roundstone School was held in an atmosphere of

In a statement made to the Signal late Wednesday afternoon by Charles Parsons, superintendent, Mr. Parsons said: "The Board of Education authorized me to assign and place all personnel in the school system for next year, 1969-70 to the best interest of the total school program.

Due to the fact that Roland Mullins, principal, Roundstone School, has been unable to develop and maintain a harmonious working relationship between himself and the majority of his staff of teachers and to develop an atmosphere conducive to a productive school program, I feel that it is in the best interest of the school to transfer him to another position where he will not be in direct authority over other school personnel. His salary will not be decreased.

I have had 10 teachers to express to me, orally and in writing, a strong dissatisfaction for the principal. Seven (7) have asked for transfers. Two other school personnel have declined to re-apply if some change is not made.

This is truly a hard problem for me to solve. I find that it would be impossible to transfer many teachers since there simply are not that many vacancies. Most of these teachers are on tenure or continuing contracts.

I have conferred with certain members of the State Department of Education and was told that it appeared I had no other alternative than to transfer the principal.

I feel that the conditions at Roundstone School will worsen during the coming year resulting in confusion and chaos and further de-

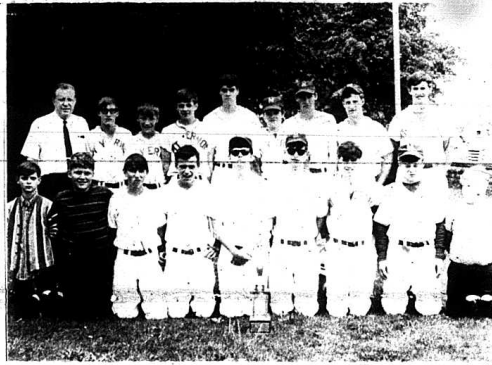

VETERANS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q- I was wounded in Vietnam and evacuated to a military hospital in the United States. I will be separated from service at this hospital. Will I receive any counseling or information about veteran benefits before separation?

A- Yes, a Veterans Administration representative will visit you at the hospital to advise you of your veteran benefits. Further, he will help you file for these benefits. After separation, your records will be forwarded to the VA regional office having control over your records. That office will follow up to insure any applications you filed at the military hospital are processed in a timely manner.

Q- My grandfather served in the Confederate army. His grave is unmarked. Will the government furnish a marker for his grave?

A- Yes. The Department of the Army will furnish at

no cost a headstone or marker to be placed at the unmarked grave of a member of the armed forces of the U.S., or of the Confederate States of America, who died in service or whose last discharge was honorable.

The applicant must arrange for placement of the marker.

Your nearest Veterans Administration office will assist you in applying.

Q- I am planning to get a loan on my 30-pay government life insurance policy. I understand the interest rate is 4 per cent, but am not sure as to how much I may borrow and how I repay the loan. Can you tell me?

A- You may borrow up to 96 per cent of the cash value shown on your policy. No regular repayments are required. You may send in a payment on your loan at any time, as long as you send \$5.00 or more.

Payment should be made to the Veterans Administration insurance office where you send your premiums. Be sure to put your policy number on your loan repayment and designate it as repayment so that it won't

be applied to your premium account.

If you are receiving disability compensation from the VA, you may authorize loan repayments to be deducted from your compensation each month. Any unpaid annual interest charges will be added to the amount of the loan to be repaid.

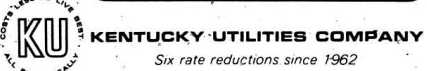

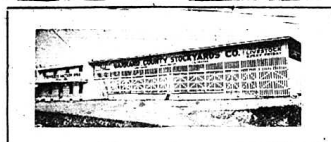

There seems to have been some misunderstanding concerning the fee of \$12.50 for motor vehicle registrations. The letter printed below from Maurice P. Carpenter, Director, Motor Vehicle Tax Division, should clear this up.

Kentucky Revised Statute 186.050 (1) reads as follows:

"The annual registration fee for motor vehicles, including taxicabs, airport limousines and U-Drive-Its, primarily designed for carrying passengers and having provisions for not more than nine passengers, including the operator, shall be \$11.50."

In addition there is a \$1.00 clerk's fee which makes a total of \$12.50.

The county clerk must charge the \$12.50 per year registration fee on a passenger vehicle. The only exception is when a new car is purchased during the year. Then only the remaining months are charged for. For example, a vehicle purchased in July would pay for only a six month fee.

This is a state law passed by the 1968 Legislature. It is not a county matter that can be controlled by the county clerk. The Department of Revenue audits the clerk each year and if he has not charged enough we require him to make up the difference out of his personal funds. The Constitution requires that this money go into the road fund and be used only for the construction and maintenance of highways.

No one can change the motor vehicle registration fee except the State Legislature.

Carter Releases Results Of His 1969 Opinion Poll

This week, Congressman Tim Lee Carter (R. Ky.) released the results of his latest Opinion Poll. He was highly pleased to receive such a good response to his Poll and expressed his sincere appreciation to the nearly 10,000 people of his District who took this opportunity to participate in the legislative process of Government. On each issue, Rep. Carter said he would try to follow the majority opinion expressed by the people of his District who returned the Questionnaire. Prohibition of cigarette advertising on TV and radio? Yes, 45.4%; No, 46.6%; Undecided, 8.0%. Raising Federal income exemption to \$1,200? Yes, 87.9%; No, 9.3%; Undecided, 2.8%. Election of President by popular vote of people? Yes, 78.9%; No, 16.7%; Undecided, 4.5%. Limiting power of President to commit American troops to combat without specific approval of Congress? Area Agents Notes

Beef Cattle Tips

Face flies, horn flies, horse flies, and every other kind of fly will be invading your beef herd during the next six weeks—so get the spray and equipment ready. Start early so the fly population will not have an opportunity to build up until eradication is almost impossible.

1. Spray your cattle with an approved insecticide. Get a copy of Kentucky publication Misc. 280E, 1969 Insecticide Recommendations for Beef Cattle.

2. Prepare and put up backrubbers early, and make sure you keep a liberal application of insecticide on the backrubber at all times. U.K. Coop. Ext. publication Misc. 307, "Making and Using a Cattle Backrubber," can be obtained from your area beef cattle specialist.

3. Pasture rotation—the practice of moving cattle every 14 to 21 days to a new pasture area will probably be one of the best methods of controlling parasites that you can use. Many internal parasite eggs pass out in the manure and many external parasites lay eggs in manure piles, so by moving cattle every 14 days or so the cattle will not be available to act as hosts for many of these parasites if the cattle are not in the immediate location when the larva is hatched.

4. Some insecticides containing systemic materials work very well on both internal and external parasites since the material is passed out of the body in the manure and is readily available for the parasite larva to eat immediately after hatching. Very good results can be achieved by the proper use of certain systemic insecticides. Consult your beef cattle agent for information. One of the main points to remember is to use the material exactly as the manufacturer advises in the directions that appear on the container.

Vaccinate all calves for blackleg and malignant edema by the time they are 3 months of age, and again at weaning time.

Make sure all heifer calves are moved away from the herd bull by the time they are 5 months of age. Otherwise, some early, fast-growing weifers may reach puberty and get bred before weaning.

If you have steers that are 4 months of age they pass out in the manure with 24 milligrams (2 implants) of stilbestrol. You can get all kinds of advice about stilbestrol from cow jockeys and cattlemen, but if you use good judgment you will disregard their expert information and implant steers the first time at 4 months of age and again

cent. Hay-type silage (wilted) should be stored at 50-65 percent.

First Year Alfalfa and Alfalfa Grass.

Late summer seedings made in 1968 should be cut no more than three times this year. The first cut should be ready about June 1. The second and third cuts should be ready at 6 week intervals after this. Seedings made this spring should be cut no more than two times. The first cut should be ready about July 1-10, the second about August 20-30.

Old Stands of Alfalfa and Alfalfa-Grass.

You may take the first cut at early bud stage. When this is done, be sure to allow at least 6 weeks for recovery before harvesting the second crop. Allow 5 to 6 weeks between the third and fourth crops. Make the fourth cut by mid-September.

Red Clover (alone or with grass.)

The best hay crops are made at bud and early bloom

When making more than one cut from red clover, stack the hay in layers so that you can blend the cuttings when feeding.

Heavy Grass (with little or no legumes.)

Cut when the grass is in bud to early bloom.

Annual Lupespede (Kobe Or Kororan.)

Cut at real early bloom 1/10 to 1/3.

Sudan and Sudan-Sorghum Hybrids for Summer Pastures

If you are planning to see some emergency summer pastures in a few days, here are some tips that might be helpful.

1. Use good land. Land that will produce 100 bushels of corn or 5 tons of alfalfa per acre is best.
2. When using the best land, an acre for each 3 to 4 cows should be about right. On thinner soils, better figure on an acre for each 2 to 3 cows.
3. Fertilize to get top yields. A soil test to check on the needs of phosphate, lime and potash

is by far the best guide. Nitrogen should be added at the rate of 100 lbs. before seeding and up to 50 lbs. (175 lbs. of ammonium nitrate equivalent) for each of two applications beyond the first grazing. In the absence of a soil test, better use about 1000 lbs. of 10-10-10. Time your planting. Divide your seeding acreage into two or three periods; space these plantings 5 to 10 days apart. This scattered planting program will provide feed at the right time and will avoid surpluses that cause severe management problems. For example, if you have 30 head of cattle and are going to use good "corn land," you will need about

10-12 acres. Seed about 4 acres each 5 to 10 days to get the acreage you need. 5. Watch mowing and grazing management. Grazing on these acres should be started when the plants are 18 to 24 inches high. Hybrids should be grazed when 20 to 30 inches in height. Avoid overgrazing and too close mowing. Four to 8 inch stubble is ideal for the hybrids. Sudan grass can take closer mowing.

Suggested Seeding Rates
When drilling, use 20 to 30 pounds per acre. When seeding broadcast, use 30 to 45 pounds per acre.

Prussic Acid

Stunting due to drought, frosts and near frost, and freezing are the greatest threats to the accumulation of prussic acid to the toxic

level. Similarly, young plants, suckers, and new growth are considered dangerous. Drought-damaged plants should never be grazed on less than 4 days after a good rain. If plants of questionable quality must be used because of a feed shortage, feed dry forage with the feed material. Better still, never allow hungry animals to gorge themselves on the green herbage. The use of a tester animal is advisable before allowing the entire herd to eat questionable plants.

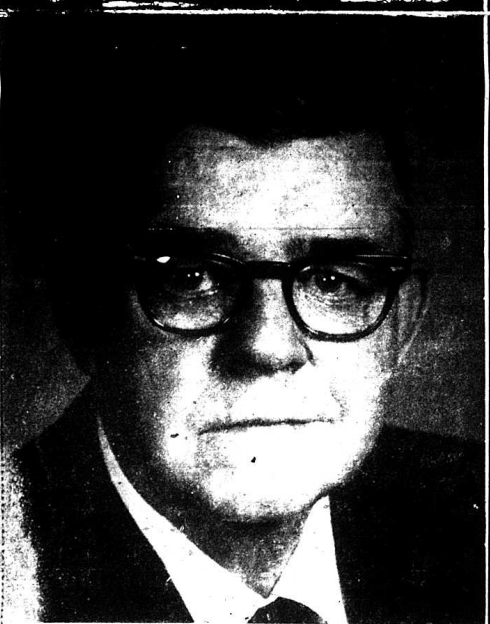

stroy the moral of the school if a change is not made.

I hold no animosity toward Mr. Mullins. I recommended him for the job and had confidence that things would go well.

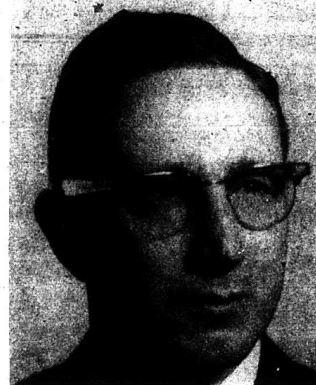

Former L&N'er a Real SENIOR Citizen!

The story below appeared in the Feb., issue of the L & N Magazine. Bentley Allen of Orlando brought the article in and asked us to reprint it. We found it interesting and thought our readers might also.

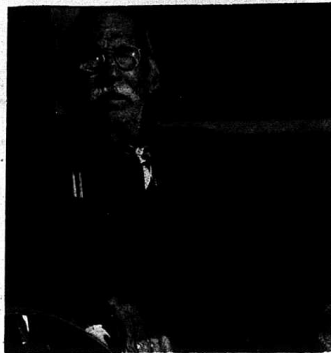
On August 20, Will Adams of Atmore, Ala., will be 119 years old!

When he was born on that date in 1850 the L&N was only five months old...The Civil War was still 11 years away...The population of the United States was a scant 23 million...And Millard Fillmore was President

of the nation.

In spite of his great age, Mr. Adams is not the oldest person in this country receiving Social Security benefits, according to that Federal agency's records. "That distinction belongs to Charlie Smith of Bartow, Fla., who will be 127 years old on July 4," the agency reports. "The second oldest Social Security beneficiary is Mrs. Tatzumbie DuPea, a Piute Indian of Los Angeles, Calif., who was born on July 26, 1849. Mr. Adams is the third oldest recipient, out of a total of 3,200 centenarians!"

Because Will Adams worked for the L&N as a track-

man between 1866 and 1899, he was the subject of a feature story entitled "As Old as the Railroad," in the March 1965 issue of this Magazine. He lives now, as he did then, with his daughter, Mrs. Mattie Thomas, at her home in Atmore. Upon our visit, we learned that, in 1963, the elderly Will had fallen out of a pecan tree which is in the front yard of their home. He wasn't severely injured, but was forced to see a doctor...for only the second time in 112 years!

Mr. Adams was born in Virginia. His father was an Indian and his mother was of Spanish descent. He never considered himself a slave, even though he was born during the era of slavery and was sold while a child to the owner of an Alabama plantation. When he was 50, he married a Negro woman some 28 years his junior, yet he has always considered her his own.

Will Adams worked many years for the W.T. Smith Lumber Company at Chapman, Ruthven, Georgianna and Fountain, Ala. At other times he was employed at

the Brosnan Saw Mill in Pensacola. Through this employment he became eligible for Social Security benefits. Agency records vouch for his Autist 1850 birthdate, and that he was 91 when he first applied for benefits in 1941!

Upon contacting Mr. Adams' daughter early in January, we learned that he gets out very little now and that he spends most of his time in bed. But, of course, when you're 118, going on 119, you certainly deserve that extra sack time!

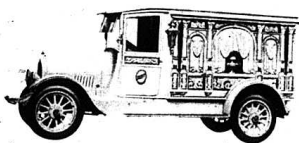

Social Security News

A record \$103,000 in monthly social security benefits was being paid to 1827 residents of Rockcastle County at the end of December 1968, and an increase of 4 percent above the amount payable at the end of February 1968, according to James Mustian, officer-in-charge of the Somerset social security office.

"Throughout the country, monthly benefits payable at the end of 1968 amounted to nearly \$2.1 billion, some \$350 million higher than at the end of 1967," Mustian continued. "Approximately three-quarters of the increased monthly amount resulted from higher benefit rates authorized by the 1967 Amendments to the Social Security Act. The remainder of the increase was simply due to a greater number of beneficiaries."

By the end of May 1969, social security will be paying monthly benefits to more than 25 million people - 1 out of every 8 Americans. Although retired workers comprise the largest group of beneficiaries, almost one-fourth of all people receiving benefits are under 60. These are currently more than 3.8 million children and 5 million young widowed mothers receiving payments. Yet the public continues to think of social security as a program for old people.

In Rockcastle County, 573 people under 60 are receiving benefits. That figure breaks down into 353 under 18, 26 18-21, and 194 22-59.

Many students would have been unable to continue their educations were it not for the 1965 Amendment to the Social Security Act which extended survivors and dependents insurance benefits to students until their 22nd birthdays. In 1968, that provision resulted in continuing benefits for 470,000 students. Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies leaving a widow and two or more children range from \$82.50 to \$434.40 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security. Payments to the young family of a worker who dies at an early age could total as much as \$85,000 to \$100,000.
